

## Chinese OK Rider To Judd Measure

### ADC's Masaoka Explains Point Of ENI Legislation; Amendment Would Keep Families Intact

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., May 11 — To effect an understanding on the various provisions of the Judd bill a conference was held at the Chinese YMCA in San Francisco on Thursday, April 28, with representatives present from local Chinese organizations, the International Institute, and the JACL-ADC.

In attendance were: Henry Lem, acting president, Grand Lodge, National Chinese American Citizens Alliance; William Hoy, managing editor, Chinese Press; Henry Shue Thom, general secretary, Chinese YMCA, and San Francisco president of the Chinese American Citizens Alliance; Miss Annie Clo Watson, executive secretary, and Miss Rose Chew, staff worker, both of the International Institute; and Joe Grant Masaoka, regional representative of the JACL-ADC.

Enactment of the principle of equality in naturalization and immigration was explained by Masaoka. The Chinese representatives present expressed fears that the Chinese Wives Act of August 9, 1946, would be voided. The JACL-ADC Director pointed out that an amendment in which many West Coast senators concurred has been submitted to the Senate Subcommittee for Immigration and Naturalization. This amendment is strongly supported by Congressman Walter H. Judd, author of H. R. 199, and would enable family members to be kept intact instead of causing forced separations and creating hardships.

In effect it would accord the Asiatic entrant the same consideration now given to immigrants from Europe. The proposed provision would permit the alien wife, husband, and unmarried minor children of an American citizen to enter the United States non-quota.

The Chinese representatives present felt that the proposed amendment merited their support and would give formal expression of their stand after studying the language of the proposed measure. Miss Chew deplored any provisions which would take away the favored status enjoyed by members of the Filipino race and urged that the so-called racial formula under present law which treats Asiatics differently from members of the Caucasian race be corrected. Persons of Asiatic ancestry, with the exception of the Filipino, born in countries other than their native land are chargeable to the quota figure of the Asiatic country of their ancestral derivation rather than to the nation of which they are citizens.

The meeting ended on a friendly note and it was the general belief that on matters of mutual concern a common interest and uniformity of action would be sought.

## ADC Aides Head For Hawaii

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., May 11 — With the approval of the Honolulu Japanese Chamber of Commerce for a JACL-ADC fund drive covering all Islands of the Territory, an immediate start is assured with the departure today of JACL-ADC Pacific Southwest Regional Director Sam Ishikawa, and Keisaburo Koda, Chairman, Northern California Ki-kaken Kisei Domei, aboard United Air Lines this morning.

Relying upon the generous response of the people in Hawaii to the initial solicitation in 1947, the JACL-ADC is hopeful that a substantial amount will be again contributed by Hawaii residents.

Legislation sponsored by the JACL-ADC has benefited Hawaii residents in the elimination of the limited passport regulation of 1907 which prohibited certain Issei who migrated to Hawaii under limited passports from admission to the continental United States.

Further, evacuees moved under military orders from Hawaii are expected to file for claims under Public Law 886.

Approximately 43,000 Hawaii Issei would be removed from the "racially ineligible to citizenship" category in the passage of H. R. 199.

The mainland party expressed the hope that the common interest of Hawaii and the mainland Japanese would bring a sympathetic response from the Islanders to aid in the effort to secure enactment of H. R. 199.

## DETROIT JACL 'JAPAN NIGHT' SET MAY 21

DETROIT, Mich., May 11 — Detroiters will have a chance to be transported into the land of cherry blossoms when the Detroit JACL presents its first "Japan Night" from 8 p.m. on Saturday, May 21, in the Downtown YWCA.

A talented troupe of twenty Nisei artists will journey from Chicago to present a two-hour program of classical Japanese dances with modern interpretation, teina, shigin kenbu and haiku. This group, probably the most renowned in all Midwest, has performed over television, recitals and civic festivals in St. Louis, Chicago, Salt Lake City and Los Angeles.

The troupe is headed by Haruko and Tomoko Uyeda who have studied classical Japanese dances for the last ten years under the tutelage of Fujima Kansuma, foremost exponent of Japanese dances in America today.

Arranged by the Detroit JACL, the program is especially for the Detroit Issei. Chairman is Lloyd H. Joichi whose committee members are F. ## Baptists Will Note Fiftieth Year Here

### Dr. Morikawa, Nisei Preacher From Chicago, Will be Guest During Celebration May 22-29

Dr. Jitsuo Morikawa, Canadian-born pastor of the First Baptist Church in Chicago, will be the guest pastor at the Seattle Japanese Baptist Church's 50th anniversary celebration from May 22-29.

With the observation of the church's founding in 1899 less than two weeks away, the Nisei 50th anniversary committee, with Robert Koba as chairman, began to concentrate on the details of the anniversary program.

Dr. Morikawa will speak before a combined Issei-Nisei congregation on Sunday evening, May 22, and at the Nisei evening services on Monday and Tuesday, May 23 and 24. The Nisei program will close with a Reunion Banquet on Wednesday, May 25, with Clarence Arai as toastmaster. The general public is invited to hear Dr. Morikawa's messages on all three evenings.

Dr. Morikawa aspired to become a minister at the age of 17. Leaving his farm home near Vancouver, B. C., Canada, in 1931, he came to the United States to study for the ministry. He was graduated by the University of California at Los An-

geles in 1937. In 1940, he received his Master of Theology degree from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. He was serving as Nisei minister at three Japanese Baptist churches in Los Angeles, Gardena and Terminal Island prior to the war.

After leaving Poston relocation center in 1943, he was appointed associate pastor of First Baptist Church in Chicago. By an unanimous vote of the members of the church, Dr. Morikawa was named pastor of the predominantly Caucasian congregation in October, 1949 when the Rev. Robert Steiger was called to another church.

## Illinois Chief Backs H. R. 199

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 11 — The Honorable Adlai Stevenson, governor of Illinois, expressed his support for H. R. 199, the Judd bill for equality in naturalization and immigration, in an interview with Mike Hagiwara of the Nisei Veterans Club of Chicago, and Tats Kushiida, JACL-ADC representative. It was learned this week from the Midwest Regional office.

Governor Stevenson, it was reported, will urge early action on the House-passed Judd bill now pending in the Senate, in letters to Senator Scott W. Lucas (D., Ill.), Senate majority leader, and Pat McCarran (D., Nev.), chairman of the subcommittee where the bill rests.

While in Springfield, Hagiwara and Kushiida called upon Colonel Sherwood Dixon, lieutenant-governor of Illinois and former commanding officer of the Nisei 442nd Combat Team in training at Camp Shelby, Mississippi.

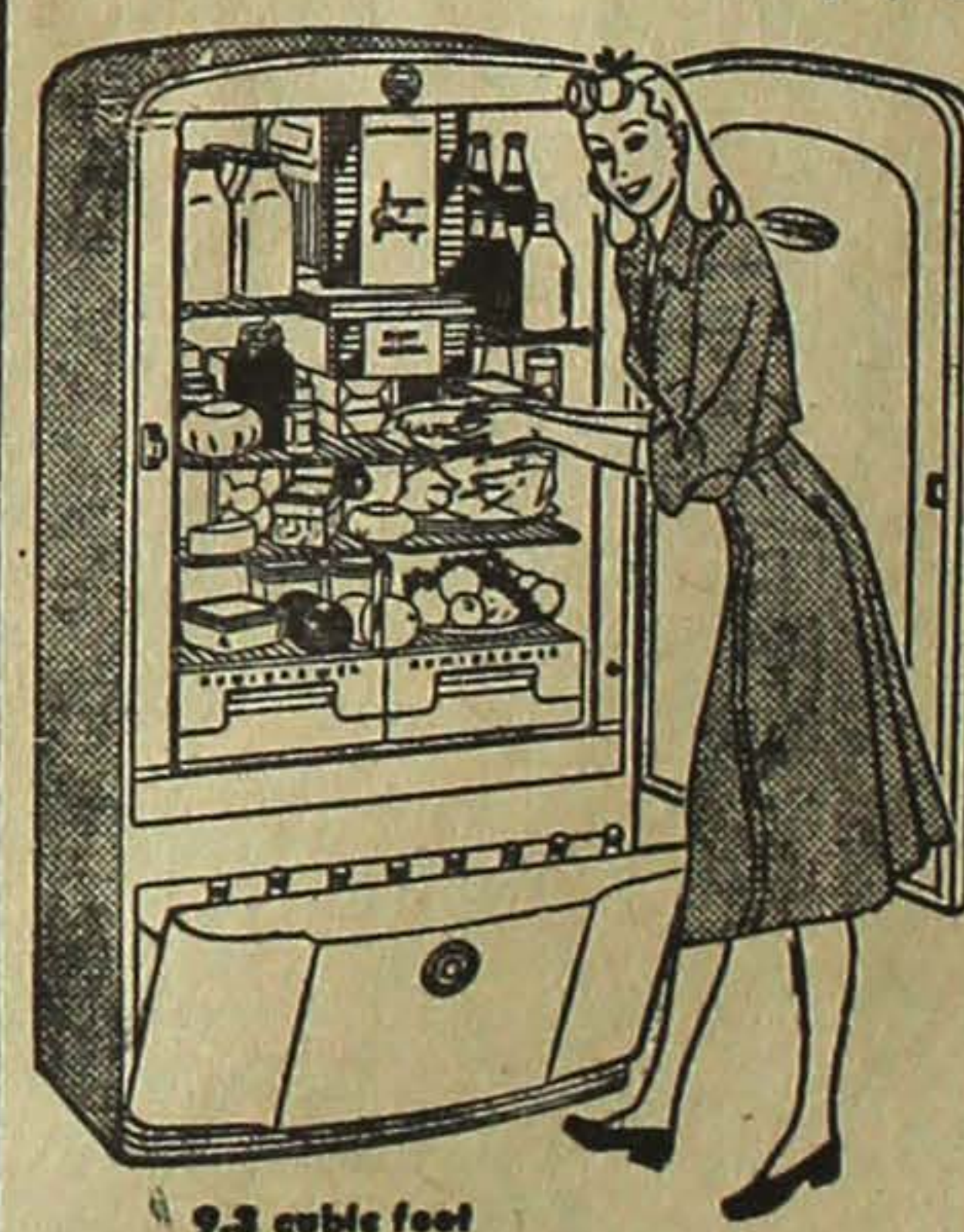
