

NLRB TURNS DOWN PETITION BY TWO AFL UNIONS FOR VOTE AMONG ALASKA CANNERY MEN

In a decision rendered by the NLRB on May 17, 1949, the petition by two AFL cannery unions to hold an election among resident cannery workers in Southeastern Alaska has been turned down in behalf of the Food, Tobacco, Agricultural & Allied Workers of America, CIO, which has held the bargaining agency since 1945.

The petitioners are two AFL federal locals, the United Alaska Fishermen and Cannery Union, Local 24359; and the Fishermen and Cannery Workers Union, Local 24366. More than 1,500 cannery workers are involved.

FTA-CIO holds the collective bargaining agency for all the resident cannery workers since 1945 after it came out victorious in another NLRB election between FTA, the Alaska Native Brotherhood and Sisterhood, and the SIU-AFL.

Since FTA is a non-complying union with the Taft-Hartley law, the two AFL fishermen and cannery workers unions have petitioned for an election for NLRB certification. Had the petition been granted by the board, FTA would not have appeared on the ballot similar to the balloting now being conducted among 3,500 non-resident cannery workers under the jurisdiction of Local 7, another FTA local affiliate. Local 7 FTA is being challenged by SIU-AFL which is charged by the CIO union as a "strike-breaking outfit", citing the strike-breaking activities of the SIU in the recent strike of Canadian seamen, and its raid upon the jurisdiction of Local 7 which it has held for the last 13 years.

The NLRB rendered its decision on these terms: "In these circumstances we perceive no basis for departing from the 1945 determination that the resident cannery workers of all the members of the ASI (Alaska Salmon Industry, Inc.) in Southeastern Alaska constitute a single appropriate unit. Accordingly, and for reasons fully set forth in our earlier decision, we find the units requested by the petitioners inappropriate and we shall therefore dismiss the petition." Concluding its decision, the NLRB stated, "IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that the petitions herein, be, and they hereby are, dismissed."

Hubert J. Merrick was the NLRB hearing officer.

The companies involved in the dispute are: New England Fish Company, Pyramid Fish Canneries, Nakat Packing Corporation, Libby, McNeill & Libby, Pacific American Fisheries, Icy Straits Salmon Company, Hood Bay Salmon Company, Superior Packing Company, Todd Packing Company, Westcoast Salmon Company, and the North Packing Canning Company, Inc.

Here Is Text Of 442d Team's 'Battle Honors'

(Editor's note: Following is the complete text of "battle honors" won by the famed 442d Regimental Combat Team during World War II. The text is reprinted from "Americans — The Story of the 442d Combat Team" to pay tribute to those American Japanese war dead this Memorial Day, May 30.)

BATTLE HONORS
442d Regimental Combat Team
General Orders War Department
Washington, DC.
No. 34 10 April 1946

VII. BATTLE HONORS. As authorized by Executive Order 9396 (sec. I, WD Bul. 22, 1943), superseding Executive Order 9075 (sec. III, WD Bul. 11, 1942), the following units are cited by the War Department under the provisions of section IV, WD Circular 333, 1943, in the name of the President of the United States as public evidence of deserved honor and distinction. The citations read as follows:

2. The 442d Regimental Combat Team (less the 442d Field Artillery Battalion) composed of the following elements:

442d Infantry Regiment.
232d Combat Engineer Company.
is cited for outstanding accomplishment in combat for the period 5 to 14 April 1945 in the vicinity of Serravezza, Carrara, and Foscinovo, Italy. When the 92d Infantry Division with the 442d Regimental Combat Team attached was ordered to open the Fifth Army offensive by executing a diversionary attack on the Ligurian Coast of Italy, the combat team was ordered to make the main effort of the attack. It was done by executing a daring and skillful flanking attack on the positions which formed the western anchor of the formidable Gothic Line. In 4 days, the attack destroyed positions which had withstood the efforts of friendly troops for 5 months. This was accomplished in the face of skilled enemy forces nearly equal in strength to the attacking forces and who had at least 5 months in which to improve their position. The 442d Regimental Combat Team drove forward, despite heavy casualties. Allowing the enemy no time for rest or reorganization, the combat team liberated the city of Carrara, seized the heights beyond, and opened the way for further advances on the way to the key road center and port of La Spezia and to Genoa. It accomplished the mission of creating a diversion along the Ligurian Coast, which served as a feint for the subsequent breakthrough of the Fifth Army forces into Bologna and the Po Valley. Former Seattle GI, Winner of DSC, Neutralized 4 Nazi Machineguns

Pfc William Nakamura of Seattle was one of World War II's great Nisei heroes.

Winner of the Distinguished Service Cross, he neutralized four Nazi machineguns on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

The War Department's Bureau of Public Relations released the following communique for press release Friday p.m., Nov. 3, 1944:

"WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Private First Class Bill Nakamura of Seattle, Washington, member of the Japanese-American 442d Regimental Combat Team, singlehandedly neutralized four German heavy machineguns on the Fifth Army front in Italy recently. Two platoons of Nakamura's out-

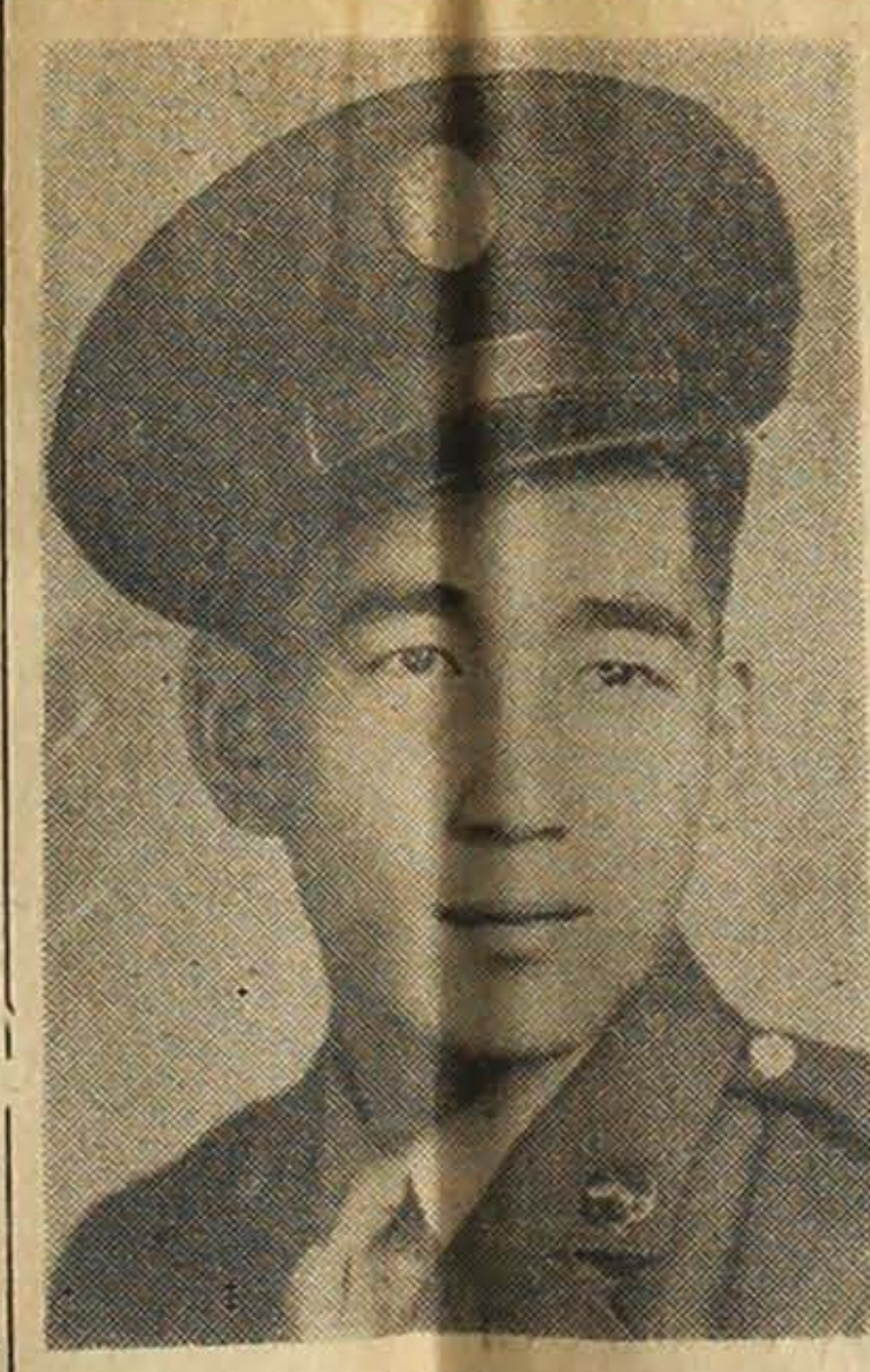
fit were pinned down by fire from the heavy machineguns near Castellina, Italy. Without awaiting orders, the Seattle soldier crawled across exposed terrain toward the enemy emplacements. His comrades discovered his action and opened up with supporting rifle fire.

"When within 150 yards, he fired upon one machinegun nest with his Garand rifle. His accurate fire knocked it out and forced the other three gun crews to retreat in disorder.

"Returning to his platoon, Nakamura noticed that automatic weapons fired from a farmhouse were harassing his buddies. Nearest to the farmhouse, he signaled his company to withdraw while he covered their movement. Making his way 75 yards to the left, he fired from the protection of a slight depression, holding the enemy and protecting the withdrawal of his unit.

"His squad leader, Staff Sergeant Stanley Serikaku of Kaneohe, Oahu, credited Nakamura with having saved the lives of many of his fellow soldiers.

"A student at the University of Washington, Nakamura lived in Seattle, Washington, until all persons of Japanese ancestry were evacuated from the Pacific Coast. He volunteered for the combat team from the Minidoka Relocation Center, Hunt, Idaho."

Honors to GI Dead And Dedication Of Monument Set

This year's Memorial Day services next Monday, May 30 at Lakeview Cemetery will be memorable — the 21-foot granite monument, dedicated to the heroic deeds of the 54 Nisei war dead of Seattle and vicinity, will be dedicated and due honors paid to these men who gave their lives in the service of their country.

Taking a lead in the occasion will be the Seattle Nisei Veterans Committee, whose chairman is Richard Setsuda. The NVC Memorial Day committee has, for months, made preparations for this occasion to pay tribute to their fallen comrades.

Parade co-chairmen, Shiro Kashino and Elmer Ogawa, are urging the Nisei veterans of Seattle and vicinity to join with the NVC in the annual city Memorial Day parade, which will start at 10 a.m. from Second and Virginia Street.

The Nisei marchers are asked to assemble at 9:15 a.m. on Blanchard Street between First and Second Avenues, facing east. The route of the parade will be: South, down Second Avenue to Yesler Way, and north, up Third Avenue, past the reviewing stand on Third and Union.

In the afternoon, the community Memorial Day services will be held from 2 p.m. at the Lakeview Cemetery where the monument will be unveiled and dedicated. Mrs. Hisako Nakamura will represent the Gold Star Parents and Widows in the unveiling ceremony, and Seiichi Hara will deliver the acceptance message on behalf of the parents and widows of the Nisei war dead.

Col. James M. Hanley, former executive officer of the 442d Regimental Combat Team, will be the main speaker at the Lakeview Cemetery services.

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L. A. Nisei Vets Set Ceremonies; Memorial Monument to be Unveiled

LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 25—Memorial and dedication ceremonies will be combined on Memorial Day, May 30, at the Evergreen Cemetery, when the Nisei Veterans Association holds its annual services honoring the Nisei soldiers who died for their country in World War II.

This year's services will culminate a two-year reinterment program of

his heroic achievements in the battlefields of Italy.

The massive monument was purchased and put together in Carrara, Italy, the town which the 442nd Combat Team liberated in the spring of 1945. On top of the monument will be a statue bearing the likeness of Congressional Medal winner, Pfc. Munemori.

Due to prior commitment outside of California, Gen. Mark Clark will be unable to attend the ceremonies. In a letter to the Nisei Veterans Association, General Clark stated:

"I am sorry that I cannot be there for the ceremony, for I have the greatest respect and pride for the Nisei soldiers who fought so gallantly for this country. The 442nd Inf. Bde. was one of the finest I had the privilege to command in World War II."

However, a personal representative of General Clark will be in attendance to deliver the main Memorial Day speech. Lt. Col. John F. Aiso, MIS res., will be the chairman of the ceremonies. Former 1st Lt. Tak Nakaki will command the Nisei Veterans Association's honor guard who will be in full uniform that day.

Many civic notables and dignitaries will attend. Some 50 Gold Star Mothers in the Southern California area will be the honored guests. Approximately 2,500 citizens of this community are expected to witness the memorial and dedication rites.

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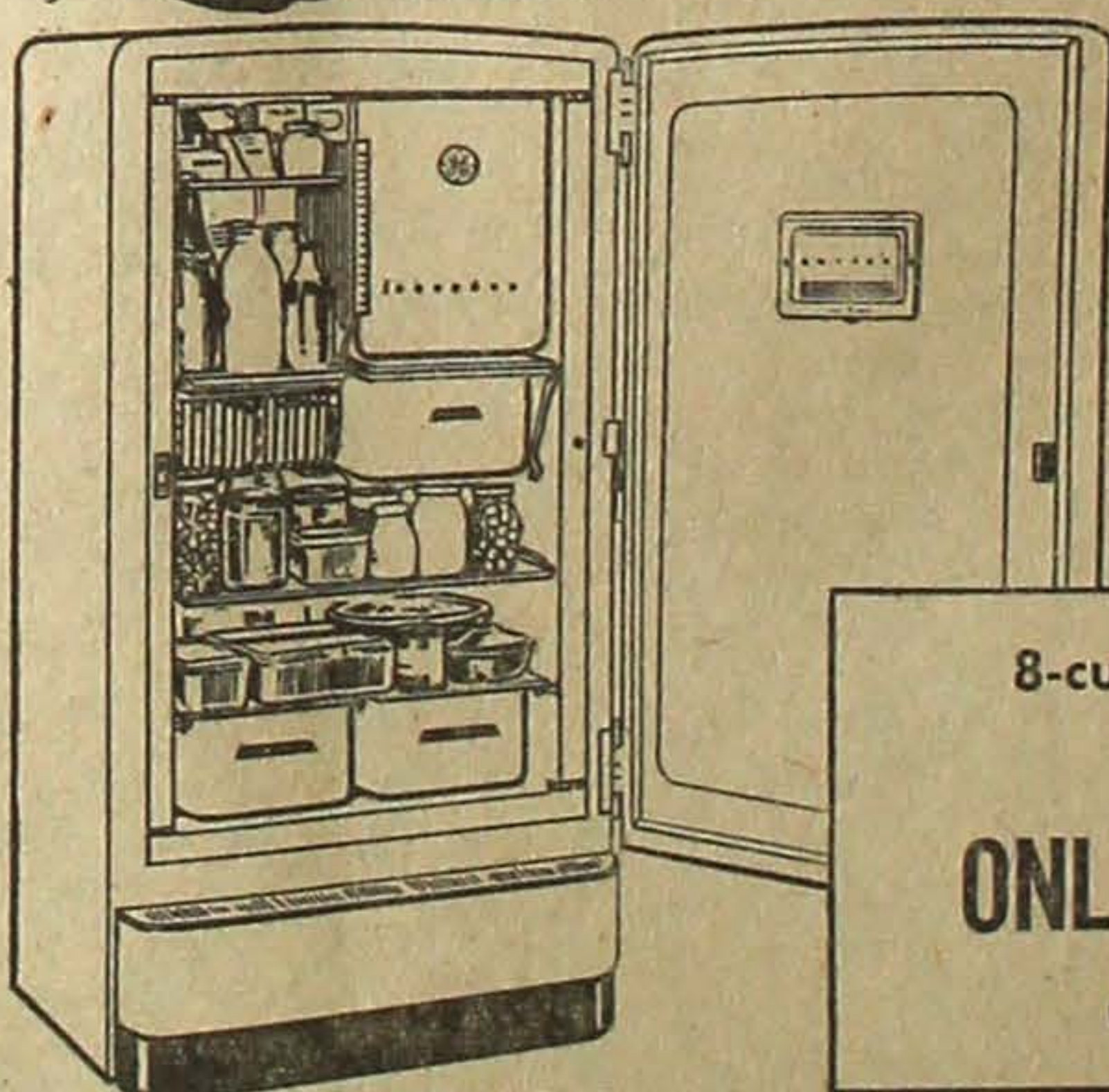

War Dead Due

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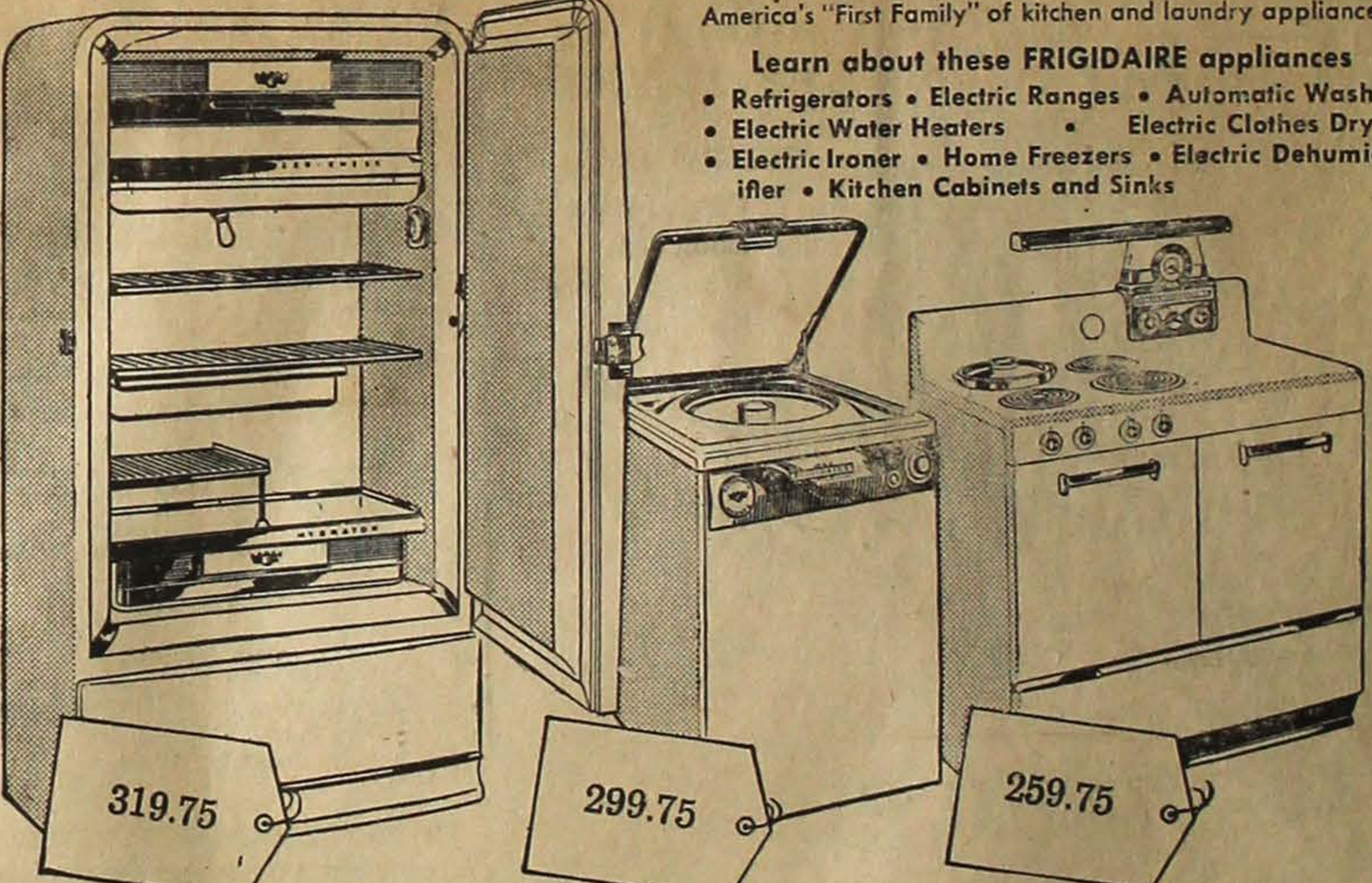
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
