As it was, he landed an eighteen-pound beauty in the course of a day's fishing. He shook all over from joy, exclaiming what a beautiful fish it was, and trying to recap every move the fish made. All the time we were out there he watered his fish to keep it fresh. I don't know about the rest of you guys, but to me seeing Johnny really get a kick out of fishing was a big treat.

I sincerely wish a few more of the better fishermen would take out some real cracker and get the same thrill I did. Of course, a lot of the gripe to that is that cutting bait and playing nursemaid to a cracker is no fun but you've got to expect it. Courtesy on the part of your partner helps a lot. Some guys you may take out just don't realize those things but even if he catches a small one, I'll bet you'll feel that you've had a good day.

A cool week really was a boon to the fresh-water boys. All local streams and creeks produced 1/2 limits but none of my boys came thru with an exciting limit catch. I suppose getting enough elbow room along the creeks is a job in itself and until some of the larger streams get better, there won't be too many that catch. This past week being below normal, I'd suggest you head out to your old reliable producer. It has been too cool for flies, so stick to the pickled eggs. They're always a sure bet. For smaller fish, I'm sure some of the close-in creeks still hold their share of trout.

On the waterfront, I suppose most of you will head for Possession Point. If your "Kicker" is big enough try Double Bluff during an outgoing tide. With King in at Bush Point, some should be showing at the "Bluff". Anyway, candle fish abound and Blackmouth should give out with fast action fishing. I suggest the inner bar at Possession during the outgoing and the outer bar or Skatchett Head on the incoming. The Kings are really feeding as one of our fish had 14 candle fish inside its guts. The fish are prime and should be increasing their weight.

Local waters aren't bad. For those who want to qualify, try Ballard or the Bay — 1st choice Ballard.

Well, you wives who read "Till Fish Do Us Part", no doubt have a better understanding of your husbands. For you Issel, plenty of clams and nori. My dope on "Fuki" have bloomed and gone to seed. Check this column next spring for your hot tip on where to get good "fuki". To you salt chuckers, may I remind you, that a new fishing partner may bring the saltiness out of you. Take a buddy — all they're waiting for is a request from you. I heard one of my old time buddies got skunked last Saturday. But not to mention names, his initials are Sab Ogiishima, the first on my "got skunked" list. By the way, Sab is also vice president of the "host my Buddie's Fish while netting" club. Its prey is Habs Art Louie and 2nd Vice president is Ken Louie. All you have to do to join the club is hit the fish over the head while netting it instead of scooping it in the net. 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PARK DEPARTMENT PLANS SUMMER 'PLAY' PROGRAM FOR YOUTHS IN SEATTLE

It won't be long now until school is out and the Seattle Park Department is busy making plans for its summer recreation program.

The department this week announced that nearly all city playgrounds are now under supervision on a part-time basis and that all fields will be under supervision before school is out. Playground supervision hours are now from 3 to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday. As soon as vacation begins all fields will be open with trained playleaders in charge from 1 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday.

All municipal beaches will open on June 17 with full bath house facilities available and lifeguards on duty. They will remain open seven days a week through Labor Day. Colman Pool will be open on the same schedule as the beaches. Alki Natatorium, damaged in the recent earthquake, will not be reopened this summer.

The Monday following the opening of the beaches, the annual Learn-to-Swim classes for boys and girls will begin. These in turn will be followed shortly by classes in Red Cross lifesaving methods. The four large annual swimming meets will be held as usual. They include the Green Lake Mile Swim, High School Meet, Madrona Swim Carnival and Rainier Pow-Wow Meets. Activities for children at neighborhood playgrounds will include group games and sports, nature study, craftwork and many other leisure time pursuits. Worth-while outdoor fun and recreation in a safe play area under trained leadership will be offered at every playfield six days each week.

Boys and girls from every section of the city will have a chance to spend one day and night at Camp Denny on the Northeast shore of Lake Washington. Activity clubs will be formed at all fields offering merit awards for participation in a host of activities.

A special program for high school students will include two all-city PTA dances at the Civic Auditorium, and playing opportunities in badminton, golf, tennis and swimming. A wide variety of musical recreation will be offered, including four opera and four orchestral concerts in Volunteer Park, a junior vacation orchestra for grade and junior high pupils, and singing and rhythm band groups for junior boys and girls plus vocal choruses for senior women.

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Creative dramatics will be offered at centers in all parts of town for boys and girls of several different age groups. Local playfields will hold many special children's events and stunt days throughout the summer, such as bicycle days, amateur shows, carnivals, Fourth of July celebrations and the like.

The Park Department will issue dates and schedules on these summer activities soon. In the meantime, interested persons may obtain more detailed information by contacting the staff at their nearest Park Department center.

The program featured Haruko and Tomoko Uyeda and their troupe of twenty performers from Chicago. Lloyd H. Joichi was in charge of the gathering.

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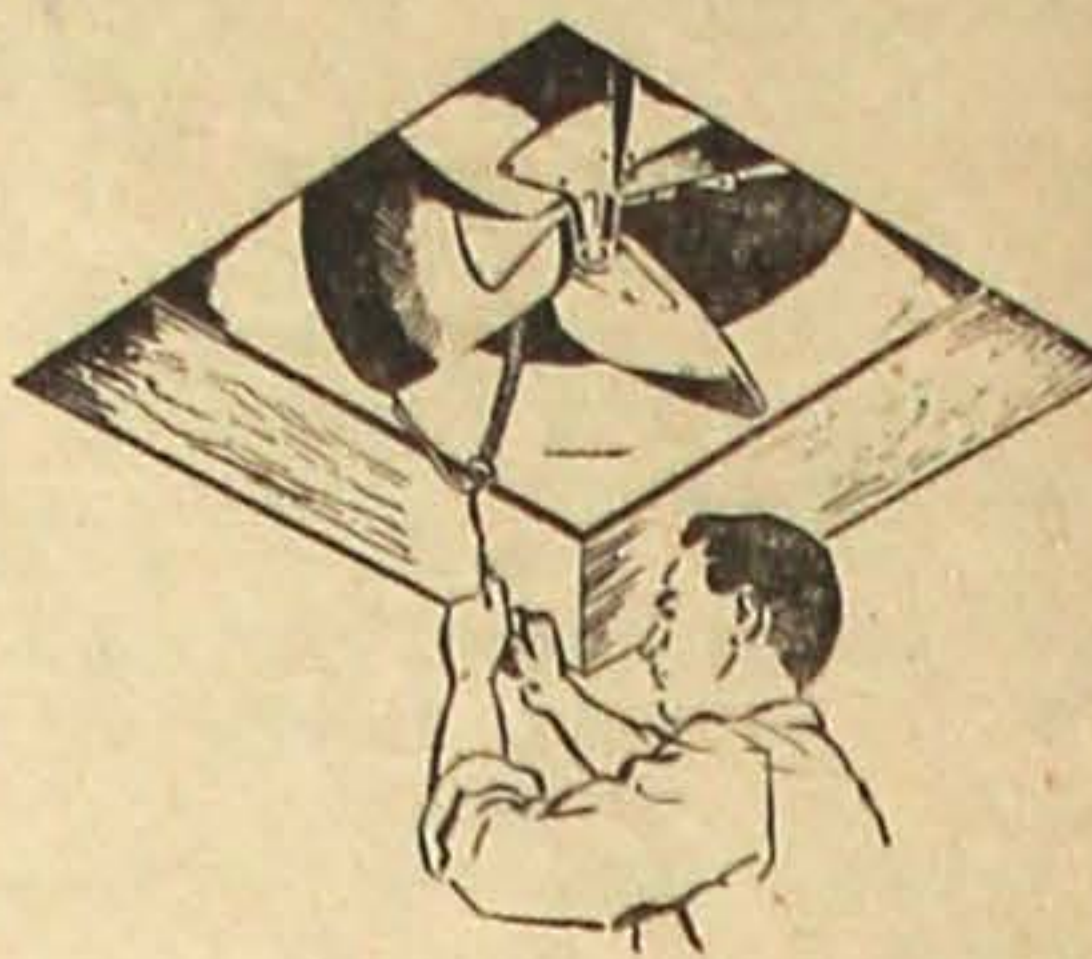

Ever Since Eve . . .

Summertime has meant salad time and plenty of them. On a hot, sticky day when everything at work goes wrong, the buses get stalled, and the whole world in general is dead set against you, relax, and whip yourself up a big bowl of tempting, refreshing salad . . . You'll soon forget what you were mad about. No matter how high the thermometer may zoom up, people will have to eat. There's absolutely no excuse for not knowing how to make a salad. As Prudence Penny will tell you, she goes on to say, "It doesn't take an expert cook to make a salad—just an eye for art, plus a vivid imagination. Any amateur woman cook can make a salad and successfully too" . . . Right now, when all those garden vegetables are sprouting up and waiting to be your table decorations, you should snatch at the opportunity to produce a festive salad bowl . . . Also, girls, salads minus the heavy dressings are extremely kind to Madam's hips, so no wonder they're the most popular foods during the hot season . . . From Prudence Penny's "Salad Bowl", here are a few choice recipes the whole family should certainly enjoy . . .

CHICKEN SALAD

3 cups cubed, cooked chicken
1 1/2 cups diced celery
1 teaspoon salt
3 hard-cooked eggs sliced
3 sweet pickles, chopped
Mayonnaise to blend
Combine ingredients.
Variation — tuna fish.

CRAB LOUIS

On a bed of lettuce, scatter crab meat and crab legs. Garnish with strips of pimiento. On the side of each plate are sliced slices of tomato, stuffed eggs, pickles and olives. A half green pepper is filled with Louis dressing.

CRAB LOUIS DRESSING

1 cup mayonnaise

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The magic of the dye-bath can give your faded wearables of last summer another season's use, as well as new color beauty, and it doesn't matter if they're made of synthetic fibers, such as rayon, or of natural fibers like cotton and linen, according to the Tintex Home Economics Bureau. An all-fabric dye, in a choice of 50 colors, is now available for the purpose.

However, if your slacks, blouses, shorts and other outdoor wearables have become unevenly faded, as is often the case, or if you want to change to an entirely different color, the bureau recommends the use of color remover first. Neither the all-fabric dye nor the color remover, made by the same manufacturer, require boiling. Each is only a dime a package. You can have gloves to match every ensemble in your wardrobe by the same tinting process. If they're white or light-colored, you need not dye, the bureau points out. If they're dark, and you're changing to a new color, use color remover first.

- 1 cup chili sauce
 - 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
 - 1/4 cup chopped sweet pickles
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - Mix together thoroughly.
- ### SALAD BOWL
- Lettuce
 - Spinach
 - Celery and tops, chopped
 - Cauliflower, chopped
 - Carrots
 - Onions
 - Green pepper
 - Turnip
 - Green beans
 - Marinate in French Dressing.
- Rub salad bowl with cut clove of garlic and toss vegetables lightly together with the dressing.
- ### FRENCH DRESSING
- 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
 - 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 - Dash of cayenne
 - 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 2 tablespoons vinegar
 - 1/2 cup salad oil
- Put ingredients in bottle; cover and shake well before using.
- ### SUNSHINE SALAD
- 2 tablespoons gelatin
 - 1/2 cup peach juice
 - 1 cup orange juice
 - 1/4 cup powdered sugar
 - 1/2 cup nut meats
 - 1 cup chopped peaches
 - 1 cup chopped red cherries
 - 1/2 cup Mayonnaise
 - 1 cup sour cream, whipped
- Soak gelatin in cold peach juice, dissolve over hot water. Add orange juice and sugar. When cold and beginning to thicken, add nut meats, chopped fruit, mayonnaise.
- ### AVOCADO SHRIMP SALAD
- 1 head lettuce
 - 1 5/8 oz. can shrimp
 - 3 hard cooked eggs, sliced
 - 1 avocado, sliced
 - 1/4 cup French dressing
- Bread lettuce in bite-size pieces in bowl. Arrange cleaned shrimp, egg slices, and avocado in three separate mounds over lettuce. Pour over French dressing. Toss only slightly and serve a portion of the three ingredients for each salad.

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
