He will decide what care you need. If you should need the help of specialists or hospital care or home nursing, he will arrange for you to get them just as he would do now. The doctors, the hospitals, and all the others that may be called upon to give you services will be paid at rates to which they have already voluntarily agreed.
The only difference is that bills for the services will not be sent to you personally, but they will be paid out of the insurance fund which your contributions have already helped to create.
National health insurance will put no new burden on the national economy. At the present time, the people of this country pay some five and a half billion dollars per year for all medical, hospital, and nursing services, exclusive of the cost of medicine. Instead of practically all of the burden of this falling on the sick when they are least

"GREAT WISDOM"

The other day a friend of mine sent me a copy of a quotation, saying that he was putting a copy of same into his scrapbook. He copied it from a Canadian publication under the title: "Great Wisdom." The whole thing is so well put, and carries such good old fashioned logic, that I thought you might like to have it, too. The message of the whole piece packs a genuine wallop. I'll let you have it, as follows:
"There are a few great documents, which contain so much wisdom that they can bear endless repeating. Here is an example: 'I place economy among the first and most important virtues, and public debt as the greatest of dangers to be feared. To preserve our independence, we must not let our rulers load us with perpetual debt.'
Rigid Economy
"We must make our choice between economy and liberty, or profusion and servitude. If we run into such debts, we must be taxed in our meat and drink, in our necessities and in our comforts, in our labors and in our amusements. If we can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people under the pretense of caring for them, they will be happy.
"The same prudence which in private life would forbid our paying money for unexplained projects, forbids it in the disposition of public money. We are endeavoring to reduce the government to the practice of rigid economy to avoid burdening the people and arming the Magistrate with a patronage of money which might be used to corrupt the principles of our government."
No Reactionary
"The man who wrote this was not some reactionary believer in an old system of society. He was no enemy of the masses of the workers. He was not a great capitalist, trying to maintain special privilege, nor was he the heir of a great fortune trying to preserve it. He was the first of the great democrats of North America, a man whose name is commemorated and revered by all believers in human liberty.
"His is a name permanently linked in history with the struggle against oppression. The words were written by Thomas Jefferson." There you have it in full force. The

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Discloses Need Of Sanitarians In This State

Sanitarians are needed for positions with the state merit system it was announced today by Dr. Harold A. Lang, Supervisor of the State of Washington Personnel Board. Several vacancies exist in state and county health departments for both beginning and senior level sanitarians.

Applicants are required to have a B. S. degree from an accredited college or university. Major courses must have been in agriculture, bacteriology, dairy science, engineering, public health, veterinary medicine, or basic natural or physical science related to the public health sanitation field. Applicants for the senior level positions must have had two years full-time paid experience in an official public health agency in the field of environmental sanitation in addition to a degree. One year of graduate study in public health, or a science field closely related to public health sanitation may be substituted for one year of required experience.

The position of General Sanitarian, salary range \$250 to \$310, requires no previous experience and is a beginning level job in local health departments. The Senior General Sanitarian, salary range \$280 to \$340, work under very general supervision and have considerable responsibility for planning and community contacts.

Dr. Lang pointed out that all jobs under the state merit system are filled on a non-partisan basis by appointment from eligible lists established after examinations. Retirement pay, vacation and sick leave with pay, and promotions based on efficient performance offer permanent employees an excellent opportunity for a worthwhile career in the public service.

Applications and information may be obtained from the office of the State Personnel Board, 1209 Smith Tower, Seattle 4, or from state or local health departments. All applications must be submitted to the Personnel Board office by 5 p.m., August 1. Examinations for the positions will be conducted shortly after that date.

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'Hello' Girls Sought Here

The closing date for applying for these positions is July 11. Written examinations will be given later in July.

In addition to the tests for telephone operators, examinations will be conducted for Junior Clerks (jobs in Olympia), and for typists, stenographers, statistical clerks, statisticians, and for Junior Labor Market Analysts. 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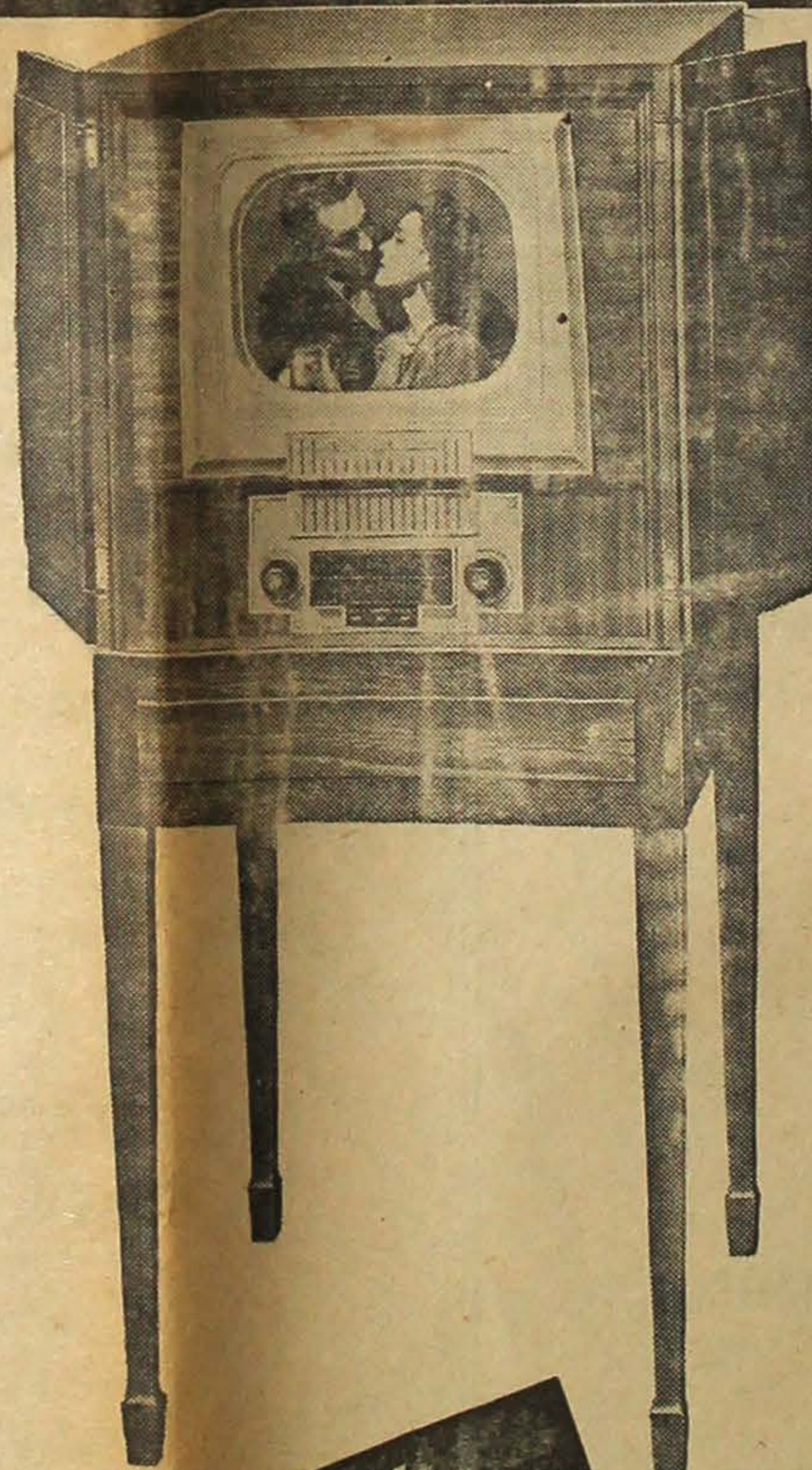
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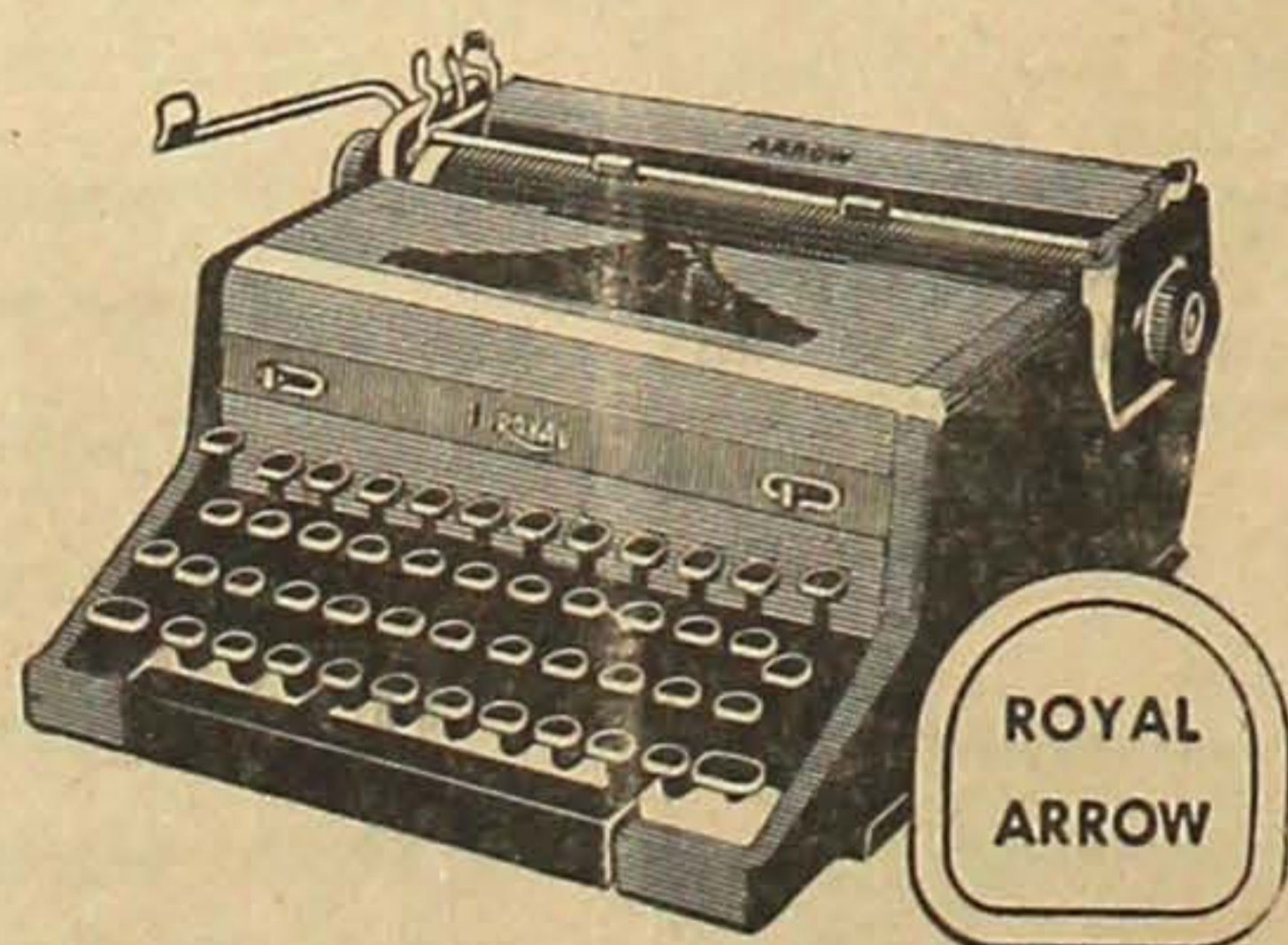
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
