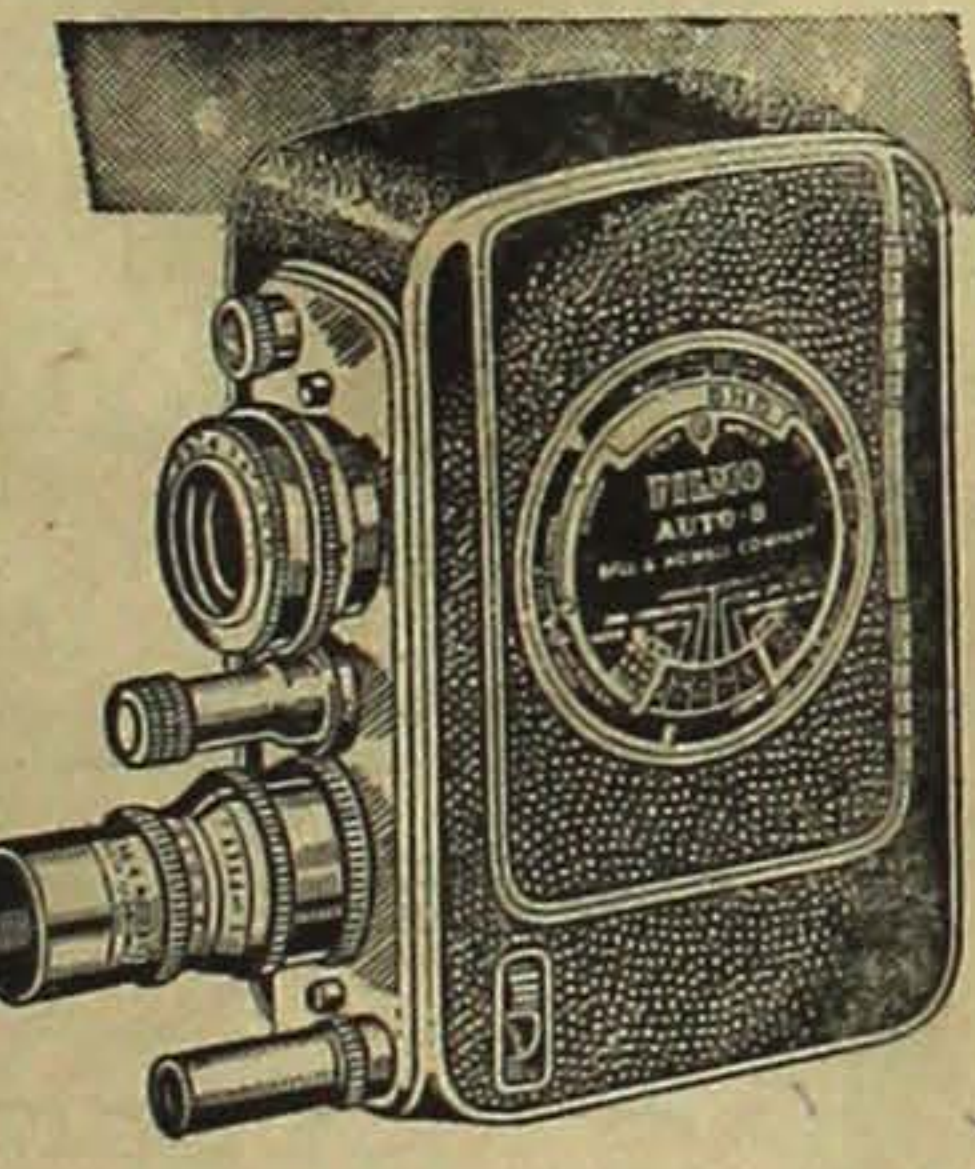

## Park Concerts Will Begin Here Sunday, July 10

Two important "firsts" will be observed by Seattle people who attend the opening Park Department concert in Volunteer Park on Sunday, July 10. The presentation of Sigmund Romberg's "New Moon" will be the first in a series of light opera concerts and the production will be the first given upon the Park Department's new concert stage.

This new type of acoustical stage is regarded as superior to any previous type of outdoor bandshell, according to Paul V. Brown, Park Superintendent. The stage was designed by Philip Jacobsen, director of the audio-visual department at the University of Washington, and executed by the Park Department's own staff of architects, engineers and craftsmen.

Each section of the proscenium, wings and backdrop of the stage is individually designed and constructed to focus sound upon microphones placed in strategic locations. The acoustical design and the electrical sound equipment were developed as an integrated unit to provide maximum fidelity in reproducing the music and distributing it equally over the broad audience area.

The stage is 90 by 35 feet in size with a playing area of 50 by 30 feet. A foam rubber floor covering will be used over the entire playing area to reduce incidental noise to a minimum. The stage is large and strong enough to accommodate full opera productions if the public shows sufficient interest in this type of music to justify such presentations.

While stout enough to support hundreds of persons or such ponderous operatic props as a horse and rider or a carriage, the stage is also portable. Each part of the structure is assembled of demountable units. Its foundation is made up of tubular steel sections capable of being disassembled, expanded or contracted. Each foundation section is equipped with built-in screw jacks which make it possible to set up the stage on varying types of terrain without extensive leveling operations. "Our aim in making the stage

Pvt. Shiozawa was killed April, 1945, while fighting near Florentino, Italy. He was born in Idaho Falls and graduated from high school in that city before enlisting in the army at the age of 18.

Surviving, besides his father, Chikatsu Shiozawa, of Layton, Utah, are six brothers and a sister, including: George, Pocastello, an active JACL member in the Intermountain area; Kenji, Logan; Shiori, Washington, D. C.; and Mrs. Wallace E. Grant Jr., Honolulu.

Miss Ide, 20, a graduate of Marshall high school, is a chemistry student at the University of Illinois in Urbana. She was born in Vancouver, B. C.

Miss Kita, 17, a recent graduate of Hyde Park high school, is formerly of Calexico, California, and plans to attend the undergraduate division of the University of Illinois at Navy Pier, Chicago, this fall.

The encampment, which will be held for six weeks beginning the first week of July, at Fieldston School, New York City, is sponsored by the National Ethical Union.

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## T-4 Sawada Services to be Held This Saturday at Presbyterian

Funeral services for T-4 George Katsuya Sawada will be held from 1 p.m. Saturday, July 9, at the Japanese Presbyterian Church, 522 9th Ave. So., followed by a military burial at the Veterans Memorial Cemetery at Washelli. The Rev. Paul F. McConkey of the First Presbyterian Church will conduct the services.

The Seattle Nisei was born on Feb. 21, 1915 at Hilo, Hawaii, but came to the United States at an early age and received education here. After he was graduated by Franklin high school, he entered the University of Washington and received his bachelor's degree in 1941. A brilliant student, he was pledged to Pi Mu Chi, pre-medical honorary. He was a versatile athlete playing baseball with the local Taiyo Athletic Club, and won a minor W for swimming at the University of Washington.

T-4 Sawada married Miss Yuri Takahashi at Hunt, Idaho in February, 1943.

Sawada volunteered for the service from Hunt, Idaho, and was inducted on June 12, 1943. He was

assigned to the Medical Detachment of the 442nd Central Postal Directory and served with the 3rd Battalion Medics. He was killed by an enemy sniper on July 5, 1944 near Hill 140 while evacuating a wounded comrade.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Yuri Sawada of Chicago; his father, Shinsaku Sawada, 115 18th Ave., Seattle; 2 brothers, Hiroshi Sawada of Chicago and Denny Yasuhara of Spokane; and a sister, Mrs. Katherine Tanaka of Chicago.

Pallbearers will be Don Kazama, Robert Handa, Yoshito Mizuta, Ben Selke, Shiro Iwana, Frank Okazaki, Saburo Ogishima and Iwao Kawakami.

The Rev. Masao Hirata will be the chairman of the services at the Japanese Presbyterian church.

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## DEMO CHIEF VOWS TO HELP JACL-ADC ON ENI LEGISLATION

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 6—State Democratic Committee Chairman Oliver J. Carter, on a brief visit to the State Capital conferred with JACL ADC Regional Directors Sam I. Ishikawa and Joe Grant Masaoka on means whereby action on the Judd Bill and Walter's resolution for equality in naturalization could be speeded up in Washington.

Carter, a former state senator, who had always been helpful on problems relating to Nisei, agreed to contact William Boyd, executive vice-chairman of the National Democratic Committee in Washington, so that Boyd might work with Mike Masaoka in exploring every avenue for action on these two measures during this session if possible.

Ishikawa and Masaoka were in Sacramento on June 23 and 24 to meet with Assemblymen and Senators on some forty-four measures affecting Japanese Americans, specifically and generally. Of direct concern to Japanese Americans, among various measures were those relating to reduction of alien's sport fishing license fee from \$25 to \$10, repeal of the alien land law, and the creation of a fair employment practices commission.

Because of the last-minute rush of legislative business due to adjournment in about a week, assemblymen suggested it would be more appropriate to defer extensive discussion until after the session had been concluded.

Slated for this postponed meeting with friendly state legislators are ten items which were set forth by Ishikawa and Masaoka. This needed legislation for Japanese Americans includes:

1. Eliminating cemetery discrimination in refusing burials to Japanese and other minorities.
2. Restoration to Issei of business licenses formerly held by evacuees but which now require examinations.
3. Inclusion of Issei and other aliens in pension payments, if otherwise qualified.
5. Release of payments withheld on unemployment insurance due to evacuees being detained in centers.
6. Return of monies paid by defendants in settlement of escheat suits under the Alien Property Act.
7. Deficiency appropriation to re-imburse evacuees for Brandy Pool dividend checks issued during evacuation period by State Department of Agriculture but cashed by unauthorized persons.
8. Amendment to the Alien Land Law to include a Statute of Limitations.
9. Amendment to the Alien Land Law to affirm validity of property title held by Japanese Americans.
10. Extension of authority in the Labor Code of California to cover agricultural labor and regulate wages, hours, and working conditions for women and minors in the industries handling farm products after harvest.

Since the 1950 session is by law required to deal with budget items, plans will have to be mapped for the 1951 session in which these various measures desirable for the relief of Japanese Americans may be pushed. Legislators offered to meet with JACL ADC representatives at an appropriate time and place to discuss strategy on these state legislative measures.

## Author Sets Up Family Home

PERKASIE, Pa., July 6—Pearl S. Buck, noted author, has established a family home for infants and children of Asian-American birth, it was learned this week from the Midwest JACL ADC office.

Neither an institution nor an orphanage, this adjunct to Miss Buck's own home will be called Welcome House. A couple serves as "father and mother," while Miss Buck and her husband, Richard J. Walsh, president of the John Day Publishing Company, act as "grandparents". Children of Asian-American parents, unable to find adoptive homes, will be warmly welcomed, according to Miss Buck, who feels strongly that these children are important for the future and should be given the opportunity for home, affection and a good education.

The purpose of this father-and-mother home is to provide a warm family atmosphere for these children of mixed ancestry, and in Miss Buck's own words, "of educating them not only to their fullest gifts, but also with the feeling of pride in their double heritage — (that) they will grow up without any sense of inferiority and on the contrary with a feeling of self-confidence and rejoicing in the fact that they belong to two sides of the world."

Welcome House is situated in a friendly community free from prejudice, and is prepared to accept a few more children up to seven or eight years of age.

## Bring Your Child To Health Clinic

The Child Health Clinic at Neighborhood House, 304 18th South, will operate the fourth Wednesday afternoon of each month only, beginning in July, announced Dr. John Wilkey of the Seattle and King County Department of Public Health. If the clinic becomes too crowded, Dr. Wilkey said, additional clinic days will be added.

The July clinic, therefore, will be on July 27, beginning at 1 p.m., and the August clinic on Aug. 24.

The clinic, which serves all infants and small children, was started by the Jackson St. Community Council as the result of a need expressed by the people for a neighborhood clinic to which mothers might take their children for a regular physical check-up.

In November, 1948, the Health Department agreed to help out with the clinic and assigned a doctor and a nurse to examine the children and advise parents regarding the children's care.

All parents residing in the area are urged to use these services.

portable is to make provision for transferring the concerts to a different location should public interest and attendance make the Volunteer site inadequate." Brown said. "With this equipment it would be possible to shift the concerts to the High School Memorial Stadium or some other location where a greatly expanded audience could be accommodated."

Opera concerts will be presented by the 50-member Seattle Summer Company, recruited from the ranks of local singers at public auditions. The full symphonic orchestra concerts which will alternate with opera presentations at Volunteer will be presented by members of the Seattle Symphony. Both opera company and symphony orchestra are under the direction of Gustave Stern. All Volunteer concerts will start at 3:30 p.m.

In addition to the opera and symphony concerts at Volunteer Park, the Park Department will present four band concerts at other locations during the summer. Jules Radinsky will conduct these band concerts.

Dates for the Volunteer series are: "New Moon," July 10; Symphony, July 17; "Gondoliers," July 24; Symphony, July 31; "Naughty Marietta," August 7; Symphony, August 14; Symphony, August 21; "Merry Widow," August 28.

The four band concerts will be presented as follows: American Legion Americanization Program, Woodland Park, July 4; West Seattle Picnic, Lincoln Park, July 31; Rainier District Pow-Wow, Seward Park, August 7; Alaska-Yukon Pioneers' Picnic, Woodland Park, August 14.

## Action on ENI Bill Seen

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—What may be the first major break in a jam on immigration and naturalization in the Senate occurred last Friday with the appointment of a special subcommittee to study all bills on the subject introduced this session.

Sen. J. Howard McGrath, (D., R. I.), chairman of the Democratic national committee and proponent of liberalized immigration and naturalization laws, was named chairman of the special subcommittee. Other members are Sen. James O. Eastland, (D., Miss.), and Sen. Forrest C. Donnell, (R., Mo.).

Mike Masaoka, national JACL ADC legislative director, said the formation of the subcommittee "is the most heartening news we've had since the House acted favorably on the Judd bill and Walter resolution".

Both of these measures will be studied by the subcommittee.

The Judd bill, passed by the House March 1, calls for admission of a limited number of immigrants from

all Asian countries, and extension of the privilege of naturalization to all legal immigrants. The Walters resolution, approved without a dissenting vote by the House June 8, provides only that no person shall be denied the right of naturalization because of race.

Naming the subcommittee is the first definite move in the Senate to take some formal action on immigration and naturalization bills this session.

"The appointment of the subcommittee certainly seems to indicate the Senate intends to act," Masaoka said. "It is possible the committee may hold public hearings on the JACL-backed immigration and naturalization laws, a move the JACL strongly favors."

want control. They aim to be in the saddle. If government handouts and subsidies will win more votes, then subsidies are just the thing for everybody. There's hardly a thought about who's going to pay for the subsidies. The impression is left that they are "something-for-nothing." We, the American people, have got to start questioning some of these ideas.

**Another Nostrum**

There's the Department of Agriculture, for instance. For 10 these many years the USDA on the whole has turned in a great performance, both for the farmers and for the whole nation. Then came the war and guaranteed prices, at a time when prices of other things were being controlled. But apparently the USDA has fallen in love with support prices, incentive payments, and subsidies.

Mr. Brannan, the Secretary of Agriculture, has worked up a plan to keep these subsidies going—at no-telling-what cost. The magic nostrum offered as the "Brannan Plan" would keep some kinds of prices low to some people, tend to keep other kinds of prices high to other people. And the cost could run into untold billions of dollars, all of which would be added to the high cost of living, through taxes.

**Aid for Everybody**

So, Mr. Brannan's men have been working quickly but energetically. They have been passing the word around that all farmers are going on the rocks, unless the government takes over with permanent subsidies. Then they also argue that if the idea of permanent subsidies is not accepted now, a bit of depression will drive Congress to it. In short, we are to get our government management come what may, whether we like it or not.

Who's to be favored? If the farmer, what about the steel worker? We must have steel for machinery

with which to raise our food. The same line of reasoning would say we must therefore subsidize the steel worker. Already the long-faced "securocrats" have imagined that without federal aid for teachers our schools will collapse, and without subsidies for doctors and "compulsory" health insurance we're sure to be a sick nation? Who's next?

## 'Once a Year'

CHICAGO, Ill., July 6.—The JACL Midwest District Council should meet only once a year rather than semi-annually as provided for in the MDC constitution, according to an amendment submitted by the Cleveland chapter, hosts to the MDC convention to be held on September 17 and 18, when the amendment will be acted upon.

Howard Tashima, Cleveland JACL head, described how distances between MDC chapters create a large time and expense problem difficult to meet by some chapters. Moreover, he explained, the MDC chairman and his board are authorized to call special or emergency meetings if necessary, so that two meetings a year should not be mandatory.

MDC delegates also agreed to raise the per capita dues from 10¢ per year per JACL member to 20¢.

Other business discussed at the recently concluded MDC meeting held at the Sherman Hotel in Chicago included evacuation claims services rendered by MDC chapters, chapter activities, and reports by Tats Kushiida, regional JACL ADC representative; Mike Masaoka, national JACL ADC legislative director; Harold Gordon, Midwest chairman of the 1000 Club; and Dr. Randolph M. Sakada, chairman of the 1950 national convention board.

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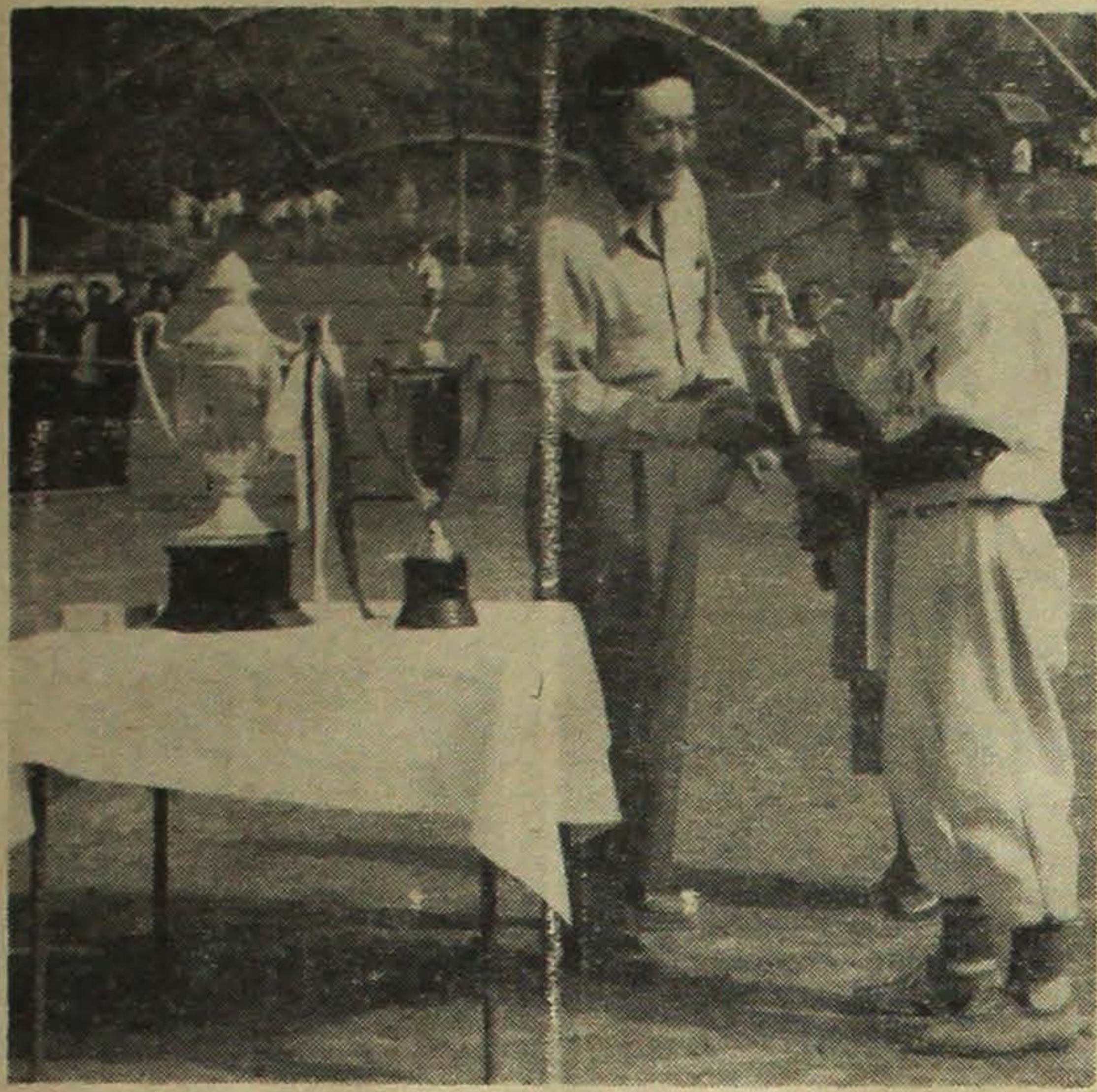
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# Seattle Veterans Again Win NW Baseball Crown

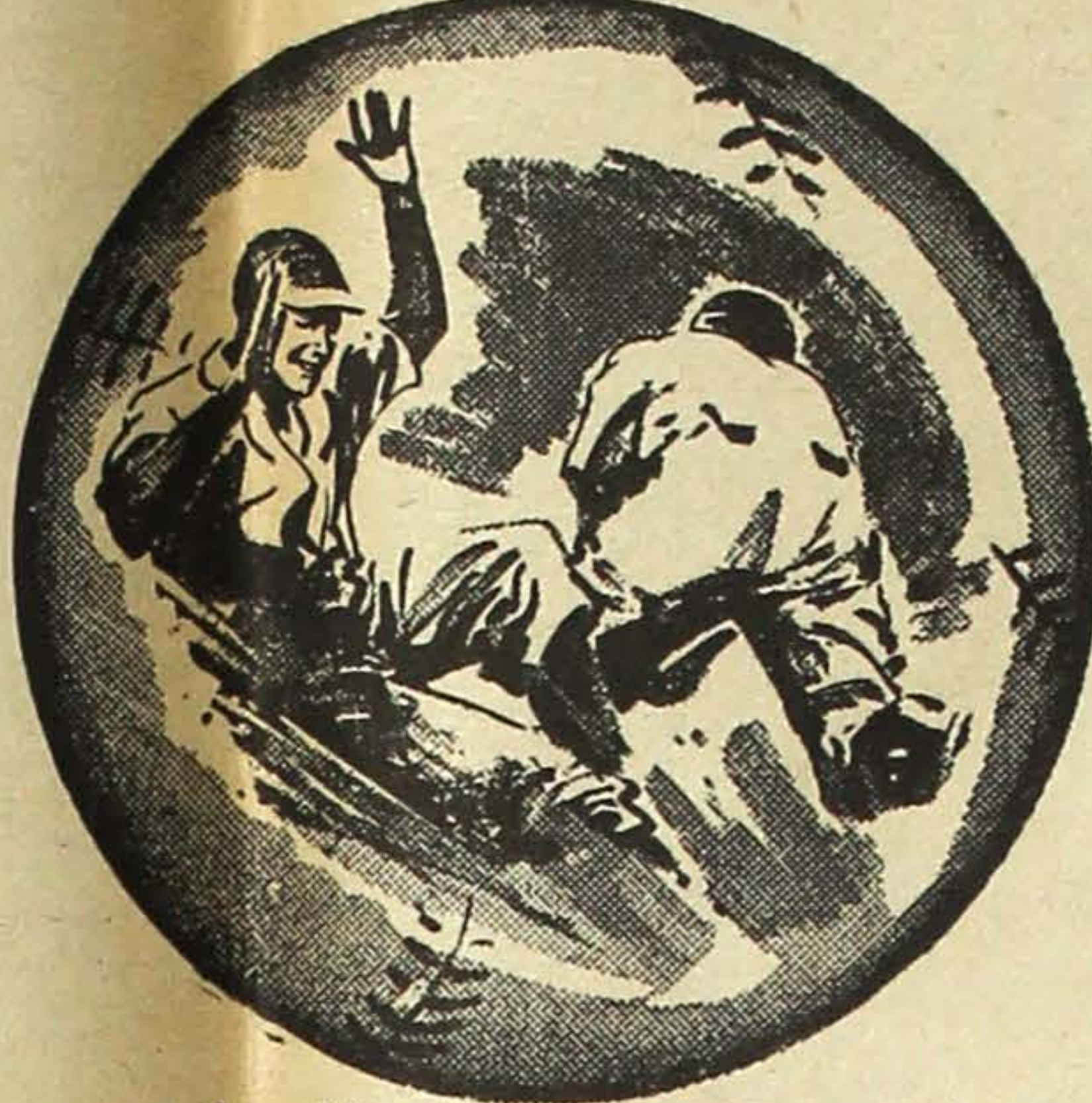

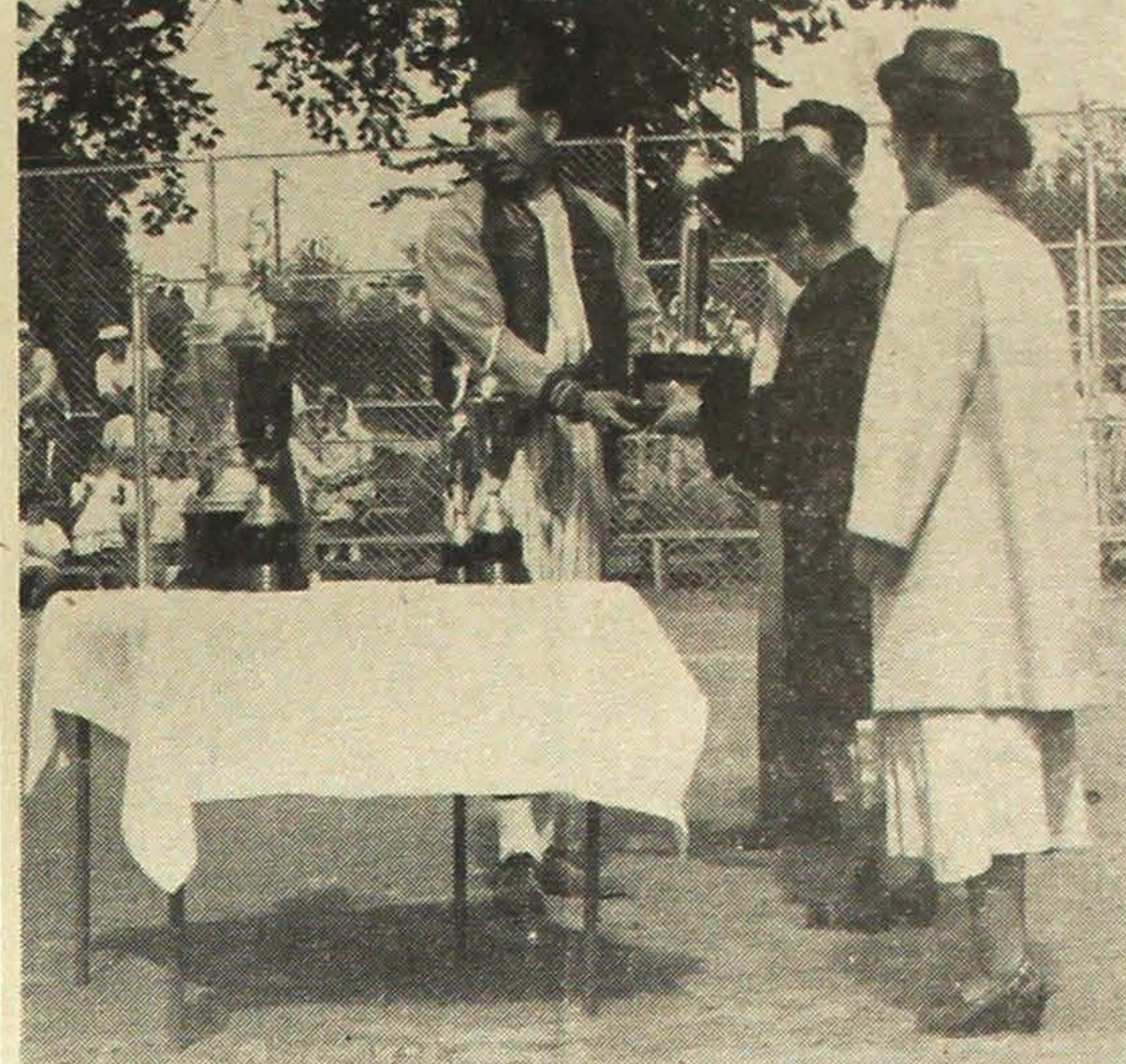
Seattle's ex-GI's polished off Hood River, 12 to 0, in the championship game. "Joker" Shimizu, former Army hurler,

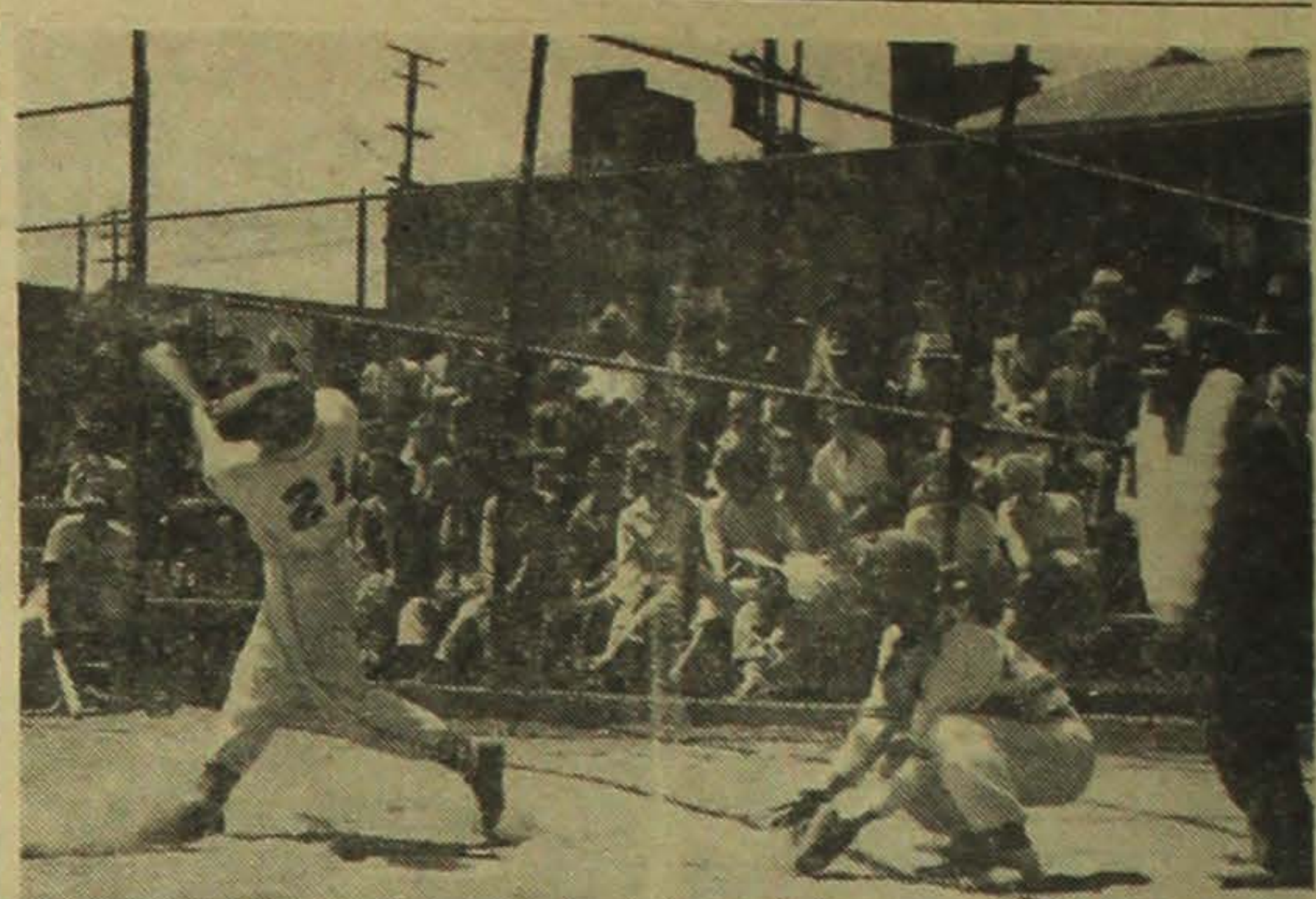

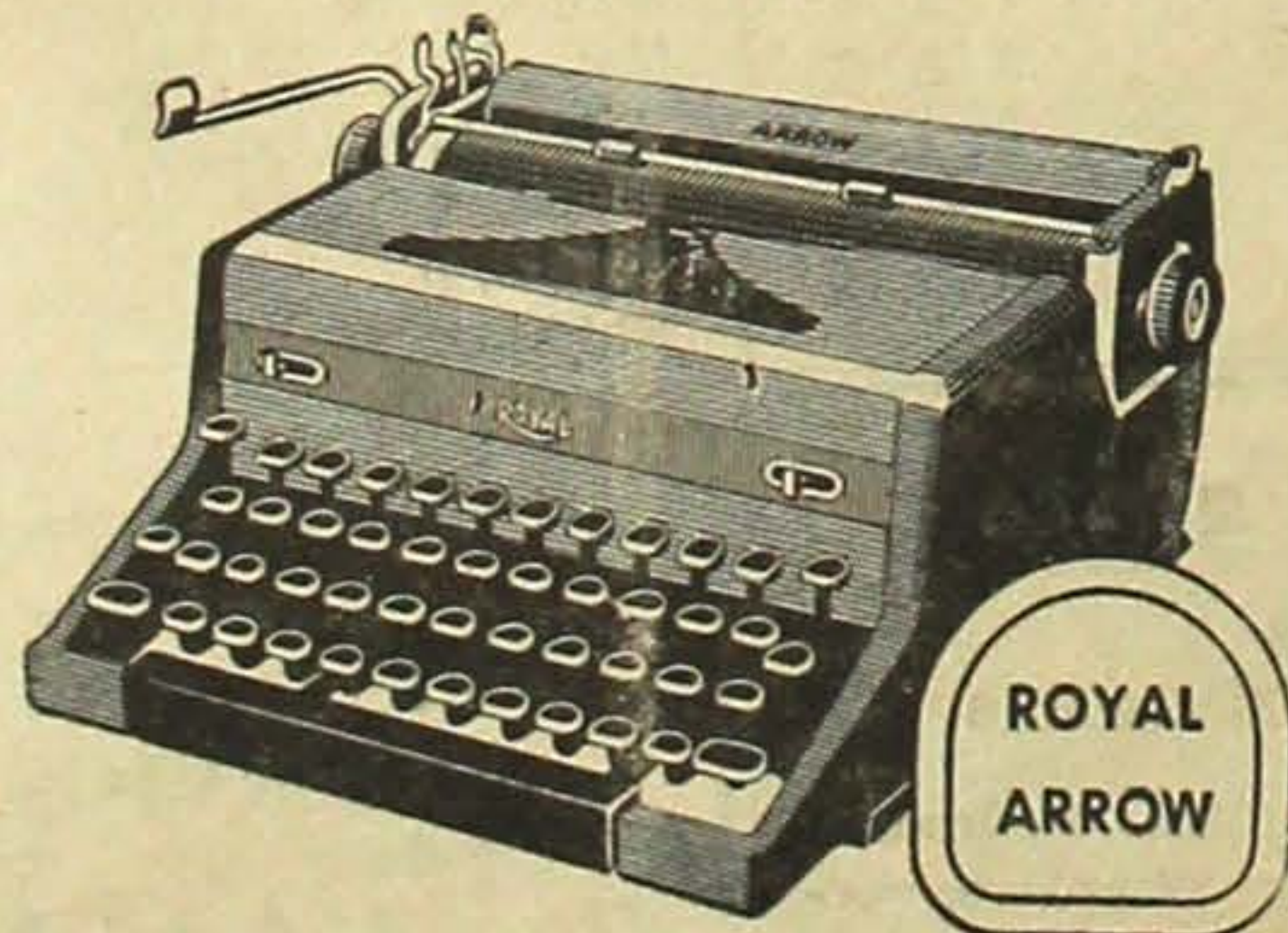
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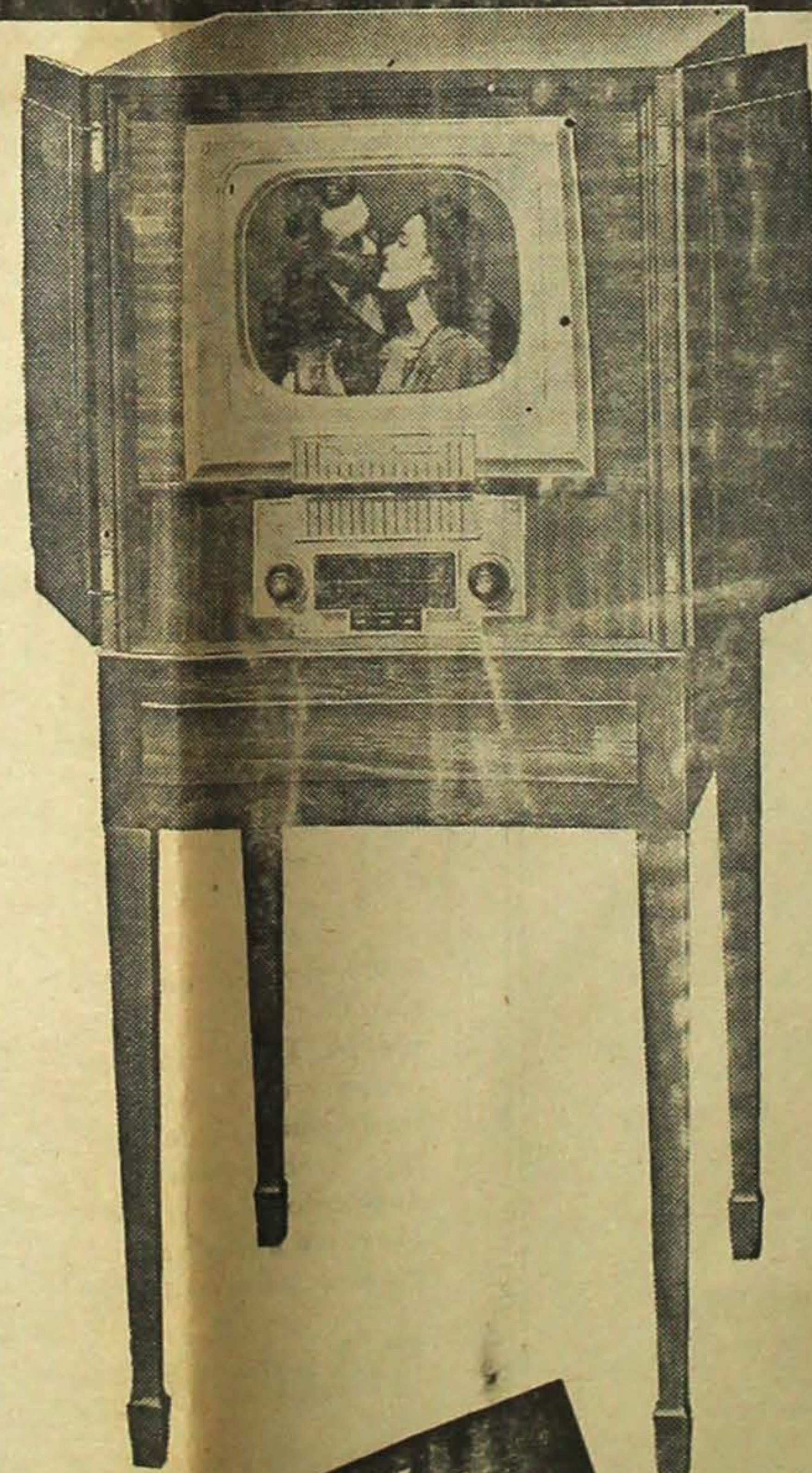
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
