

1. Eliminating cemetery discrimination in refusing burials to Japanese and other minorities.

2. Restoration to Issei of business licenses formerly held by evacuees but which now require examinations.

3. Inclusion of Issei and other aliens in pension payments, if otherwise qualified. 5. Release of payments with-

held on unemployment insurance due to evacuees being detained in centers.

6. Return of monies paid by defendants in settlement of escheat suits under the Alien Property

7. Deficiency appropriation to re-imburse evacuees for Brandy Pool dividend checks issued during evacuation period by State Department of Agriculture but cashed by unauthorized persons.

8. Amendment to the Alien Land Law to include a Statute of Limitations.

9. Amendment to the Alien Land Law to affirm validity of property title held by Japanese Americans.

10. Extension of authority in the Labor Code of California to cover agricultural labor and regulate wages, hours, and working conditions for women and minors in the industries handling farm products after harvest.
