After midnight, Jackson Street is like a beaten-up prostitute; she is gruesomely "purty" and spiritually lost, down and out.

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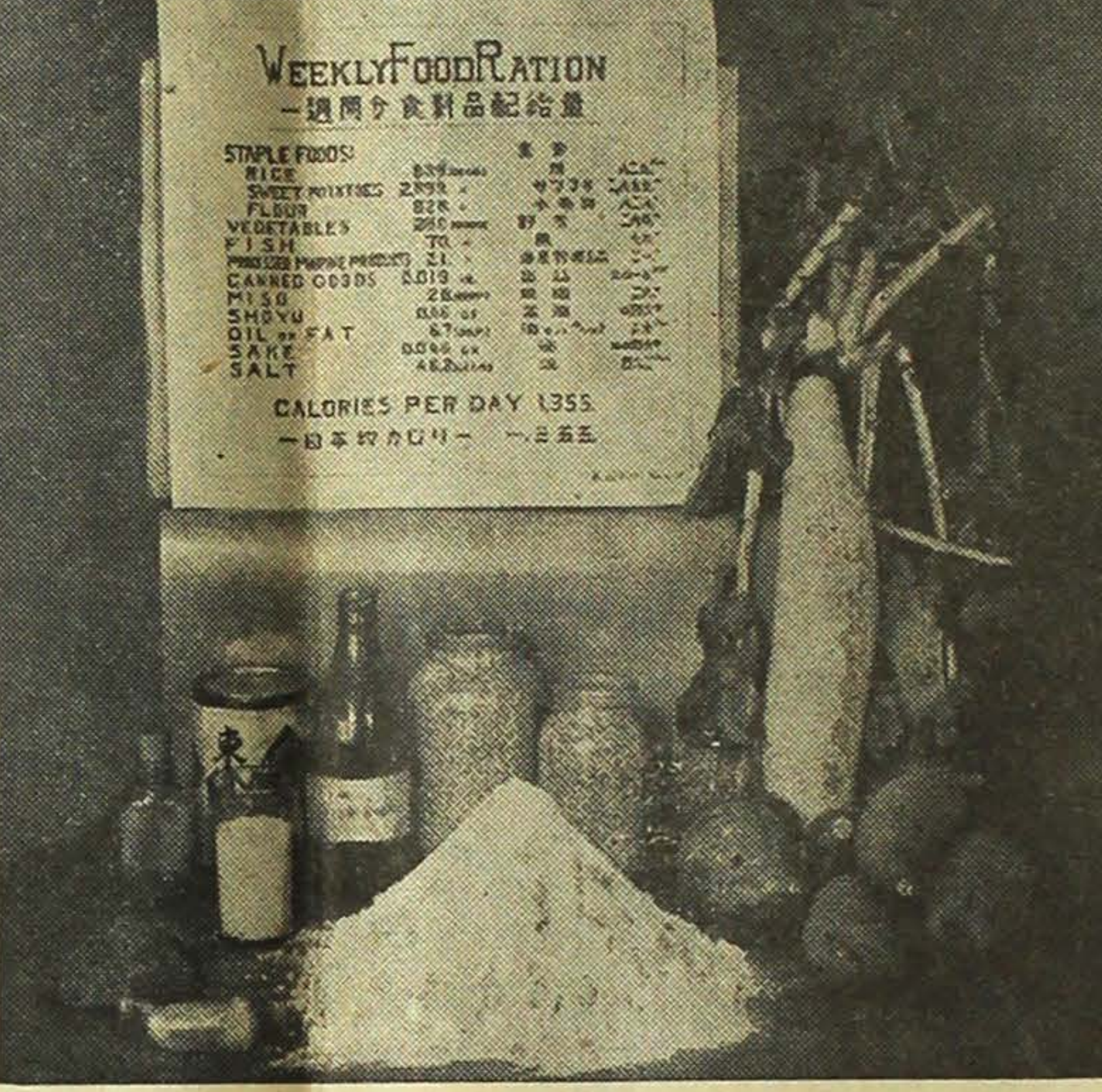
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U. W. Alumni Picnic Ducats Ready; Event to be July 31 at Gaffney's

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Gilbert and Sullivan Production To be Shown at Volunteer Park

Gilbert and Sullivan's "The Gondoliers" will be presented at Volunteer Park at 3:30 p.m. this Sunday, July 24, as the second in the series of light opera concerts being presented by the Seattle Park Department.

Seven principals and an ensemble of 50 voices will take part in the production, accompanied by members of the Seattle Symphony. Both singers and orchestra are under the direction of Gustave Stern.

Public response to the first opera concert on July 10 was enthusiastic. A questionnaire distributed at the first concert revealed that 98 per cent of those who replied liked this type of musical performance.

"The Gondoliers" deals with the adventures of two young and handsome Venetian boatmen, Marco and Giuseppe Palmieri, though living as blood brothers, one of them is an adopted child and the presumed heir to the throne of

Barataria. The catch is that the old father has died and no one knows which of the brothers is the prince.

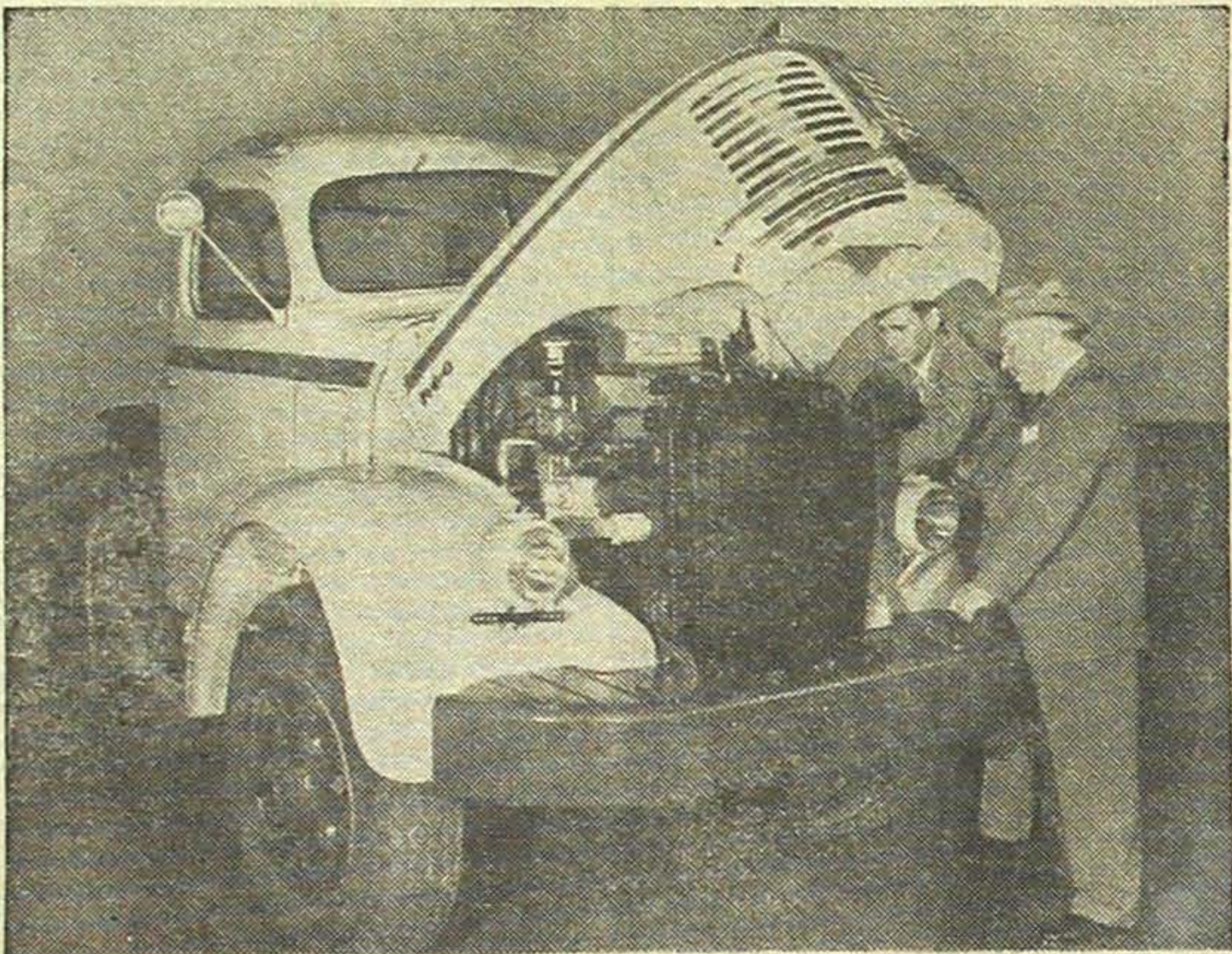
Around this plot are woven the rollicking satire of W. S. Gilbert's lyrics and the charm and gaiety of Sir Arthur Sullivan's tunes. The thread of the story will be narrated by Frank Kinkaid, while the music will be sung by the Seattle Summer Opera Company.

The principal roles in "The Gondoliers" will be sung by Jean Herbert (Gianetta), Wilma Snellenberg (Tessa), Nancy Moore (Casilda), James Kaufer (Luiz), Charles Trombley (Don Alhambra), Walter Snellenberg (Marco Palmieri) and Edwin Kissack (Giuseppe Palmieri).

Next on the Volunteer series will be a full symphony concert on Sunday, July 31. Members of the Seattle Symphony Orchestra comprise the Volunteer group, which also will be conducted by Gustave Stern.

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New 'Gold Comet' Truck Power Plant Features Removable Cylinder Sleeves

LANSING, Mich. — A six-cylinder, gasoline truck engine, described as the most powerful of its size ever built, has been introduced by Reo Motors, Inc., pioneer truck manufacturer.

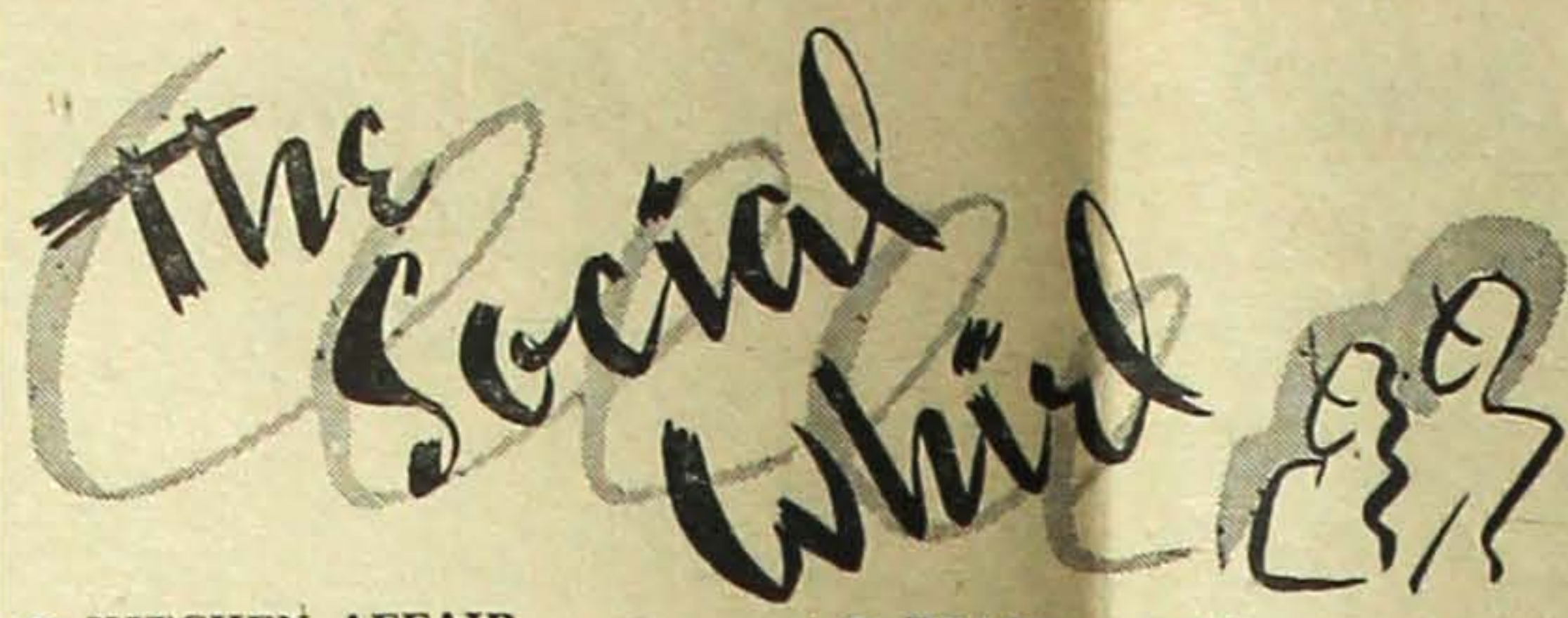
The all-new "Gold Comet" engine "develops more usable horsepower than any other six- or eight-cylinder gasoline truck engine of comparable displacement" and was designed to "set entirely new standards for truck performance under all operating conditions," the Reo announcement said.

The "lifetime" engine features the wet-sleeve principle with removable cylinders. Only lack of normal care and maintenance can shorten the Gold Comet's life span, Reo reported. The cylinders, in the form of sleeves, may be replaced quickly and inexpensively, eliminating a major repair job if a cylinder wall becomes scored or damaged.

Easily installed without special tools, a relatively inexpensive new sleeve-piston and ring assembly results in "what amounts to a brand new engine," Reo said.

The new Reo engine has been designed for heavy-duty, high speed service, providing more speed and power with greater fuel economy, greater endurance and far easier maintenance, the Lansing firm disclosed. It "easily develops" 140 horsepower at its governed speed of 3200 RPM. Pistons and sleeves are all of standard size and interchangeable.

Result of a \$5,000,000.00, three-year program of engineering, testing and development, and the purchase of specially-designed precision production machines, the Gold Comet will power Reo's Model E-22 trucks and tractors with gross weight ranges of 17,000 lbs. to 38,000 lbs.

Passengers using the Powell Street cars were provided with bus service from the Hastings Street line.

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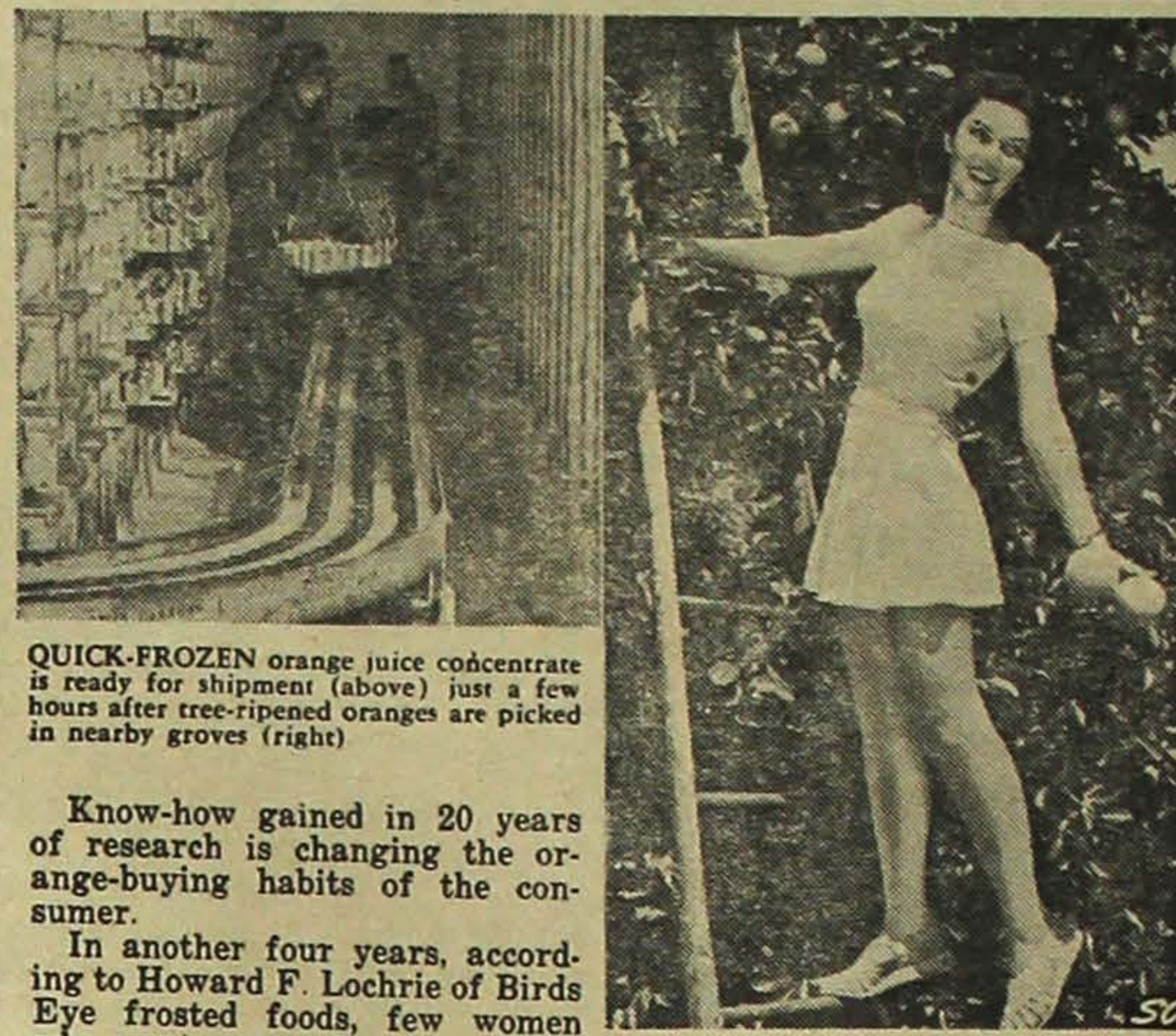


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Predicts Oranges Will Disappear From Grocery Stores In Four Years

Know-how gained in 20 years of research is changing the orange-buying habits of the consumer.

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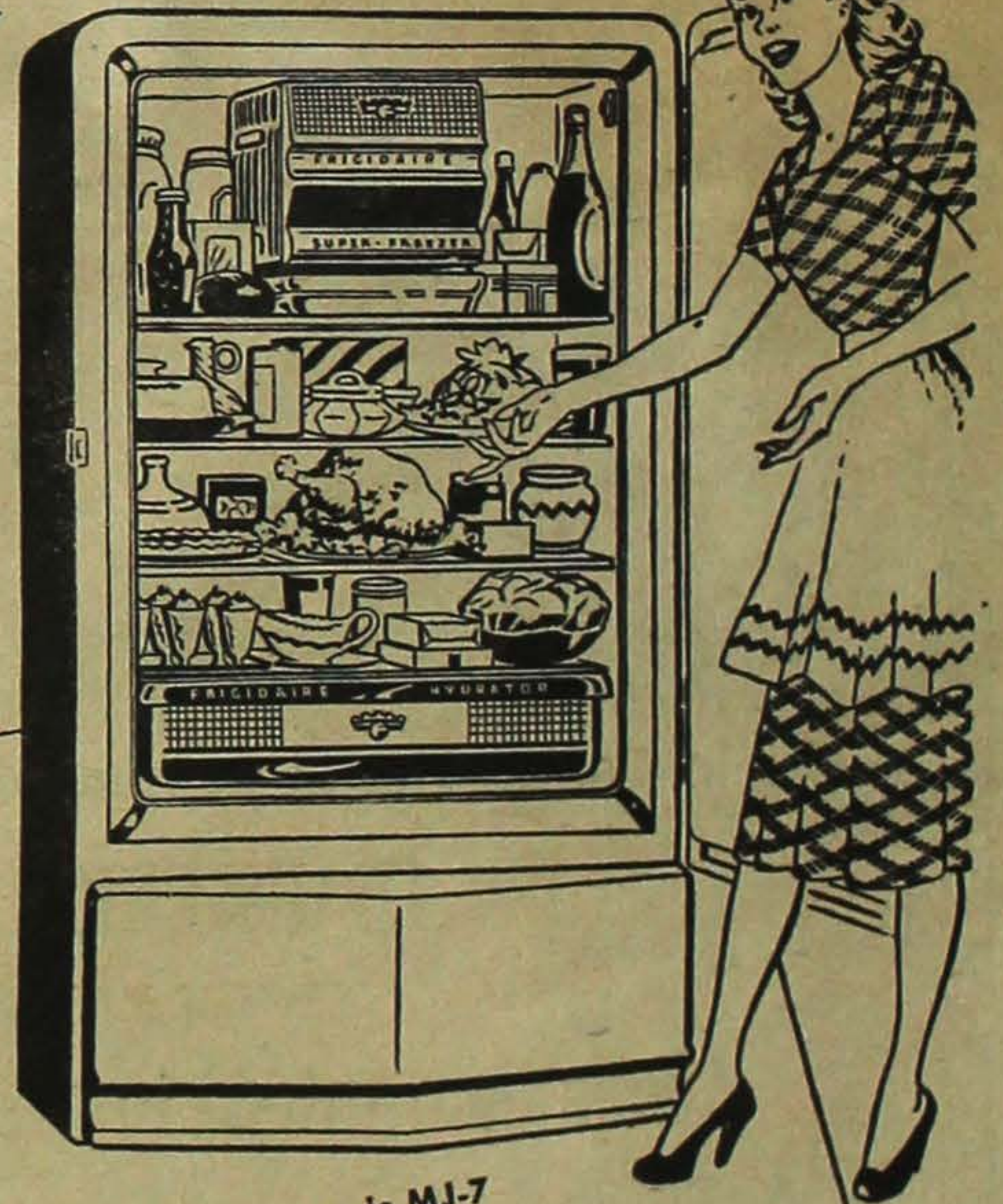
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Penthouse View of City, Mountains Feature of This Outdoor Picnic
