May Tsutsumoto, Seattle JACL queen already is in Chicago, awaiting the start of the convention. She will be a booster delegate in addition to being a candidate for national JACL queen honors.

Hattori and Yamaguchi, who are rated among the top Nisei golfers in the Pacific Northwest, will be Seattle's entries in both the national Nisei amateur meet on Sept. 25, 26 and 27, and the national JACL tournament on Sept. 29 and 30.

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 23—Arthur Jarrett and Myron Wallace have been selected as two of the nine persons who will serve as judges for the National JACL Queen Contest. "Miss National JACL" will be crowned at the Convention Ball on Saturday, Sept. 30, in the Grand Ballroom of the Stevens Hotel, during the eleventh biennial national JACL convention from Sept. 28 through Oct. 2.

Jarrett, who has appeared in numerous movies and is a figure in the bistro circles, has emceed many television shows including the Art Jarrett Show and Come to the Chicago Fair variety programs. Many

will remember him for his excellent singing voice that appeared on Victor records and recall that after the death of Bandleader Hal Kemp, the Kemp aggregation was taken over by Jarrett.

Wallace, the up and coming radio announcer and television star, is noted in television circles for his ability to give lucid and convincing commercials of length without scripts. He is well qualified to act as a beauty contest judge, having for the past year acted as master of ceremonies in the weekly Tavern Pale Beauty Contest that appears on television.

New Chest Drive Blueprint Told

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Sept. 23—For the first time in the local history of Community Chest, solicitations for donations will be done on a geographic line with San Franciscans giving for San Franciscans rather than Negroes giving to Negroes and Japanese to Japanese.

Various nationality and racial groups will not be solicited for contribution to the Chest through churches, clubs and temples, but will be solicited at homes by inter-racial teams assigned to various districts regardless of the population pattern.

This inter-racial blueprint for harmony and cooperation was drafted at a recent meeting of about 40 men and women with whites, Negroes, Japanese, Catholics, Protestants, Jews and Buddhists participated.

Tojo's Daughter Is a Teacher

TOKYO, Japan, Sept. 23—Working as a teacher in a dress-making school in Taio Ward is the eldest daughter of war-time chief Hideki Tojo.

The supervisor of the school says that Miss Tojo, who is 32 and still unmarried, is a modest woman. She does not talk too much and uses no makeup.

Maroon NVC Caps 'Going Fast'

Thanks to Henry Ohye's inexhaustible enthusiasm for aviation, Albert Kushihashi found his own interest champing at the bit.

During the thirties, Kushihashi would often hear of Ohye's ambitious air activities, including plans for a trans-Pacific flight. The flight didn't go through, but not very long after, Kushihashi was taking flying lessons in his native North Platte, Nebraska.

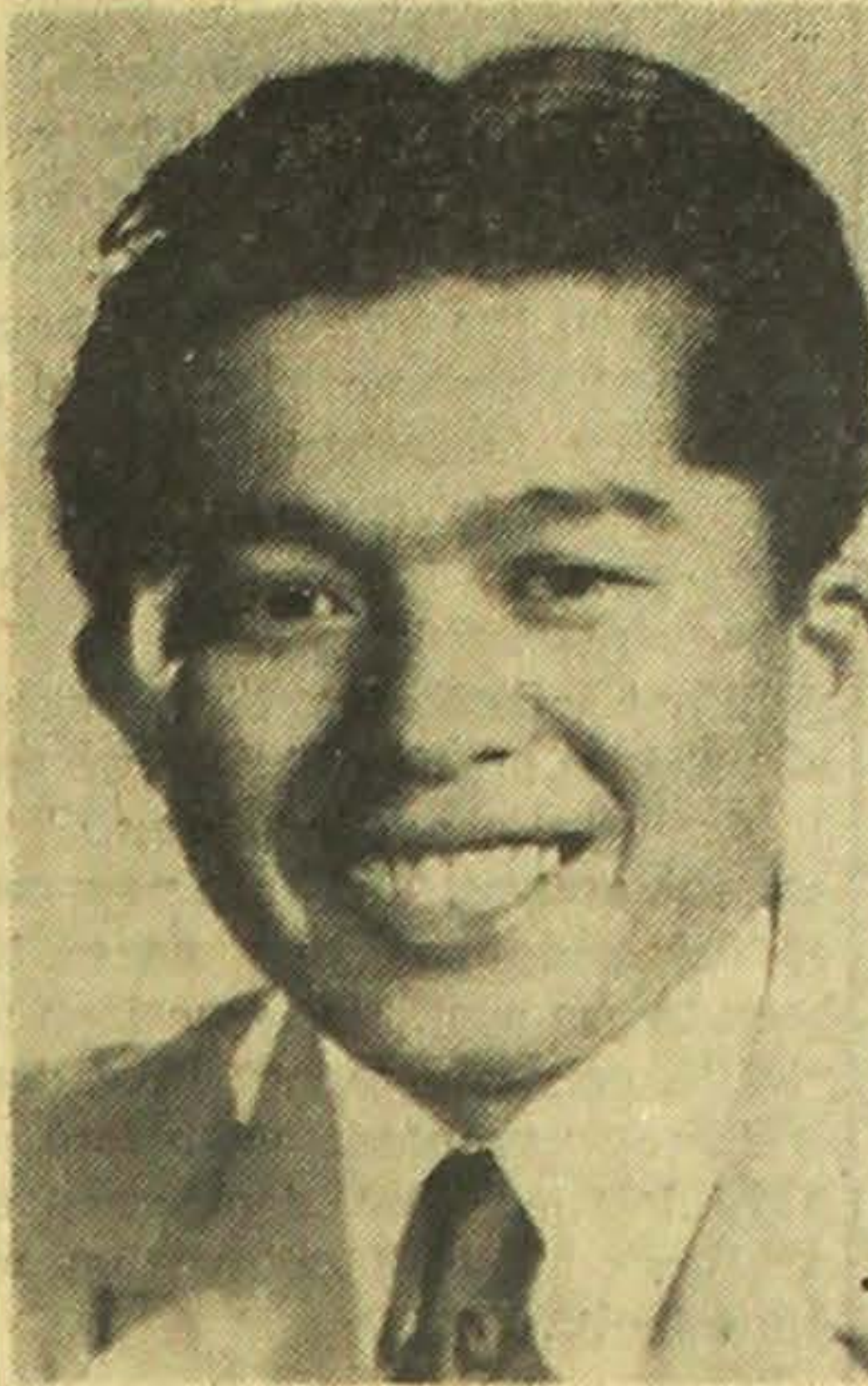
That was thirteen years ago. Since then, 34-year-old Kushihashi, a farmer by occupation, has steadily cultivated his interest in aviation.

During the war, he served with the United States Army in Korea and took to the air whenever he could as a passenger, including a trip from Tokyo to Denver.

Now, as pilot in the all-Nisei Henry Ohye Trophy Race, Kushihashi will turn his thirteen years of interest into practical effort to prove his flying ability.

Helping to sponsor his trip is his wife, the former Joey Kiyoko Yanagida, owner and operator of the Fox Beauty Salon in North Platte.

Kushihashi's plane is a Cessna 170, his banner number, 33. He is the son of Mrs. Gentaro Kushihashi.

Even though he has had his pilot's license for just two months, Herbert Fushimi is anxious to try his wings in the Henry Ohye Trophy Race.

An ardent air enthusiast since childhood, 27-year-old Fushimi gained the actual inspiration to do something about it when he read about the chance Nisei pilots would get in the all-Nisei Ohye competition.

Although he will be competing against pilots with longer flying experience, Fushimi's fresh enthusiasm and confidence should carry him far. Helping to speed him on his way will be his bride of two weeks, Florence Aiko Maruyama.

Fushimi comes from Salt Lake City where he is employed as a book-keeper for the Inland Gas Company. Now that he has learned to fly, flying occupies all of his spare time.

During the war, Fushimi entered the United States Army in 1943, becoming a member of the 232nd Combat Engineer Company attached to the 442nd Infantry Regiment. He joined the company at Camp Shelby, Miss., and saw action with his unit through Italy and France. He received his discharge papers in December, 1945.

Flying under banner 44, he will be piloting a Moony model number, M-18-C, in this race.

He is the son of Mrs. Yukiko Fushimi.

The youngest entry in the all Nisei air race is Albert Takahashi, 24-year-old automobile mechanic from Spanish Fort, Utah.

Since he was a child of nine, Takahashi has been building model airplanes and winning contests for his entries. He took up flying at seventeen and since then has chalked up 500 hours. He now holds a commercial pilot's license and instructor's rating.

During the war, he spent five years in the U. S. Army, seeing action in Italy and France where he received the Bronze Star. His was the group which found the famed Lost Battalion.

Takahashi, single, lives with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Takahashi, and two brothers and two sisters in Spanish Fort where his family moved from Dinuba, Calif., after World War II.

He will be piloting a Cessna 140 and flying under banner number 55.

Five Nisei Pilots Eye Chicago As Final Landing Place; Ohye's Race Will Begin This Sunday

The eleventh biennial national JACL convention to be held in Chicago will be the destination of the Henry Ohye Trophy Race entrants.

This first all-Japanese American air race will start from Los Angeles, Calif., with Mayor Fletcher Bowron participating in the send-off ceremonies about 12 noon this Sunday, Sept. 24, at Central Airport, Los Angeles.

Five Nisei pilots, including Tom Takemura of Tacoma, Wash., who will be flying a Cessna 170, will par-

ticipate in this unique contest. Besides Takemura, the others are Albert Kushihashi of North Platte, Nebraska, Jim Nakauchi of Los Angeles, Calif., Albert Takahashi of Spanish Fort, Utah, and Herbert Fushimi of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Also flying with the group will be Henry Ohye, sponsor, Los Angeles, Calif., on a Luscombe. Ohye will fly the route and keep a record of the times and gas slips of each pilot at every stop.

A definite itinerary has been set by the Civil Aeronautics Administration to start at Los Angeles, and refuel at Yuma, Tucson, El Paso, Big Springs, Wichita Falls, Tulsa, Jefferson City, Peoria and to the destination, Chicago, for a total of 2,027 miles. The pilots will fly into Chicago simultaneously at the Lakefront Airport, in sight of the Stevens Hotel, locale of the convention.

Winners of the contest will be determined by time en route multiplied by gasoline consumed, divided by the mileage and full useful load, and will receive handsome trophies, donated by Ohye and other valuable prizes. The trophies, the Midwest regional JACL office stated, will be presented at a special ceremony during the JACL national parley.

Like the other contestants, 30-year-old Tom Takemura, son of Mrs. Sato Takemura, has always wanted to be a pilot.

Hailing from Tacoma, Wash., where the family is engaged in farming, Takemura began his flying lessons three years ago in Puyallup, Wash. Since then, he has earned a commercial pilot's license and a flight instructor's rating. Not only that, but his occupation has become that of a flight instructor.

Six enthusiastic sponsors are behind Takemura in his effort to win the Henry Ohye Trophy Race. All of them are well-established Nisei businessmen who see the race as an opportunity to push the Nisei in the aviation field.

During World War II, Takemura served for two years in the U. S. Army.

In the race, he will fly a Cessna 170. His banner number is 11.

Americans Now Thinking on Int'l Level, Nippon Times Women's Editor Learns

(Editor's note: Miss Tsugi Shirai, women's editor of the Nippon Times, has just returned from a three-month observation trip of youth organizations and activities in the U. S. This is the first of three articles.)

Confronted with serious problems in the country as well as outside, the American people in general are no longer complacent. Instead of asserting themselves and their rights they have learned to listen to what the other people say and think of their problems on an international level. The war and constant obstacles they have faced in working out democracy after the war have changed the Americans.

The Americans were always the most active people in the world but not the most thinking. Besides being active they now think. The young people who experienced the bitterness of war, either on the fighting front or on the home front, thought that the war was over for good and democracy for which they fought would work in the postwar world. However, they found out how hard it is to realize democracy.

"What is democracy?" "How can it be put into practice?" "Are we really as democratic as we profess?" they ask themselves. They are now aware of democracy as they never have been in the past. The American people, in general, do not take democracy for granted as before, but have learned that democracy does not work by itself unless they work hard for it.

Many young people have become matured mentally and spiritually through their experiences during the

war. While the older boys were gone the younger boys took the place formerly occupied by the older people and shouldered responsibilities in society. Some youngsters had to work while their fathers were gone and look after their families. They became matured much earlier than they would have under normal circumstances. They are serious, think and work hard for peace with faith in democracy.

On the other hand, some youngsters who started working during the war took to drinking. They made good money by working in munitions factories, but there were few things they could buy with money and few places they could go for recreation. While the country's whole potentiality was turned to the war, these youngsters were left to themselves. Unable to find anything to do with money in their pockets they took up drinking. The excessive drinking among the young people today is thus partly due to lack of guidance during the war.

Feeling sorry for these young people. (Continued on Page 4)

Thinking on International Level

people who have missed the kind of life they should have had, both public and private welfare agencies are doing their utmost in setting up recreational and educational facilities and in giving guidance and help to those who cannot adjust themselves to the peacetime social pattern.

As to religion there is more consciousness among the people. Churches are regarded as part of the community and closer contact between churches and communities is encouraged. Church-goers do not feel their duty done if they go to the Sunday morning service and regular offerings. They have become active not only within the church but outside the church. Most churches conduct programs during week days for the members as well as for the people residing in the vicinity. Church doors are open everyday to everybody who cares to come.

"In what way can Christians contribute most to the reconstruction of the world?" "Are we living a Christian life?" "What is a real Christian life?" These questions are constantly repeated in the minds of Christians. The American people no longer take it for granted that they are Christians, but are consciously laboring toward living a Christian life.

Foremost in the minds of Americans is the American policy toward Communist China and the Chiang Kai-shek regime in Formosa. "Do you think that Communist China will become a cat's-paw to Soviet Russia?" "Do you think it worthwhile to give further support to the Chiang regime?" were questions asked very frequently. Some opined that the Chinese people being independent by nature would never become one of the Soviet satellites, but they would establish an independent Communist country. Others were not sure of the success of Communist China as a unified country. As to the Chiang regime very few

expressed hope for defense of Formosa by the Kuomintang forces.

Concerning Japan, most Americans were eager to know what the Japanese people think of Occupation and how popular SCAP is. Such questions as the Emperor's new status after the war, Communists and their strength in Japan, Christianity and its influence on the Japanese people and how active the Japanese women have become in politics after the war were repeatedly asked.
