13. Benediction — Rev. Paul Hagiya.

The service is being sponsored by the interchurch Nisei council, made up of representatives from the Japanese Baptist, Congregational, Methodist, Presbyterian and St. Peter's churches.

The Rev. Jitsuo Morikawa will speak at a special "Family Night" service from 7:30 p.m. next Sunday, Nov. 26, in the Japanese Baptist church, the Rev. Emery Andrews announced today.

HEARINGS SET ON MASAOKA, FUJII CASES

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Nov. 18—Initial hearings on the Masaoka and Fujii alien land law cases will be held during the first of January according to all present indications. It was reported at the N.C.W.N. JACL District Council session here Sunday at El Rancho hotel.

A resolution asking for the early transfer of National JACL headquarters to the San Francisco bay area was adopted by the district council and the UCL of Santa Clara offered the use of their building in San Jose to the national organization.

The council also asked San Francisco chapter to contact all district councils and chapters on a plan to revise the present national membership card system.

The S. F. plan was approved by N.C.-W.N. District Council but not adopted at the Chicago convention earlier this year.

The council also adopted a resolution asking a limit of one candidate from any one chapter for any National JACL cabinet slate in the future.

The present national cabinet of six officers include two each from Southwest Los Angeles and New York chapters.

SOLDIER BRIDES ACT DEADLINE FEB. 18, 1951

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18 (ADC) — The Immigration and Naturalization Service today informed the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee the legal deadline for marriages under the Soldier Brides Act is midnight, Eastern Standard Time, February 18, 1951.

The law provides that alien spouses and natural born children of American servicemen and veterans may enter the United States at any time as non-quota immigrants if their marriages occur prior to the deadline.

Chief effect of the measure is to make eligible for immigration into the United States Asian nationals still denied admission under racial restrictions in this country's immigration laws.

Virtually all marriages which have taken place under the act have been between Americans and Japanese nationals.

The act was introduced in the 81st Congress at the request of the ADC. It covered all existing marriages as well as those occurring within six months after the bill's passage.

ADC officials said servicemen and veterans interested in arranging marriages to take advantage of the law "should, as a normal precaution, consider the deadline as February 15, 1951."

The fine technical deadline, set as of Washington time, is 14 hours later in Japan, or 2 p.m., February 19, 1951, Tokyo time. However, one ADC officer said that, because as a matter of policy the government automatically is inclined to rule against an individual if there is any doubt about his coming within any of the time limits set by any federal laws, it would be more practical "not to wait until the very last minute to get married."

Meantime, the ADC said that there is a "major need" for Congress to consider extending the Soldier Brides law indefinitely. "When the bill was introduced last year it was felt occupation of Japan gradually was coming to an end," an ADC officer said.

"But since the outbreak of war in Korea, it is apparent American troops will be stationed in the Orient for a long time to come."

"Most GIs are young, single fellows, and they have as much right to find happiness in Japan or Korea as has the GI in Germany or the civilian young man in the United States."

"Korean and Japanese brides, of course, will not be eligible to enter the United States with their husbands if they are married after the expiration of the Soldier Brides act. But there are going to be marriages, of some type, as long as young Americans are stationed in the Orient."

Civic Unity Body to Note Sixth Year; Greenwood Will be Speaker Dec. 7

George H. Greenwood of Del Mar, Calif., former president of the board of the Pacific National Bank and first president of the Seattle Civic Unity Committee, will be the speaker at the Civic Unity Committee Sixth Anniversary Dinner, at 6:30 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 7, in the banquet hall of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce.

The dinner is open to the public and reservations may be made by calling Minor 2727. The price of the dinner is \$2.25.

This will be Greenwood's first visit to Seattle since he retired as president of the board of the Pacific National Bank in 1947 and moved to California. Greenwood was one of Seattle's outstanding civic leaders winning national recognition for his courageous stand against racial discrimination.

In addition to playing a major role in initiating the program of the Civic Unity Committee, he was a member of the national Board of the American Council of Race Relations, a past member of the Seattle Urban League Board, and a co-chairman of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

Greenwood's civic activities included the following: Trustee and Treasurer, Seattle Art Museum; President and Trustee, Seattle Symphony Orchestra; Secretary-Treasurer, Seattle Foundation; Treasurer, American Cancer Society; Trustee, Washington Children's Home; President, Independent Bankers Association, 12th Federal Reserve District; Executive Committee Member, American Bankers Association.

He was also president, Washington Bankers Association; director, Seattle Branch, Federal Reserve

Bank of San Francisco; vice president, Seattle Chamber of Commerce and member of Board of Trustees; chairman, King County Fourth War Loan Drive; director, War Services Division, Seattle Civilian War Commission; chairman, American Association of United Nations Northwest Headquarters, and member of the Board of Directors of the Seattle-King County Community Chest and Council.

"We are proud to give Seattle citizens an opportunity to welcome Mr. Greenwood back to Seattle," Frank P. Hessel, president of the Civic Unity Committee, said this week in announcing plans for the sixth anniversary dinner.

"Once again we will give awards to a few outstanding citizens who have made a specific contribution to making Seattle more democratic. We invite our members to send in recommendations of persons, organizations or firms who they believe merit an award and the recommendations will be given serious consideration," Hessel added.

The committee in charge of arrangements includes Mrs. Robert M. Jones, chairman; Mrs. Webster Augustine, Mrs. A. Scott Bullitt, Mrs. F. B. Cooper, Miss Inez Downing, Dr. Erna Gunther, Mrs. Anne Luke, Mrs. Paul J. Pickard, and Mrs. M. Paul Suzuki.

Last year's dinner established a precedent for annual dinners by adjourning promptly at 8:30 p.m., and Hessel advises that the same policy will be in effect this year. There will be no lengthy reports, and the program will consist of an address by Greenwood and the presentation of awards.

American Books Go to Japan Schools

NEW YORK, N. Y., Nov. 18—Two Japanese universities are among the latest beneficiaries of new American scientific books provided through the CARE-UNESCO Book Fund.

The institutions are the Medical School of Tohoku University, at Sendai, and the Medical School of the University of Hokkaido. Each received \$500 worth of the latest and best medical books, purchased through contributions of various amounts sent by Americans to the Book Fund at CARE headquarters, 20 Broad St., New York 5, N. Y.

Reports just received from CARE's mission in Tokyo relate that Dr. Shinoda, head of the hospital attached to the Tohoku University Medical School, expressed his appreciation by declaring: "Books are our food; we are so grateful we can't find words enough to express our thanks. Please send us more food."

Former Tohoku University President Satake, who also spoke at the presentation ceremony, declared: "It is sometimes difficult for Japanese to understand abbreviations. We have all wondered what CARE meant. We have read about it in the Nippon Times and other newspapers. No explanation, however, of

what the letters stand for could be more exemplary than this outward demonstration of good will, and tangible expression of friendship by the American people who have sent these books."

Until the arrival of the volumes delivered by the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe and Asia, the report related, the Tohoku University Medical School—one of the foremost in Japan—had in its library no books published later than 1940.

Only source of more recent medical knowledge for students and professors were 120 short medical treatises obtained from the United States. In an attempt to help itself, since it had no dollars to buy needed books, the medical school has started to issue the Tohoku Journal of Experimental Medicine, which is written in English and is being sent around the world in exchange for similar publications from other medical schools.

Similar lack of up-to-date knowledge was found at the University of Hokkaido, which has a total of 5,000 students, including 300 students enrolled in the medical school. Here again, deep appreciation was expressed for the CARE book gift, which will help overcome the short-

Nisei Woman Wins Polio Award

MENLO PARK, Calif., Nov. 18—Marion H. Kaneko, 908 Middle Avenue, Menlo Park, has been awarded a scholarship in physical therapy under the nationwide professional training program of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Robert L. Pierce, northern California representative for the foundation, announced.

Miss Kaneko is one of 142 California residents to receive a scholarship since the foundation expanded its physical therapy program in 1945 to help combat a critical shortage of qualified personnel in the physical therapy field.

Miss Kaneko is studying at Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., one of many schools and institutions throughout the country approved for this type of training by the American Medical association's council on medical education and hospitals.

In announcing her award, Pierce explained that physical therapists trained under the foundation program are not obligated to confine their work to treatment of infantile paralysis. He pointed out that since no one can anticipate where it will strike, best protection against the disease is to have trained physical therapy technicians available at all hospitals and agencies where polio patients may be treated.

U. S. Assures Aid to Needy Issei

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 18—Consideration for elderly and needy Issei who have filed claims under the Evacuation Claims Act has been assured by the Department of Justice, it was learned this week from the Japanese American Citizens League.

As a result of a policy recently declared by the Department of Justice, claimants over the age of sixty-five, who reside in or near Los Angeles, and who are in dire need of money, may request the

local field office for an immediate hearing on their claims. Such claimants should write a letter to William W. Palmer, Attorney-in-Charge, Department of Justice Claims Division, 808 Federal Building, Los Angeles 12, California, stating their age, residence and need of money, and requesting a hearing. Other circumstances indicating the need for an early or immediate hearing will also be considered by Mr. Palmer on an individual basis, it was disclosed.

age of modern books published during and since the war.

Japan is one of 23 European and Asian countries whose schools and libraries can be helped through the Book Fund which non-profit CARE has added to its food and textile package service. Cash contributions in any amount, sent to the Book Fund at CARE's New York address or any local CARE office, are used to buy the latest and best books in 21 scientific and technical categories (medicine, farming, engineering, teaching, applied sciences, etc.)

Sums under \$10 are pooled in the general fund. Donors of \$10 or more may specify the country, institution and book category—such as "medical books, Tohoku University, Sendai, Japan". CARE makes delivery in the donor's name and returns a receipt signed by the recipient.
