

Senate Passes Rider to Soldier Brides Act

House to Debate One Hour On Evacuation Claims Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22—Full House of Representatives action on the Evacuation Claims bill, H. R. 3999, early next week was insured this morning when the House Rules Committee granted a special rule permitting one hour of House consideration on the bill possibly July 22 or 23, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination announced today.

The Rules committee action means that a vote will be taken on the House floor possibly this Tuesday or Wednesday on the evacuation claims measure following one hour of debate on the merits of the bill, Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director, explained.

Congressman John W. Gwynne, of Iowa, Rep., chairman of the subcommittee in charge of H. R. 3999, and Congressman Francis E. Walter of Pennsylvania, Dem., ranking seniority member of the same subcommittee, appeared before the Rules committee to argue for a special rule permitting House action this session.

The House had earlier passed over the bill when it recommended on the July 7 Consent calendar that it be "passed over without prejudice."

Announcement of the granting of a one-hour rule was made by Chairman Leo E. Allen of Illinois, Rep.

Other Republican members of the Rules committee are Clarence J. Brown of Ohio; James Wadsworth, New York; Forest A. Harness, Indiana; J. Edgar Chenovert, Colorado; Ross Ritzley, Oklahoma; Christian A. Herter, Massachusetts; and Robert F. Rich, Pennsylvania.

Democratic members of the committee include Adolph J. Sabath of Illinois; E. E. Cox, Georgia; Howard W. Smith, Virginia; and J. Bayard Clark, North Carolina.

With its course through the House marked by long delays and inactivity, the Evacuation Claims measure, which was introduced on March 25, was finally reported out of committee on June 24 as a result of swift action that day by both the Subcommittee and the full Judiciary committee.

Subsequently placed on the July 7 Consent Calendar, the bill was moved over "because it involved more than the \$1,000,000 limit for passage of legislation on this calendar," according to the Washington ADC office.

Introduced by Representative Earl C. Michener of Michigan, Rep., the Evacuation Claims bill, as amended, empowers the Attorney General to adjudicate certain evacuation losses sustained by persons of Japanese ancestry. Congressman Gwynne is in charge of H. R. 3999 during the House consideration.

Deep Probe into Immigration Issue In U. S. Slated by Senate Body

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22—Complete and thorough inquiry into the immigration situation of the United States is scheduled by the Senate Committee on the Judiciary as a result of Senate Resolution 137, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee learned this week.

Commenting on the resolution, Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director, declared:

"While not specifically aimed at persons of Japanese ancestry, nevertheless this investigation will probably include immigration quota and other problems relating to the Oriental Exclusion Act of 1924."

Introduced by Senator Chapman Revercomb, chairman of the Subcommittee on Immigration, the Senate resolution authorizes the Judiciary committee or one of its subcommittees to "make a full and complete investigation of our entire immigration system."

According to information reaching the Washington ADC office, this inquiry will include:

1. The history and development of the United States immigration policy.

2. Administration of immigration and deportation laws.

3. The extent to which aliens have entered the United States in violation or circumvention of such laws and the extent to which aliens have remained in the United States in violation or circumvention of such laws.

4. The situation with respect to displaced persons in Europe.

5. The effect upon this country of any change in the immigration laws.

With \$50,000 set up to cover expenses of the investigation, the committee will be authorized to employ experts to aid in the inquiry the ADC office learned. According to the resolution, an immediate beginning in the detailed review of the immigration situation is indicated.

The investigating committee is ordered to report its findings to the Senate at the "earliest practicable date." The resolution was submitted jointly by Senator Revercomb of West Virginia, Rep., and Senator Patrick McCarran of Nevada, Dem., who is the only other member of the Senate Subcommittee on Immigration.

SENATE BODY REPORTS OUT FOR H. R. 3149

WASHINGTON, July 22—With only one more Congressional hurdle to surmount—passage by the full Senate—H. R. 3149, amendment to the Soldier Brides Act, has been reported out favorably by the Senate Judiciary committee, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee announced today.

The first time that a Senate Immigration committee has ever passed a public bill of beneficial interest to persons of Japanese ancestry, the favorable report was designated S. R. 501.

The Immigration committee is now a subcommittee under the Senate Judiciary committee, the ADC office explained.

Action on H. R. 3149 by the full Senate is expected this week, according to Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director.

Purpose of the bill is to permit the racially inadmissible spouses of GI's to enter the United States.

Under the Soldier Brides Act, passed in 1945, only the GI spouses of alien ancestry admissible to

United States citizenship were eligible to enter this country.

This amendment will involve the Korean, Siamese, Guamanian, and Japanese wives of American servicemen, among others. According to the ADC office, there are now some 50 cases of married servicemen who will be immediately benefited by this bill in addition to some 100 to 150 GI's who are reportedly awaiting passage of the bill before getting married.

Only recourse up to now for the servicemen who married wives inadmissible to citizenship has been by means of private bills to permit entry into this country for their wives, the ADC office said.

Such persons as EX-Sergeant Robert Kitajima of Alameda who married a Canadian Nisei girl, Ex-Lieutenant Clarke Kawakami of Washington, D. C., who married a prominent Japanese movie star, Lieutenant Makoto Kimura of Los Angeles who married a Canadian Nisei, ex-Sergeant Frank Kawagoe of Los Angeles who married a naturalized Canadian of Japanese ancestry, Lieutenant Lyle Kurisaki of Salt Lake City who married a Japanese national, and others will be benefited by this bill, the ADC office added.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 22 (Nichi Bei Times Dispatch)—Four brands of shoyu were declared off the quarantine list here by San Francisco health authorities last weekend and the state will be asked to confiscate all supplies of another brand as tests continued in many laboratories throughout California.

Zest brand and Bunka sauce, bottled by Yamate Bros. of San Francisco were cleared by local health authorities with the local Chinese Wing Uien brand and nationally distributed La Choy brand.

Another S. F. Case

Following a report last week of the poisoning of Mr. and Mrs. R. Oishi, 1623 1/2 Buchanan st., the shoyu sauce they had been using was examined and found to contain 13 1/2 grains of arsenic to a pint.

Dr. J. C. Geiger, S. F. public health director, announced Thursday that all stock of this shoyu, Marusei brand bottled by Greenwood Trading company of Oakland, which is now in the city, permanently quarantined.

Just two grains of arsenic an ounce is considered a lethal dose and it was also explained arsenic is a cumulative substance in the human body so that the more tainted shoyu is consumed the greater the dose.

Stock Destroyed

Meanwhile officials at the A. E. Staley company, manufacturers of the tainted sauce, said about 200 barrels of the poisoned shoyu had been traced to one container in which caustic soda was used.

The company has frozen all shipments and will destroy all forms of the sauce in its warehouse.

Illinois Firm Issues Policy

DECATUR, Ill.—The Staley Manufacturing Co. this week issued a statement in which it said that its product is shipped in bulk for repacking by merchandisers and that the company is confident the material supplied by it was wholesome.

"Nevertheless, the company is co-operating with the health authorities in every way possible to locate the source of the difficulty," the statement said. "In addition to the checks being made in the Decatur laboratory, Staley has retained a reliable consulting laboratory in Los Angeles to make a thorough study of the matter."

The Staley Co. said that no material containing arsenic is used in the manufacture of the soya sauce and that no arsenic is used against pests at the Staley Co. and that it knows of no use of arsenic in the fields.

Approval Awaits Only Signing By President

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22—In a move of historical importance to persons of Japanese ancestry in the United States, the Senate on Wednesday passed H. R. 3149, amendment to the Soldier Brides Act, and thus completed congressional action on the first major bill favorably affecting Japanese Americans, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination disclosed today.

The bill has been sent to President Harry Truman for signature.

Under H.R. 3149, racially inadmissible spouses of GI's will be permitted to enter the United States. Heretofore, the Soldier Brides Act, passed in 1945, allowed only the GI spouses of alien ancestry eligible to United States citizenship to enter this country.

This Japanese, Korea, Canadian, Guamanian, and Siamese wives of American servicemen, among others, may now enter the United States providing they are otherwise admissible under the Soldier Brides act.

Sponsored by the Anti-Discrimination Committee, H. R. 3149 was introduced by Congressman Frank Fellows after repeated representations were made by the ADC legislative director that the Soldier Brides act discriminated against American soldiers and veterans who married Japanese wives.

Congressman Fellows of Maine, Rep., is chairman of the Subcommittee on Immigration and Naturalization of the House Judiciary committee.

Introduced on April 22, the bill was passed by the House of Representatives on June 16 and sent to the Senate. After quick consideration by the Senate Judiciary committee and its Subcommittee on Immigration, H. R. 3149 was favorably reported to the full Senate on July 11.

Marked by further amendment and debate, the Soldier Brides amendment was steered through its course in the House by Congressman Ed Gossett of Texas.

Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, Rep., chairman of the Senate Judiciary committee, prepared the report on the bill for the Senate.

According to the Washington ADC office, there are now some 50 cases of married servicemen who will be benefited by this bill in addition to some 100 to 150 GI's who are reportedly awaiting passage of the bill before getting married.

"Although this amendment will beneficially affect those servicemen now married, it will not apply to many who are planning to be married," according to Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director.

"Only soldiers who were married prior to or within 30 days of the enactment of the Soldier Brides amendment would be eligible under the Act, according to a 30-day clause by the amendment," he added.

This was inserted in the amendment by the House Judiciary committee "in order not to encourage marriages between United States citizen service people and racially inadmissible aliens," Masaoka explained.

He pointed out that, although the Anti-Discrimination Committee objected to the clause, it was inserted in the amendment as a compromise measure since the Judiciary committee originally limited the eligibility only to those already married before January 1, 1947.

War Department Aide Spikes Rumors of Confiscation of Japanese Nationals' Assets

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22—Rumors that the War department is considering the confiscation of assets of Japanese nationals in the United States for purposes of reparations were branded untrue this week by Assistant Secretary of War Howard C. Peterson in a letter received by the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee.

Resulting from an inquiry made by the Washington ADC office, the War department letter was made public this week.

Peterson declared that "neither the War department, nor any other agency of the government, to our knowledge, has proposed that the assets of persons of Japanese ancestry, res-

ident in the United States, are to be confiscated for reparation or for the purpose of indemnifying for losses sustained by American citizens or American troops as a result of our war with Japan."

In commenting on the War department letter, Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director, issued the following statement:

"Quite a number of rumors have reached this office in the form of letters to the effect that the War department was considering confiscating the assets of Japanese nationals in the United States for purposes of reparations.

"We have checked with the Assistant Secretary of War and have discovered the whole thing to be unfounded.

Tables Deportation, Naturalization Measures

WASHINGTON, D. C. July 22—All further action on the deportation staying bill, H. R. 3566, and the naturalization bill, H. R. 3565, has been halted in the Senate for this session, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee learned this morning.

The Senate Judiciary committee has tabled the two measures pending a sweeping review of the immigration situation in the United States, the ADC office was informed.

"This means there will be no further consideration of these bills until the next session of Congress, which is scheduled to begin on January 5, 1948," Mike Masaoka, national ADC legislative director, declared.

Results of a Senate resolution introduced by Senator Chapman Revercomb of West Virginia, Rep., to make a thorough inquiry into the immigration system, the tabling of all bills involving immigration, naturalization, and deportation was ordered by the Senate Judiciary

committee. H. R. 3565 provides for the naturalization of parents of Gold Star and Purple Heart veterans and would affect approximately 20,000 persons of Japanese ancestry. H. R. 3566 would give the Attorney General discretionary power to stay deportation of aliens inadmissible to citizenship and would affect approximately 2,000 persons of Japanese ancestry, according to the ADC office.

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"The Senate resolution, No. 137, which will delay our bills was not aimed directly at persons of Japanese ancestry," Masaoka declared.

"It was largely directed at immigration policies relating to European countries and was introduced at this time particularly because the end of the war revived a fear that the history of large immigration after World War I might repeat itself," he explained.

Pointing out that the resolution is in line with the traditional caution of the United States Senate in matters relating to immigration policies, Masaoka added that persons of Japanese ancestry had inadvertently been innocent victims of the Senate's cautious approach to this matter.

"However," he stated, "this full-dress investigation of the immigration situation by the Senate may

give us a better opportunity to present our ideas for the naturalization of all aliens now considered ineligible for citizenship."

Because of the emergency features of many deportation cases, Masaoka said the Anti-Discrimination Committee would not let up in its drive to prevent deportation, "despite this action by the Senate

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Keeping Up with the Times

JAPANESE PEACE TREATY
SEATTLE

...will be very much in the race to have the Japanese peace treaty conference held here. Mayor William F. Devin, Senator Harry P. Cain and Senator Magnuson will have urged the State Department to make Seattle the site for the coming Japanese peace talks.
The eleven nations which will probably be represented around the peace table will be Russia, Great Britain, United States, France, the Netherlands, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, India, and the Philippine Commonwealth. All of these nations have vital interests in the Pacific.

ALTHOUGH no official word has been received from Russia as to the United States proposal to make this Japanese peace conference free of any big power veto, it is expected that Russia will not give in so easily. The peace talks will center around the disposition of former

Japanese territories which Russia will have much to say. Also, there are reparations still to be settled.

The American proposal for a veto-free conference will defer from the European peace-making procedures. It is no doubt aimed at Russia for her free use of veto powers in Germany. The American proposal will make two-thirds vote with or without concurring votes of the big powers, decide the issues. Also, the treaty drafting will be done by all of the eleven nations represented at the conference, instead of only by the big powers.

THE 11 NATIONS

...which will attend the conference are now members of the Far Eastern Commission which was set up at the Foreign Ministers conference in 1945. At this Moscow conference, the Foreign Ministers of Russia, Britain and the United States agreed, with the concurrence of China, for the establishment of the FEC which will operate from headquarters in Washington, D. C. The FEC has been preparing directives in accordance with policy decisions of the Commission and the United States Government in turn has been transmitting them to General MacArthur's occupation headquarters in Tokyo.

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'Life Is Essentially Tragic'

Tragedy

If you hit a child over the head he would bawl his head off—but a short while later he would be laughing about something else. That seems to be the emotional level reached by most people one meets. The point I'm trying to make is that although people may feel sad and unhappy they are not always capable of realizing the truth that life is essentially tragic.

But once in a while I meet someone who has arrived at the realization, and I might add that they are not necessarily pessimists. They are usually people who have suffered through adverse circumstances, or through their keen awareness of and sensitivity to life. Sometimes the second condition grows from the first.

In Literature

In modern literature, man is often pictured as the pawn of circumstances. The circumstances are interwoven with the man's temperament, which, in turn, is conditioned by his environment and heredity. So temperament is something over which he has little control.

There is one character in Dr. Maurier's "Hungry Hill" who appealed to me. I remember vaguely that he is referred to as "Wild Willie" or "Wild Jack." I forget which. In one rather poignant scene, this person refers to the fact that he is cursed by his own temperament. I suppose most of us are made to suffer more or less because of our temperaments.

The great tragedies of Shakespeare and of the ancient Greeks bring out the tragic element in life in bold relief. The themes are usually repeated: a great man goes to his destruction because he possesses some trait which makes him unwilling or unable to adjust himself to his environment.

In the case of Macbeth, it was ambition; in the case of Hamlet,

it was thought and indecision; in the case of the Greek tragic heroes, it was usually "hubris" or pride.

In Actual Life

In actual life, the spiritual struggle between man and his environment is less clear cut. It is cluttered with myriad of tiny and incidental forces. In this struggle, he is sometimes victorious.

More often he is confused or browbeaten or defeated by life. But a great many persons don't even get that far because they are scared to come to grips with life. They drug their spiritual unrest by activity—either in the striving for what they think is "success," or in a meaningless round of social activity, meetings and fun-seeking.

I have met many who suffer from extreme loneliness, or sadness, or unrest. I suppose it's natural for them to want to evade the unanswerable questions about life which torment them. But I wouldn't if I were them; I might try controlling the emotions sufficiently to prevent, them from making me unsociable. But a man's life is the richer for having suffered, and having experienced a spiritual weakness and need, and having tried to face the challenging questions.

With luck and perseverance, he may even find the reason for the tragedy in human existence.

(Editor's note: Vancouver's beautiful Hasings Park had another Japanese resident recently, but it was acting in its peace-time capacity as a horse-racing center again instead of a government manning pool for evacuated-to-be Japanese as it was five years ago. The Japanese in question was an American Nisei jockey up in Vancouver for the racing season. Ken McConnell, sports columnist of the Vancouver Daily Province, tells about the Nisei jockey, Seattle-born "Kokomo Joe" Kabuki.)

Joe Kabuki is a Japanese. He is one of the very few members of his race in Vancouver today. Joe, you see, is a race rider, and a good one. He was born in Seattle 28 years ago. His father and mother both died, lived in the Washington city for 50 years. Joe has never been to Japan.

"All hell broke loose," Joe told us. "Fellows I had known through public and high school wouldn't talk to me. I tried to get in the service, but my 100 pounds eliminated all chances of that."

"Well, I rode my first winner, Fancy Doug, and presiding steward George Schilling reined I could have a license to ride. Boy, that was quite a day; I'll never forget it or him either."

You can't help but like Joe. He is sort of at loose ends right now. He wants to be a great jockey and maybe some day he will be great. He has ambition—an objective. He is just hoping that, one of these days, he'll be accepted again by "society."

This same Trainer Cummings tossed a bombshell into racing headquarters at Lansdowne when, on arrival here, he announced he had a Japanese jockey.

"What's that?" demanded Mase White.

So Cummings was told to get in touch with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. If the RCMP would approve the boy, he could ride.

"He's a pretty fair boy," claims Cummings, and for an agent that represents the understatement of the week. "He was not up on much on Saturday at Sage Wyck. But you wait until he rides at Hastings. Those half-mile tracks are his meat."

In a little old stall at Hastings Park, Joe is holed up with the horses.

"The horses don't seem to mind who or what I am," said Joe. "Just as long as I keep their feed-boxes full."
