CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 7.—"American Brotherhood," a half hour broadcast over Station W A A F (850 K. C.) every Thursday afternoon from 1:15 to 1:45 o'clock will feature Mike Masaoka, legislative director of the JACL-Anti-Discrimination Committee, on its Oct. 16 broadcast.

Sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews, "American Brotherhood" is a program devoted to forum, newscasts and music broadcast in behalf of bettering human relations.

Masaoka will bring into focus several actual instances of how individuals and families can be personally affected by the passage of legislation now being sponsored by the JACL-ADC. He will be interviewed by Ethel Getzoff, program director of the NCCJ. Masaoka's appearance on the program was arranged through the Midwest ADC office.

EVACUEES MUST  
FILE LOSSES  
BY NOV. 30

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 3.—Complete details regarding the filing of claims for evacuation loss were announced this week by the Commissioner in charge of the inquiry, Justice Henry Irvine Bird.

According to the announcement, claims must be in duplicate, verified by statutory declaration, and filed at the office of the Custodian on or before November 30, 1947. Late claims will not be considered unless a good cause is shown to the Commissioner.

Real property and personal properties which were sold by the Custodian, as well as those which were lost, destroyed or stolen while in the hands of the Custodian will be considered; real and personal properties not handled by the Custodian are still excluded under the amended terms of reference.

After November 30, the Commissioner will hold hearings on the claims, to determine the evidence, at Vancouver, B. C., Kamloops, B. C.; Nelson, B. C.; Lethbridge, Alta.; Moose Jaw, Sask.; Winnipeg, Man.; Toronto, Ont.; Montreal, Que.; and "such other places as may be determined by the Commissioner.

After completing the hearings, the Commissioner will make a report to the Government, setting forth the claims which are well-founded, and recommending the amount of compensation to be paid each qualified claimant.

The amendment to the terms of reference effected by the Sept. 17 Order in Council makes it no longer necessary to prove that the loss resulted from the failure of the Custodian to exercise reasonable care. No other change is provided by this amendment.

In a statement issued by secretary Mrs. Donald MacMillan, the Toronto Co-operative Committee on Japanese Canadians "welcomed" the amendment while regretting "that the Government has not accepted our representations that in for losses to property fairly arising out of the evacuation orders order to do full justice, all claims should be investigated and compensation allowed."

"Considerable Number" Excluded  
Mrs. MacMillan pointed out that there were a considerable number of cases in which losses were incurred on properties not vested in the Custodian and are thus still out side the terms of reference.

"We will continue to urge that more complete justice be done in respect to this class of claims and we plan to assist in the preparation of the necessary information, so that the cases of this group of claimants may be put before Parliament and the Government," the statement added.

Toronto property owners who formerly advocated boycott of the Inquiry Commission decided, by a majority decision at a committee meeting on Sept. 20, not to go through with the boycott.

The boycott movement is believed to have been discouraged by the unfavorable outcome of the Exchequer Court Action started during the war by Japanese property owners.

No Grounds for  
Appealing Decision  
Justice Thorson of the Exchequer Court disclosed on August 28 last his reasons for dismissing the case. He ruled that the Custodian is not a servant of the Crown and therefore no Petition lies in the Exchequer Court.

Regarding the validity of the Orders providing for the sale of Japanese property (apart from the technical reason for the dismissal), the judge indicated clearly that no redress from any court can be expected arising out of the sale of Japanese properties.

There are no grounds for appealing these reasons, in the opinion of Norris & MacLennan, Vancouver law firm, who handled the case for the Japanese Petitioners.

Four Nisei Get  
Citizenship

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 7.—Full American citizenship was restored to four Nisei renunciants last week by Federal District Judge Albert C. Cavanah.

Albert Yuichi Inouye, Miye Mae Murakami, Tsutako Sumi and Mutsu Shimizu regained their rights in a test case sponsored by the national office of the American Civil Liberties Union.

LEADERS MEET  
AFTER KNIFING  
OF JAPANESE

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 7 (Nichi Bei Times Dispatch).—Filipino leaders here are planning several separate investigations into the reported clash and knifing of five Japanese by six persons believed to have been Filipinos.

This was disclosed following a meeting held last week with several influential Filipinos by Joe Masaoka, N. C. regional JACL director, at the Philippines consulate.

Aurelio Ramos, acting consul general, revealed that an investigation is being conducted by his office, while a similar independent action is being taken by the Filipino Inter-Community Organization of America.

It was also disclosed that a statement is being prepared by the consulate for release to the Filipino press deploring the attack and calling for the end of friction.

Antonio Gonzales, head of the Inter-Community group, and C. T. Alfara, president of a Filipino fraternal organization, who attended the conference declared that disciplinary action would be taken if the assailants were found to be members of either of their groups.

A meeting sometime in the future with the former Stockton Inter-Racial council members who aided in the evacuee resettlement program was discussed at the conference.

Gonzales disclosed that in 1942 he appeared before the Tolcan committee hearing in San Francisco and testified in opposition to evacuation as a solution to an outbreak of incidents involving Filipinos and Japanese Americans at the time.

Four Nisei Still  
In Hospital

STOCKTON, Calif., Oct. 7.—Four of the five Japanese Americans suffering knife wounds in an unprovoked attack in Lodi are still in a hospital there, it was learned.

A. Enya, Dick Okinaka, Kenny Keneo and T. Tomita are those hospitalized.

The attackers escaped in an automobile and have not been identified.

Book Describing 'Masako', Survivor  
Of A-Bomb Blast, Banned in Japan

NAGASAKI, Oct. 7.—The Japanese people will not get a chance to read the book entitled "Masako Still Lives."

The American censors have so decreed, because they fear it might disturb the public tranquility.

"Masako Still Lives" is the story of the atomic bomb attack as told by 17-year old Masako Ichida, daughter of a Nagasaki district judge. At the time the bomb exploded—August 9, 1945—she was working in the Mitsubishi torpedo plant.

The plant was destroyed by the blast. Masako, then 15 years old, was wounded in the neck and dazed. But she joined a group of survivors headed for a nearby village, and it was not until the following day that she learned her family had also survived.

The American censorship authorities granted permission for the book to be published as a family chronicle. But when Masako's father asked to publish it for general circulation he was turned down.

Believes JACL  
Could Aid Nisei  
Left in Japan

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 7.—Belief that the JACL could be of real service to the Nisei and Issei stranded in Japan by helping them to solve the many "nationality problems" that have arisen as a result of the war was expressed recently to Mike Masaoka, national legislative director, by Thomas Blakemore, chief of the civil affairs branch of the Courts and Laws Division of the Government Section of SCAP.

Mr. Blakemore, originally in the foreign service, has been in Japan since the occupation. He arrived in the capital earlier this month to confer with the State Department and sailed again for Japan from Seattle.

The Tokyo JACL chapter, he reported, is well aware of its responsibilities and is working slowly in order that nothing it did would jeopardize the program upon which the national organization is embarked over here. He added that of the "nationality problems," most of these would have to be settled by Japanese courts, and for this reason, he felt the time was not yet appropriate for any American attorney to go to Japan to work on stranded cases. He pointed out the difficulties of Japanese law, language and other barriers.

Mr. Blakemore discussed the property situation in Japan, voicing the opinion that as far as land ownership in that country is concerned, the owners, no matter where they were, would be treated about the same regardless of their citizenship. However, he said that as for other property, no policy had yet developed.

Woman Robbed  
Near Home by  
Knife Wielder

Miss Kay Ogahara, 22, of 166 15th Ave., was robbed in front of her home last Friday by a Negro wielding a long-bladed knife, she reported to the police.

The Nisei said she was walking home from work when the man accosted her and held the knife against her throat. Warning her not to cry out, he took \$12 from her purse and fled.

A few minutes later, however, police arrested a man answering the description of her assailant near the scene of the robbery.

CHEST DRIVE  
LAUNCHED BY  
AIDES HERE

This week 10,000 volunteer workers from every walk of life throughout Seattle and King County began taking time off from their daily tasks to face their responsibility to provide for the common welfare, as the annual Community Chest campaign in behalf of 37 local Red Feather welfare and health services got under way.

The campaign will open officially Wednesday night, October 8, at a Kickoff Dinner held in the Spanish Ballroom, Olympic Hotel, to which several hundred campaign workers will pay their own way. Rt. Rev. Stephen F. Bayne, Jr. of Olympia; Nat S. Rogers, president of the Chest, and Irving S. Smith, campaign chairman, will thank the assembled campaign workers for enlisting in this cause, and urge them to exert every effort to impress on the people whom they would be approaching during the next few days and weeks the vital importance of this community undertaking.

Thursday, October 9, has been designated as C-Day, or Chest Day, and early Thursday approximately 6,000 Chest campaign workers of the Neighborhood Division will make the rounds, taking them to every house in the residential area before the campaign closes on October 27.

At the same time, the Chest drive will open in plants, offices and factories throughout the country, in each of which volunteer solicitors have enlisted to help raise the \$1,587,744 which will be needed to sustain the operations of the 37 Red Feather welfare and health services throughout 1948.

"In the year 1947, which finds so much of humanity throughout the world wracked by doubts, discords and fear of the future, this community effort on behalf of our neighbors assumes an importance which transcends even the vital constructive community services performed by these agencies," Mr. Smith declared this week.

"Throughout much of the globe the free spirit of democracy itself is under fire, the belief that free men can voluntarily provide for the common welfare is held in question. The success of the Community Chest campaign will provide a ringing answer to those who would assail the American way of life that we are capable, acting of our own free will, to assume the responsibility of providing for the general welfare.

"Millions of Americans are uniting this month in local campaigns on behalf of their own Red Feather services. Seattle and King County cannot fail. We shall not fail."

The opening of the Chest campaign will culminate months of intensive preparations to which businessmen, labor leaders, clergymen, educators, lawyers, doctors, housewives and school children have already contributed generously of their time and energy, Mr. Smith stated.

### POLITICS...

"Weigh carefully both sides of the question before you condemn Japan," pleaded Consul Issaku Okamoto in a broadcast over station KVI, to present the Japanese side of the Chinese situation to the American public. Okamoto's keynote was struck when he said, "As the Americans have a way of saying, truth will eventually come out."

Chinese-Japanese friction was carried to the Pacific school ball ground when more than ten Chinese and Japanese pupils engaged in a free-for-all fight. Involved were mostly "Kibei" of both groups. This is the third fighting of its kind at the Pacific school, according to teachers.

Three American-born Japanese returning to the United States were held up by the U.S. Immigration officials here pending investigation as to their legal status. In many cases, the Nisei have resided so long in Japan that they speak English with a decided accent or else their command of their native tongue is so poor that this prompted officials to be suspicious as to

their nationality. In such cases they often travel armed with only a birth certificate.

### EDUCATION...

Fumio Yagi and Chihiro Kikuchi were the only Japanese students to be presented faculty certificates for having earned the highest grades in their respective classes last year at the University of Washington. Both recipients were graduated with valedictory honors at Broadway high school.

### SPORTS...

Kalmon Kudo, wrestler, was on top with nine wins and two losses in the Northwest Mat Tournament which is going into its fourth week in the Civic Auditorium. The second man on the ladder has won twenty but has lost five times. The winner of the tourney wins a \$2,000 purse.

The New York Yankees won the World's Series from the New York Giants.

With Onodera, Shiga and Kawaguchi carrying the skin, the Waseda Marmots got in the win column by noosing out Tacoma, 6-0, in a Courier grid loop tilt. Baba and Fujii starred on the Marmot line. Kubo, Hayashi and Sakura played smart ball for the losers. In the other game, defending champion Grizzlies took another on the chin when Matsuoka, Matsushita and Tamura combined their talents for Bellevue in a 13-0 contest. Bellevue outplayed, outthought and outscored the Grizzlies.

After the final scores of thirty-three players were chalked up, Kobayashi in the "A" flight and Tsukada in the "B" flight were declared winners in the Seattle Japanese Golf Association tournament held at Jefferson park. Kobayashi netted 67 with Nagamine following one stroke behind. In the "B" flight race, Tsukada scored a net 68 with Ozawa and Atarashi tied for second honors with 69.

### MILITARY...

Dave Noguchi has the unusual honor in being the first Japanese to be accepted for training as an air cadet in the nation's training program. The University of California graduate in mechanical engineering is due to report at Randolph field, Texas, for training, after which he will get a commission of a second lieutenant in the reserves and will await appointment to the Regular Army.

## Ex-G. I. Notes

Before we continue on with today's column we must state again that anonymous letters, regardless as to value, will be tossed into the fire without a "look-see." However, upon request identification will be withheld. This column and paper's respect would sink if this practice keeps up.

Our number one letter, we print as follows:

Sir:  
This will acknowledge your recent letter in which you acquaint me with your organization and have sent me a copy of your resolution relative to amendment of the naturalization laws.

Perhaps a bill to include the provisions you desire is to be introduced to Congress, but a hasty study of the record fails to disclose that it has.

The only bill which I have discovered on which action has been taken is H.R. 3555, which has been passed by the House of Representatives and has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee. Its provisions include legislation permitting the naturalization of parents of Japanese-Americans who were killed or injured in the war. Another bill, H.R. 3149, has been reported by the House Judiciary Committee which, however, does not relate to naturalization but permits the immigration of G. I. brides.

Dear Ex-G.I. Joe:

Re: The letter by Reader (Anonymous).

My utmost apologies to Anonymous for the ire I must have instilled into him by my crude, "narrowminded" discourse on such a very touchy subject. And since reading your most esteemed criticisms I have taken your advice and have done some "deep-thinking"; yes, in fact, some deep, deep

thinking if you please.  
But no matter how much I deliberate over the matter I have come to the conclusion that I stand condemned and plead guilty to your charges of "narrowmindedness" (that is; your version of narrowmindedness) for the following reasons:

1. I am a chronic sufferer of claustrophobia which may account for my narrowminded views which you so graciously accuse me of possessing. Please be sympathetic to a diseased mind.

2. I will emphatically state once again that only those who have proven by conduct, character or speech (whether Negro, Chinese, Issei, Nisei or otherwise) that they can adhere to the principles and policies of the NVC (which incidentally is the policies and principles represented by the government of the United States) should be made eligible for membership in this Veterans' league. If such a by-law in the league's constitution reflects on the "character, conduct and principle" of the so-called "barrier" and not that of the "barred" as you state, I heartily accept a double-dose of such reflections. Moreover, for the information of those who are opposed to restricted membership in the league, please note that the league sponsorship was unwillingly accepted and tossed upon the NVC. Would the sub-sisters like to take over?

3. I am sure that those Honored Dead fought for world peace and I presume that they would turn over in their graves and may even rise

in defiance if they ever thought of democracy. I heartily agree with you on these points. And furthermore, I say, as you do, that world peace begins at home, within the family and community. But did it not occur to you that during Pre-War days and Relocation Camp days that there were those who were instilling into their children, friends and the weak-minded and among the community and relocation camp in general, the greatness of the enemy and all but disrupting and contaminating the minds of children and the weak-minded against the great effort of this country to attain this world peace as soon as possible? Yes sir, Honorable critic, world peace breeds in a family and community where such ideas are utilized and not where opposite idealisms and forces are at work to disrupt them. I believe we still have those Mindoka Laundry Soap-brokers among us.

4. I grieve with remorse when I think of the consequence which our community may be made to suffer if dissension among our ranks is disseminated to the unknown public but I am throwing all caution to the winds and will at every opportunity divulge my opinions whether by speech or word upon controversial subjects which affect me even though such publications or speeches may "cause unfavorable reflection and embarrassment to all Nisei" such as you state. Who is actually narrowminded, Honorable Critic, you or I? Or to be more elucidating, Honorable Critic, let us assume that a friend of yours was murdered by a person you recognized, another Nisei. No one else was witness to the crime but yourself. According to your manner of thinking such an incident would be a black mark against the Nisei and the community so a total secrecy of the incident would be held by you or would you?

5. Lastly, as long as there are approximately 53 grand guys who were from this vicinity lying "six feet under" in some lonely cemetery, I cannot see the hundreds or maybe there are thousands of the so-called "flag-wavers" etc., basking in the glory made possible only by the efforts of the fallen dead. And among those who have come back are those who, you state, refused to serve in the armed forces when called because they "stood

by their beliefs." What beliefs or whose beliefs? Standing by one's conviction is a manly virtue whether good or bad, but others imposed upon them are not. It seems odd that so many among us asked for expatriation or repatriation but suddenly changed their minds when hostilities ended.

In conclusion, in the sports pages of our daily newspaper of October 1st I noticed with interest articles condemning the great, middleweight fighter, Rocky Graziano. "Graziano Faces Threat of Nationwide Ban" headline an article. He served his term at Leavenworth while in the service which is the military counterpart of McNeil which is for civilians. It seems they are not (the public) going to "forgive and forget" Rocky (the Rock) Graziano, eh, eh, eh, Honorable Critic?

## Sociologist-Author Assails 'Slums' As By-Product of Capitalistic Way To Exploit Minority Peoples

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 7.—"Slums are a natural by-product of our capitalistic system—a system which makes possible and even condones the exploitation of its minority peoples."

Willard Motley, sociologist-author whose "Knock On Any Door" is a current best-seller, made that statement before 200 persons attending the first fall meeting of the Chicago chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League recently. The large audience taxed the capacity of the Woodrow Wilson Room in the International Relations Center, 84 E. Randolph, where the meeting was held.

"People in the slums don't like the slums any better than you or I do, but they just can't help themselves," the speaker said. Motley chose for his subject the people of the slums with whom he lived daily during the years that he was gathering data for his now famous novel. The characters in "Knock On Any Door" are composites of many of these people whom he came to know so intimately, Motley said.

The speaker told his interracial audience, many of whom were non-JACL members, how he was inspired to write his book. A young friend, a boy of 12, was committed to the St. Charles reformatory for a relatively minor offense. When the boy was released, he had developed into a hardened criminal by his association with real criminals. Motley was moved to expose a system which actually was responsible for producing criminals. Nine years of writing and research went into "Knock On Any Door."

During a brief business session that preceded the speaker, the membership present voted to amend the wording of the proposed amendment to the Chicago chapter constitution, which would permit Issei to become associate members.

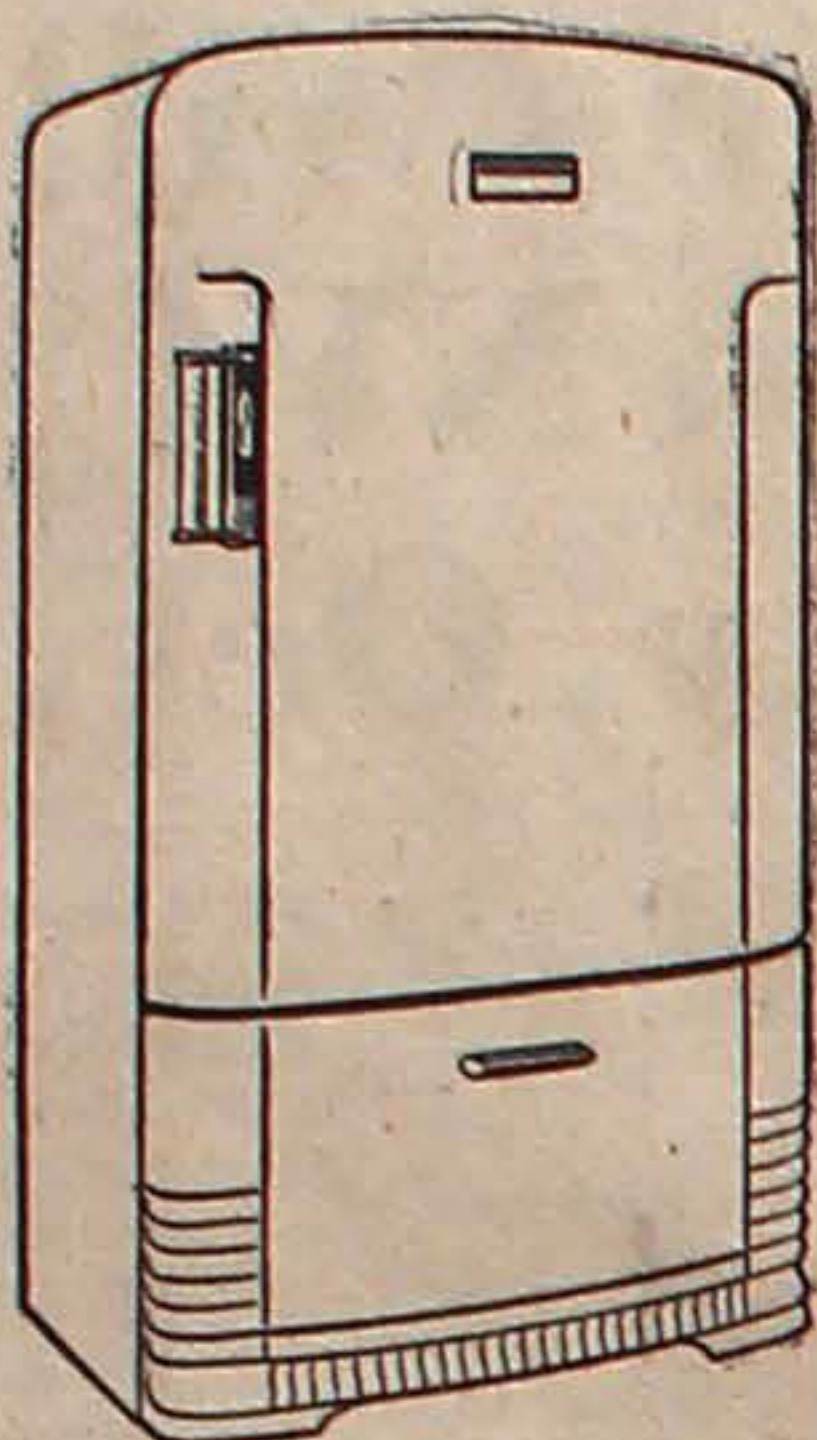

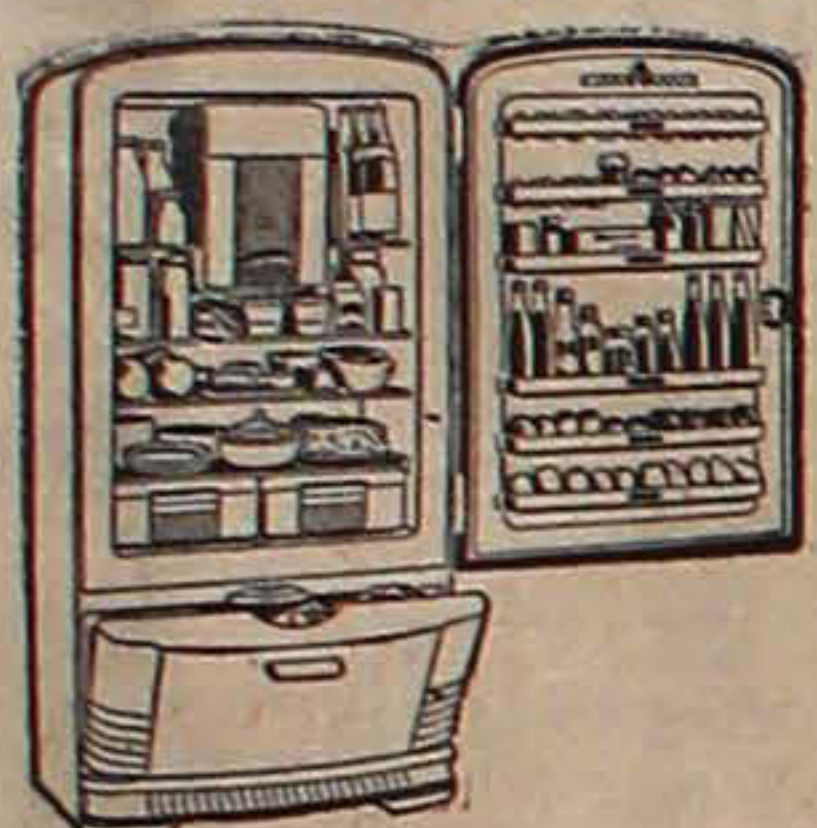

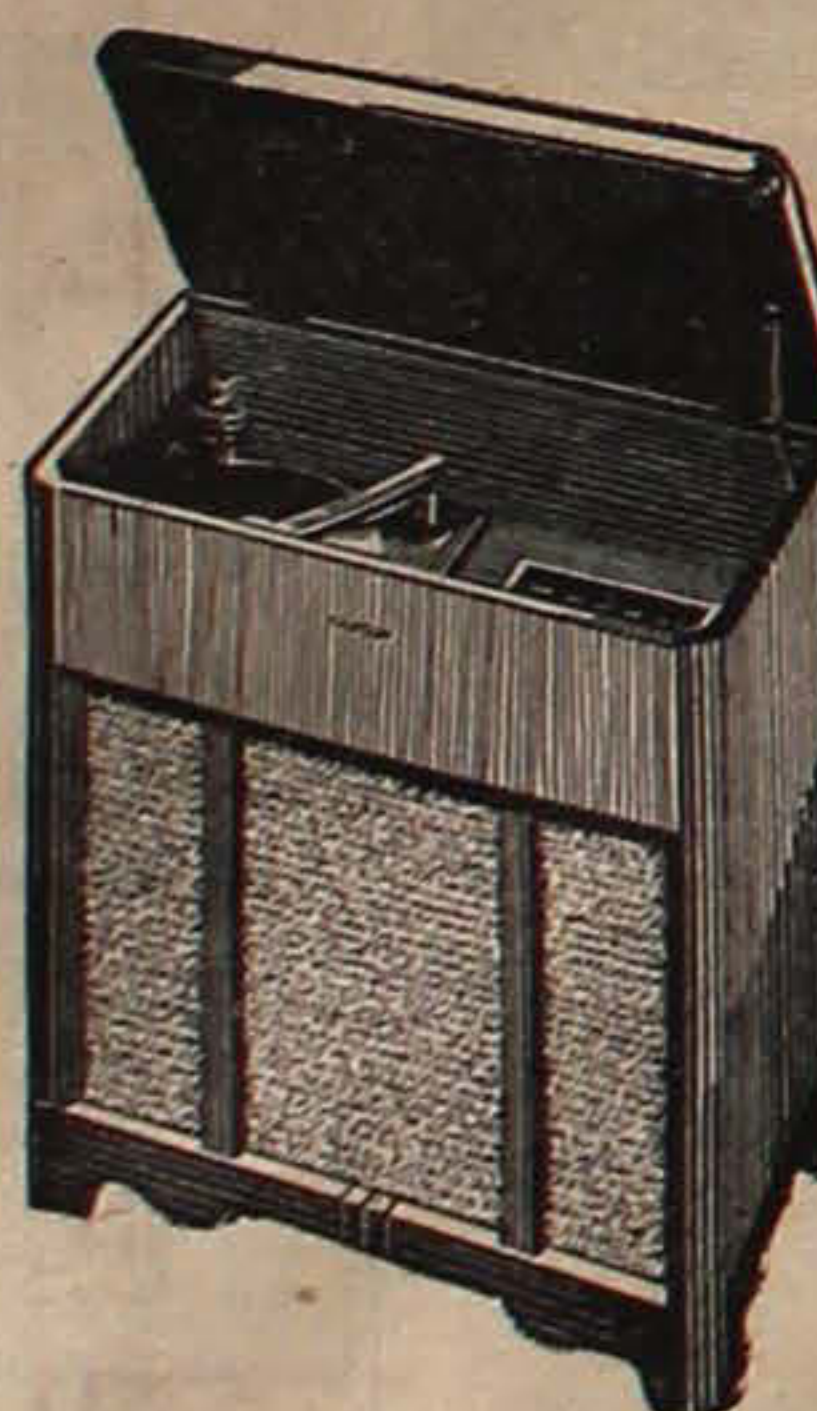

## Devin Designates Fire Curb Week

Mayor William F. Devin has designated this week, Oct. 5 to 11, as Fire Prevention Week in Seattle.  
His office released the following statement made by him in observance of Fire Prevention Week:  
"The Seattle Fire Department, in cooperation with the Parent Teacher Association, the King County Insurance Association, the Seattle Safety Council and many other civic organizations, is sponsoring the annual observance of Fire Prevention Week during the period from October 5th to 11th.  
"During that time an extensive program of public information will be carried on by all of the participating groups. These activities are particularly timely and of the utmost importance to the citizens of Seattle.  
"Although this city has one of the finest fire safety records in the nation, still we have annual fire losses involving tremendous sums of money, as well as untold hardship and suffering.  
"In recognition of the splendid efforts of the Fire Department and the civic organizations which are cooperating with it, I am glad to designate the week of October 5th to 11th, 1947, as Fire Prevention Week and to urge that all of our citizens recognize the objectives of the week by accepting as a personal challenge the duty of making their homes, offices and other structures safe from the ravages of fire."

## Urges Pressure On Truman

ST LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 7.—Noting that the Truman Administration has not officially endorsed the extension of naturalization privileges for all those now denied these privileges, Mike Masaka, national legislative director of the Japanese American Citizens League Anti-Discrimination Committee, urged Nisel and other Missourians to request President Harry S. Truman to do so.  
"Such support, combined with the active Senate and House support of Missouri's congressional delegation, would prove most helpful to our legislative program," Masaka told a meeting of the members of the St. Louis JACL chapter and their friends at the YWCA last week. Henry Tan, chapter president, was chairman.

## VFW DISCLOSES TALENT AMONG NEW OFFICERS

Newly elected national officers of the Veterans of Foreign Wars bring to the organization an immense pool of talent and experience in military, civic and economic problems.

Topping the list is Ray H. Brannaman, of Denver, Colorado, incoming national commander-in-chief. Holder of a master's degree in education and with bachelor's study in agriculture and mechanical arts, he was a school superintendent for 15 years in his home state. For nine years he was a member of the Colorado Industrial Commission, serving as chairman for four years.  
Brannaman's particular interest in veterans and their rehabilitation has been recognized by a number of federal agencies to which he has served as consultant. His military record shows he commanded an air squadron in World War I, and that he won personal commendation from General John J. Pershing for the record it set.  
Lyall T. Beggs, new senior vice commander-in-chief from Madison, Wis., is a long-time leader in legal and public service fields. Although his education was interrupted by entering Army service at 18 in World War I, he returned to Wisconsin to win a diploma from a teacher's college and a degree in law. He was district attorney for his home county from 1934 to 1939, and in 1940 was elected to the state legislature, where he still serves.

First World War II veteran to win the office, Clyde A. Lewis, Plattsburgh, N.Y., is junior vice commander-in-chief. An attorney in private practice, he holds an A. B. from Notre Dame University and an LL.B. from Harvard Law School. A B-17 pilot with the famous 8th Air Force, he rose from private to major during the war. His decorations include the Croix de Guerre, Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, and Air Medal with four oak leaf clusters.

Now entering his 25th year as the V.F.W.'s quartermaster general, R.B. Handy, Jr., of Kansas City, Mo., has long used his knowledge and experience in veterans' affairs in betterment of the nation's fighting man. He was first chairman of the V.F.W.'s committee to handle Buddy Poppy sales for benefit of their widows and orphans, and served in the same job from 1923 to 1946. A captain in World War I, he was assigned to an infantry regiment and later to the Chemical Warfare Service and the War Plans division of the War Department general staff.

Hudson Hyatt, of Cleveland, Ohio, is another World War II veteran and incoming judge advocate general. Only 33, he is an attorney in the legal department of a large, railroad company, and was a Navy lieutenant, j.g., and communication officer on the island of Tinian.  
New surgeon general of the V.F.W. is nationally-known outstanding physician, Dr. William R. Morrison, Belmont, Mass. Surgeon-in-chief of Boston City Hospital, he is the founder of the American Board of Surgery, and has taught in several of the country's best-known medical schools. He holds fellowships in a number of medical societies, and is keenly interested in treatment of wounded and disabled former servicemen.

Ministering to religious needs as national chaplain is the Rev. Merritt F. Williams, canon of Washington Cathedral, Washington, D. C., and a Navy veteran of both world wars. A "fighting chaplain" in World War II, he was wounded in the Solomon Islands campaign. He was twice awarded the Bronze Star medal, and was a survivor of the sinking of the U.S.S. WASP. The citation accompanying his first Bronze Star, speaking of his actions during the WASP's sinking, says in part: "After the ship was mortally damaged and numerous casualties were being inflicted on her personnel as the result of terrific explosions aboard, he calmly and effectively assisted in attending to the seriously wounded and in getting them clear of the ship until the task was completed."

## Morikawa Named Baptist Pastor

Invitations had been extended to a number of Nisei veterans who served either in the 100th Battalion or the 442nd Regiment.
