## American President Line Discloses Revised Sked of Sailings, Arrivals

The following revised schedule of sailings and arrivals was announced this week by the American President Line for its Orient service.

Instead of sailing from San Francisco to Manila, via Yokohama, Shanghai and Hongkong and returning via these ports, the new schedules call for circular voyages with one call in each port on each voyage.

## It's Clean-Up Time in Tokyo; City Regime May Manage Baths

TOKYO, Oct. 10—Socialization of baths is under official consideration in a move to comfort Tokyo citizens during the coming winter months according to newspaper reports.

Under present plans the city government will assume direct management of 50 public bathhouses in the Tokyo area, financially subsidizing them and supplying them with fuel for a "large scale cut" in the present admission rates.

Officials at the public health section of the metropolitan police said this step should considerably aid citizens, many of whom are now able to take no more than one or two baths per month due to high fuel costs.

# Nisei War Dead on Second Shipment Of State Servicemen Killed in Action

## FINAL BRIEF ON OYAMA CASE FILED IN D. C.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 10—The final brief on the important Oyama alien land law test case was filed this week in the U. S. supreme court in Washington, D. C. It was announced here by A. L. Wirin, Oyama's attorney.

Oral arguments are to be presented before the nation's highest tribunal on Oct. 21.

The brief was also signed by Charles A. Horsky and Ernest W. Jennes of Washington, D. C., prominent attorneys for the American Civil Liberties Union.

Countersigning the brief were James C. Purcell, William E. Ferriter and Guy C. Calden of San Francisco for the Northern California Civil Rights Defense Union and Saburo Kido, Fred Okrand and Frank Chuman of Los Angeles for the JACL.

The first and main point of the brief stressed the fact that the right of Fred Oyama, an American-born citizen, were ignored and emphasized the rights of the citizen as against K. Oyama, the Japanese alien.

Citizen Not Protected

On this point the brief recited: "The decision of the court (California supreme court) deprives petitioner Fred Oyama of the equal protection of the laws and the privileges and immunities of a citizen."

"In California minor children other than those of Japanese ancestry may receive gifts of real estate from their parents with no presumption that the transaction is illegal. The alien land law as applied here requires Fred Oyama, solely because he is the son of a Japanese alien, to defend his gift against the claim of the state..."

Next in order, the brief urged that the California alien land law violates the 14th amendment to the United States Constitution because it is race legislation; that the law was intended to apply solely against Japanese and has been enforced only against Japanese; that the phrase, "aliens ineligible to citizenship" in the law "is merely a veil" which the supreme court should pierce.

New Decision Sought

In the third point, the brief argued that the U. S. Supreme court should now overrule its former decisions, approximately 25 years old, in which the supreme court then ruled that the alien land law constitutional.

It is pointed out that "conditions have changed since the earlier cases"; and the supreme court is urged to change its decision to meet changed conditions.

The final point claimed that the failure of the California courts to protect American-born Japanese by giving them the benefit of California's "statute of limitations" which require ordinarily that a legal proceeding be filed within a certain period, deprives both Fred Oyama and his father, K. Oyama, of the "equal protection of the laws" under the 14th amendment to the United States Constitution.

## 'The Unknown Soldier' to Depict Nisei, Irishman, Jew, Negro and Italian, Louella Parsons Reports

A Japanese American soldier of whom Gen. Mark Clark spoke will have his heroic story told along with those of an Irishman, a Jew, a Negro and an Italian in Dore Schary's picture, "The Unknown Soldier," according to Louella O. Parsons, motion picture editor of International News Service.

"The Unknown Soldier," the columnist wrote, will be based on the War department's decision to bring back nine heroes of the war from each of the war zones.

Thirteen writers were summoned by Schary to discuss the stories to be used, and each episode will be made by a top R.K.O. producer, director and star, and written by a top-flight writer.

Schary told the columnist that Cary Grant has consented to be in one of the episodes, Robert Mitchum in another, and Robert Ryan in still another. Schary, the columnist added, is working very closely with the War department on the production of this picture.

## Nisei Helps Build Machines To Ease Back-Breaking Work in Harvesting of Sugar Beets

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Oct. 10—Two machines that will alleviate much of the back-breaking work in the harvesting of sugar beets have been designed and built by Sam Kosaka of Picture Butte and Andy Brioli. The Nisei inventor is also the shop foreman of the Alberta Beet Co-operative Implement Limited, newly organized to build these machines.

Sam Kosaka is reputed one of the top Nisei mechanics. A former resident of Vancouver, B. C., he was evacuated to Alberta in 1942. His brother, George is a

mechanic in a Picture Butte garage.

The two machines are the Sam 'N' Andy two-row beet topper designed to top and elevate two rows of tops which are siloed, and Sam 'N' Andy pick-up loader which loads four rows of beets at a time. No furrowing is necessary for this equipment.

Last year these machines were tried for the first time and a considerable number will probably be used this year. A factory has been built in Lethbridge by the A.B.C. Implements Ltd.

## REV. FLANAGAN, MASAOKA SPEAK IN OMAHA FETE

OMAHA, Neb., Oct. 10—The Rt. Rev. E. J. Flanagan, Founder and Director of Father Flanagan's Boys Town, and Mike Masaoka, national legislative director of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee, shared speaking honors at the installation banquet of the Omaha JACL Chapter last weekend at the Regis Hotel.

Father Flanagan, recently returned from a visit to Japan and Korea under the sponsorship of the War Department and General MacArthur, told of his experiences in the Orient with particular emphasis on the problem of juvenile delinquency. He expressed great admiration for the way the Japanese people were trying to work their way out of a most difficult situation and declared that Japan could be one of America's greatest friends.

Masaoka reported on the progress of the ADC legislative program in Washington and called upon the chapter members and their friends to support the program in order that it might be consummated next session. He stressed the importance of the Midwest and particularly the Nebraska chapters in this program, pointing out that the majority of the key Republican congressmen are from this region.

As an added feature of the banquet, Masaoka, on behalf of the National JACL and his mother, Mrs. Haruyo Masaoka of Los Angeles, California, presented the Second Annual Pvt. Ben Frank Masaoka Memorial Scholarship to ex-GI Kazuo Oshiki, a veteran of the Leyte and Luzon invasions and of the occupation of Japan while an interpreter-translator with the Army Air Corps, is now a junior student majoring in Journalism at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa.

Climaxing the evening, Masaoka, former national executive secretary and field executive of the JACL, formally installed K. Patrick Okura as President, Kazuo Ikebasu as 1st Vice President, Joe Matsunami as 2nd Vice President, Susan Kumagai as Recording Secretary, Lily Y. Okura as Corresponding Secretary, and Frank Tamai as Treasurer of the Omaha chapter.

Honored guests at the installation ceremonies included State Senator and Mrs. Harry Foster, dean of Nebraska's Unicameral Legislature; Mr. and Mrs. Howard Drew, president of the Omaha Jr. Chamber of Commerce; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Peters, executive secretary of the Omaha Jr. Chamber of Commerce; and Rith Camell, executive director of the Omaha YWCA.

Sunday morning, Masaoka addressed an overflow meeting at the St. Paul's Methodist Church. As a demonstration of Christian brotherhood, he asked for individual support for the naturalization and evacuation claims bills.

That same afternoon, he discussed the ADC program in Washington in greater detail than he had been able to during the installation banquet at a special meeting of the Omaha chapter and their friends.

Monday, he visited Boys Town. Together with Patrick Okura, assistant welfare chief of the famous Catholic institution, Masaoka conferred with Father Flanagan who expressed his willingness to do everything possible to support the ADC and JACL programs.

Following his conferences with other civic and religious leaders in Nebraska, Masaoka explained for Denver where he is scheduled for another busy week of meetings and conferences.

## No Japanese Americans in First Group, Hara of Seattle Gold Star Parents Told By Army's Graves Registration Unit

Nisei War Dead will not be among the first shipment of Washington War Dead to be returned to their homeland for reburial, according to Seiichi Hara of the Seattle Japanese Gold Star Parents, who was informed yesterday of this fact by the Army's American Graves Registration Division at the Auburn General Depot. It was disclosed, however, that there may be some Nisei War Dead included in the second shipment which is scheduled to arrive at the Auburn Depot in December.

## V.F.W. Offers Military Rites

Pull military honors at funeral services for Second World War dead being returned to this country for burial may be had at request of next-of-kin, Charles C. Ralls, state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, announced today.

Membership in the V.F.W. by the dead or any member of the family is not a requirement, Ralls said, and the majority of the state's V.F.W. posts will furnish burial teams, riflemen and color guards.

The first Pacific Northwest war dead will arrive at the Army Graves Registration Depot, Auburn, between October 11 and 15. According to present estimates, 5,446 war dead will be returned to the state with 1,106 of that number going to King County.

Next-of-kin desiring services of the V.F.W. teams should notify local posts or the state V.F.W. public relations officer, John F. Gordon, 4117 Arcade Building.

## DENVER BEATS PROVISIONS TO END BIAS

DENVER, Colo., Oct. 10—Two attempts to include anti-discrimination provisions in the proposed City Charter were defeated this week as charter delegates continued third reading of proposals.

In Section 10, which covers licensing powers of the city, an amendment was proposed to prohibit any establishment providing public accommodations from denying these accommodations to any one for reasons of race, creed or national origin.

This presumably would have prohibited landlords or operators of restaurants, theatres and other businesses dealings with the public from discriminating because of race.

Delegates Bill Grant and Olof Jacobson spoke against the amendment. Grant said he was opposed to the method of enforcement—cancellation or suspension of licenses—and doubted whether the provisions would be accepted by the voters. Jacobson said he be-

Lt. Col. Vernon L. Lewis, chief of the Graves Division at Auburn, has announced that arrangements for handling the first shipment of 154 War Dead to Washington, western Oregon and ten counties in northern Idaho have been completed.

According to present plans, 5,446 War Dead will be returned to the State of Washington. Of this number, 3,941 are from army service and 1,505 from the navy, coast guard and marines. King, Pierce and Snohomish counties will have the majority of returning Washington War Dead with 1,106, 117 and 189, respectively.

The remains of the War Dead are being brought home for final burial at the request of the next-of-kin. Of the nation's 300,000 fallen servicemen, less than 30 per cent will remain in military cemeteries overseas.

After arriving in this country from overseas military cemeteries in a special ship, painted white with a wide purple band painted the length of the ship, the American War Dead from the Pacific Northwest will travel to Auburn in special mortuary train with military escorts. At the Auburn depot, the steel caskets, each in a metal-lined plywood shipping case, will be unloaded from railroad cars and will go to private funeral homes chosen by the next-of-kin. Those going long distances will go by train again, this time with a military escort from the branch of service in which the deceased served. Those going points close to Auburn and not on a railroad line will go in military hearses renovated from wartime ambulances and will also have military escorts.

Colonel Lewis said that when the remains, and the American flags covering the cases, are turned over to the next-of-kin, the Army's responsibility will cease. However, he added that the army will cooperate if families desire military funeral.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States has committed itself to complete cooperation in providing military funerals for the returning American War Dead.

Heved state anti-discrimination laws provide adequate protection at the present. The amendment was killed by a vote of eight to 12.

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## JACL Aide Protests against Bias In Full Membership in Unions

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 10—A protest against the discrimination practice of barring Japanese Americans and others of Oriental ancestry from full membership in many unions affiliated with the American Federation of Labor was voiced in a letter sent by Joe Masaoka, regional JACL director, to William Green, AFL president, now in San Francisco to attend the national convention of the labor body.

Masaoka pointed out that most of the building trade unions barred Nisei from union membership and permit only veterans to enroll in trade schools. The veterans, however, have not been able to secure union membership.

Several other union groups, such as the teamsters have permitted Orientals to form their own affiliated unions, but deny full membership privileges to these units.

Other unions, such as the AFL cannery workers union, bar Orientals in certain areas and allow them to join in others. Japanese Americans are members of the cannery union in Stockton and Sacramento, but reported to be barred in San Francisco.

Many garage mechanics, including veterans, who were able to join unions in the East have been denied membership here, it was also reported.

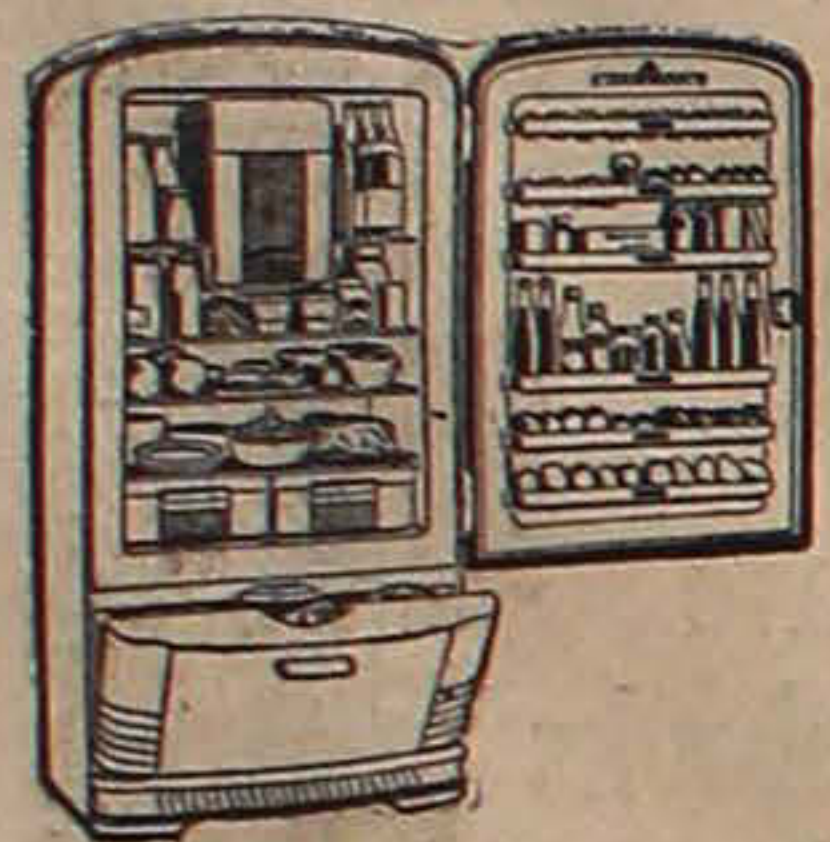

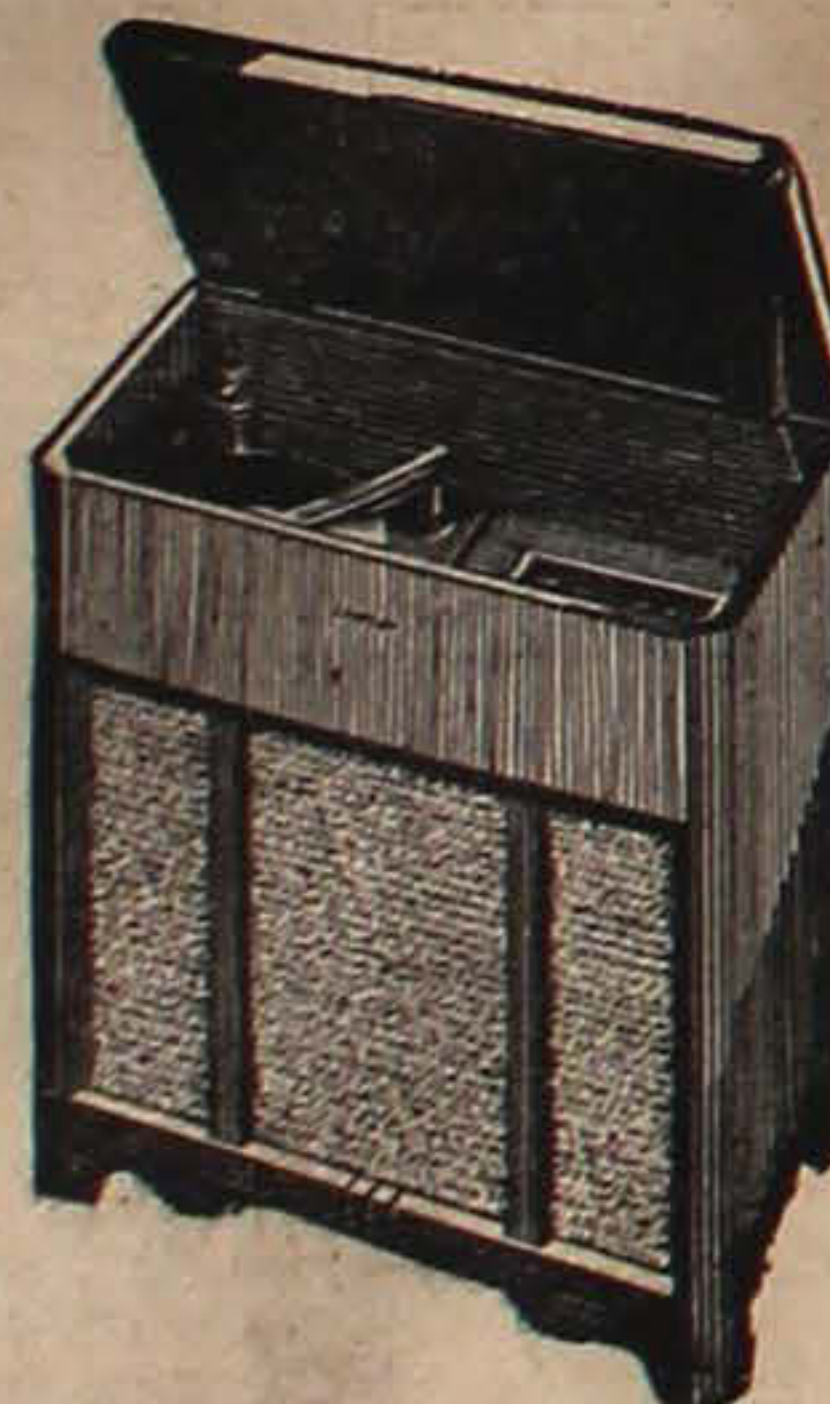

Of the 1,230 Issei and Nisei who contributed a total of \$9,022.50, a Nisei and Issei each gave \$200. Another \$200 was jointly donated by the Chicago chapter of the JACL and the Chicago Resettlers Committee.

According to Dick Yamada, executive secretary for the campaign, several anonymous donations were received, including one for \$50. Yamada estimated that almost half of the contributors were Nisei. Thirty Issei-Nisei soliciting teams participated in the city-wide drive in ten designated zones, he explained, stating that a complete statement of donations received will be mailed to every contributor.

Matsunaga expressed his gratitude to the generous response of the Chicago Japanese community, and his particular thanks to the volunteers who carried on the drive even during the oppressive August heat.

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JCCC PROMISES  
LEGAL EXPERTS  
FOR JAPANESE

TORONTO, Canada, Oct. 10—Legal representatives of the Co-operative Committee on Japanese Canadians are being appointed across Canada to assist Japanese Canadians in presenting evacuation loss claims efficiently and at the minimum expense. It was announced this week by Margaret K. Boos, Secretary of the Co-operative Committee.

The plan was worked out in close co-operation and consultation with officers of the National Japanese Canadian Citizens Association.

To provide a minimum fund to cover legal fees, expenses of valuation and other necessary disbursements, each claimant who desires to take part in the plan will be asked a retaining fee of 1% of the total loss claimed by him.

Additional legal expenses will be paid proportionately by the successful claimants out of claims allowed by the Commissioner.

Statement Outlines the Three Steps Required in Presentation of Claims  
 The Co-operative Committee's statement explains that three steps are required in the presentation of claims:

1. filing of claims verified by affidavits and containing the information required by the Commissioner's notice.

(The Co-operative Committee will have forms complying with these requirements printed and will circulate them with instructions as to how they should be filled in and sent to the Commissioner. All who filed the JCCD's Loss Survey Forms and whose claims are within the terms of reference will receive these forms, and others who may desire to use them.)

2. the presentation of oral evidence of claimants to the Commissioner at the hearings.

3. the presentation of evidence of valuations and other similar evidence in British Columbia.

The statement continues: "It is obvious that in the last two steps, legal counsel will be required if a strong and effective case for compensation is to be established. The Co-operative Committee has, therefore, evolved a scheme for legal assistance."

"Claimants may, of course obtain independent legal advice, if they prefer to do so."

"It appears, however, that many may not be able to do so, and that the co-ordinated presentation of cases of claimants will save expense and in other ways be more effective. It is proposed, therefore, that the Co-operative Committee... name its legal representatives in each province, who co-operate with each other in presenting claims in each province."

The Co-operative Committee's statement concludes: "The Co-operative Committee believes that in this way much time and great expense can be saved and a coordinated and co-operative effort made to ensure that the Commissioner receives and adequate presentation of the just claims of the Japanese Canadians. Announcement as to further steps to be taken in co-operation with the National Japanese Canadian Citizens Association will be made as soon as possible."
