

## Attorney General's Approval on Claims Bill Sought

### Measure Raps Any Anti-Hate Material

#### N. Y. SOLON NOTES BIGOTRY AIDS ENEMIES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2—A bill which would make it a crime for persons to disseminate through mails or by other public channels of commerce any written material designed to expose Jews and members of other minority groups to hatred or ridicule or which has a tendency to injure them in their occupation, employment, or other economic activities, is up before the Post Office and Civil Service Committee of the House of Representatives, the Washington office of the JACL ADC learned this week.

The bill was introduced during the 80th session by Representative Charles A. Buckley, Democrat of New York, who noted that bigotry and anti-Semitism are potent weapons in the hands of the enemies of the United States. His bill pointed out that enemies of this country and its institutions have been and are using the U. S. mails and the channels of interstate and foreign commerce to spread the doctrines and foster the feelings of anti-Semitism, religious and racial hatred because of race, creed, or color, thereby tending to destroy the unity of this nation, creating discord among our people and disrupting the economic life of the country.

Under the provisions of the Buckley bill, not only would it be unlawful to bring into the United States any printed material which would create racial antagonism and friction, but also the circulation of any such material within the United States would be held a criminal violation. The bill would also make it illegal for any person to take or receive from the mails, or any express company or common carrier, material designed to arouse race dissension. The reading to others of such literature would also be held criminal. Violators of these provisions would be subject to a fine of not more than \$5,000 and imprisonment for not more than five years.

#### Canadian Japanese Recalls Trip To Seattle during Thanksgiving

On Thanksgiving week-end Miss Margaret Ridgeway, Mrs. Tatsue Okamoto and myself took a trip to Seattle. There we took part in a number of meetings telling about the work of the Nisei Christian Fellowships in Canada sponsored by the Canadian Japanese Mission.

We met a number of outstanding Nisei Christians in this American city which has a Japanese population of about 4,000. We noted with admiration the way in which the Christian Caucasian friends of the Japanese had taken so much interest on behalf of Christ.

Jake Kawakami, an ex-GI with service in Uncle Sam's army stretching from Attu on the north to Australia in the south and the Philippines and Japan in the east, told me of many interesting experiences, especially of his part in the GI Gospel Hour and Japan Youth for Christ. He is the hard-working secretary of the Japanese Presbyterian Church and is at present in his senior year at University of Washington.

Jake took me out to his Alma Mater and dumped me into a class

taking post-graduate physics, a course far beyond human comprehension. Looking over the campus and beautiful Gothic designs of the college buildings which house a student body of 17,000, I came to the conclusion that U.B.C. has an edge in the beauty of the campus but Washington has twice as many buildings.

**TWO HUNDRED NISEI ATTEND WASHINGTON**  
There are approximately 200 Nisei attending the University of Washington today, and two Nisei are on the faculty.

Jackson Street was the Japanese centre of Seattle in pre-war days. Today one only sees Negroes and a very small sprinkling of Japanese there. I never saw so many Negroes in my life. They seemed satisfied and happy. According to Jake and George Momo, at whose home I stayed for four days, the Japanese population is scattered throughout Seattle—a very good sign.

**TROLLEY BUSES CREDIT TO SEATTLE**  
One must give Seattle credit for its transit system of trolley buses. After a ride in a trolley, one feels that Vancouver's street car strike can continue as long as it wants until the B. C. Electric installs trolley buses also.

An interesting paradox which struck me during my visit to Seattle was the fact that throughout the American Pacific Coast thousands of Japanese have been allowed to return while just a few miles north of the border no Japanese are allowed within 100 miles of the same coast.

#### Nisei Group in Chicago Joins Round-the-World Yule Program

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 2—As its contribution to the Spirit of Christmas in America, the Japanese American group in Chicago will participate in the Museum of Science and Industry's sixth annual Christmas round the world program.

Some twenty-three nationality groups will take part in the program which began last Saturday.

This annual event sponsored by the Museum, one of the foremost institutions in the country, draws thousands of visitors each year.

The Japanese portion of the program will be given on Saturday, Dec. 13. Japanese foods will be served in the cafeteria of the museum between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. on that day.

The committee on foods is planning a suitable menu, the probable choice being chicken teriyaki, tempura or sukiyaki.

All musical portion of the program will be recorded, and they will be available to the performing groups after the first of the year. A series of visual-aid color movies to be shown to groups also will be taken.

The contribution of this group will be the decorating of one of the trees in the rotunda of the museum, a musical program, and serving of Japanese food in the cafeteria.

#### Model X-Ray Unit



This model is a small-scale reproduction of the type of mobile X-ray unit used by tuberculosis associations in many communities in mass case-finding services. Fully equipped units of this type can be driven from place to place to chest X-ray large groups of people in a minimum of time. Christmas Seal funds support the mass case-finding programs of the associations.

#### Holiday Mail Includes Invitation To Free X-Ray on Seal Unit

Your holiday mail which brought you Christmas Seals this week included an invitation from the Anti-Tuberculosis League of King County to have a free chest x-ray on the Christmas Seal X-ray Unit while it will be stationed in downtown Seattle starting Monday, Dec. 1, through Dec. 19, George D. Anderson, Seal Sale chairman of the Anti-Tuberculosis League of King County, said yesterday.

The unit which was brought and is maintained by Christmas Seal funds, will be parked on the north-west corner of Fourth Ave. and Pike St. every day Monday through Friday for the next three weeks. It will be open from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. offering free chest x-rays to

those 18 years of age and older who wish to check their health. "X-ray is the most effective method of finding insipient tuberculosis. We urge everyone to stop by while doing his Christmas shopping to see if his chest is healthy. Sometimes tuberculosis is present for many months without showing any symptoms. We want to be sure he is healthy", Anderson said.

The miniature films taken on the unit screen out persons with abnormal chests. Those wis suspicious findings are referred to a radiologist for a 14" x 17" diagnostic x-ray and to their physician for an interpretation. Both x-rays are free-paid for by Christmas Seals. Christmas Seals are the sole support of the year-round program of the League.

Each person x-rayed receives a confidential report of the findings. About one person in every 300 x-rayed is discovered with active tuberculosis.

#### MASAOKA APPEALS TO FOLSOM IN CIVIL RIGHTS UNIT FOR AID IN WINNING CLARK'S ATTENTION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2—Mike Masaoka, national legislative director of the JACL-ADC, during a conference last weekend with Fred G. Folsom, acting chief of the Civil Rights Section of the Department of Justice, strongly appealed to Folsom to use his good offices in bringing these matters immediately to the attention of the Attorney General. Masaoka pointed out the Justice Department's growing responsibility in implementing the recommendations of the civil rights committee.

The committee's recommendations, he noted, urged prompt passage by Congress of legislation indemnifying evacuee losses, modification of our naturalization laws which prohibit alien Japanese from obtaining U. S. citizenship, and repeal of other statutes discriminating against Japanese of this country.

Masaoka urged the acting chief of the civil rights section to appeal to the Attorney General for direct support in facilitating Senate approval of the evacuation claims bill, pointing out that the Administration-sponsored measure had been endorsed by both Interior Secretary Krug and Undersecretary Chapman, who later personally appeared before Congressional committees in support of the evacuee indemnification program. He hoped that Mr. Clark would agree to actively aid in the final passage of the measure since it has already been unanimously approved by the House of Representatives.

Since the Attorney General will be given the authority to adjudicate evacuation compensation if Congress approves the bill, Mr. Masaoka voiced the hope that a meeting with the head of the Justice Department and his staff could be arranged shortly to iron out the various problems involved. The projected conference might also be a sounding board for consideration of other problems which affect the welfare of resident Japanese.

Masaoka said he would appeal to the Attorney General to take the various problems involved. The lead in securing modification of our naturalization laws and thus enable Japanese aliens to gain an opportunity to obtain U. S. citizenship. He indicated he would also request the Justice Department to file a brief amicus curiae in the Takahashi alien fishing case such as it is now doing for petitioners in the restrictive covenants cases to be reviewed by the U. S. Supreme Court next month.

The California Supreme Court in deciding the Takahashi case last October upheld a wartime law which denies aliens of Japanese ancestry the right to obtain commercial fishing licenses. Attorneys for Mr. Takahashi are now seeking a review of the California court's decision by the U. S. Supreme Court on the ground that the California anti-alien fishing law is discriminatory and unconstitutional.

Upon the request of the families and next of kin concerned, the committee will arrange to have committee members represent the families of the Nisei war dead, place flowers at the graves, and take pictures of the ceremonies to be sent to the families.

#### Notify Hirose, Vet Kin Urged

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 25—All next of kin of the Nisei soldier dead who are to be interred in Arlington National Cemetery are requested to notify Jack Hirose, chairman of the JACL Committee for Arlington Cemetery, as soon as they learn from the Department of the Army of the arrival in New York or San Francisco of their loved ones' remains and the date of their scheduled reburial in Arlington, the Washington office of the JACL Anti-Discrimination Committee reported today.

Hirose's committee emphasized that immediate notification to his committee is imperative if it is to make any arrangements for special services provided for the families of the war dead by the JACL chapter. He pointed out that the Army Department notifies only next of kin and that the committee has no other way of learning of these dates.

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#### Larger Legislation Would Provide Free Postage for Relief Packages

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 2—Legislation to provide free postage for gift packages of food and clothing intended for the relief of individuals in Japan or Germany was introduced in the Senate last week by Senator William Langer, Republican of North Dakota. The bill was referred to the Civil Service committee of which Senator Langer is chairman.

Under the provisions of the measure, Japanese in this country would be allowed to send packages of food or clothing to Japan by parcel post free of charge, subject to such rules and regulations as the Postmaster General may prescribe. Such packages would be required to be addressed either to individuals or to non-profit organizations engaged in relief work. The resale of these gift shipments would be prohibited.

The Washington office of the JACL ADC learned today that several bills extending free postal service for relief shipments to persons in Occupied Germany and other countries in Europe have been introduced in the House of Representatives and Senate, but the Langer bill is the first to extend such privileges for the benefit of people in Japan.

#### U. S. to Fight Race Covenants

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 25—The U. S. supreme court announced this week that it would permit the U. S. government to present arguments against racial restrictive covenants in the coming hearing set for Dec. 9.

A request was filed with the court recently by Attorney General Tom C. Clark who said that restrictive covenant on homes because of race, or creed were "against the policy of the United States."

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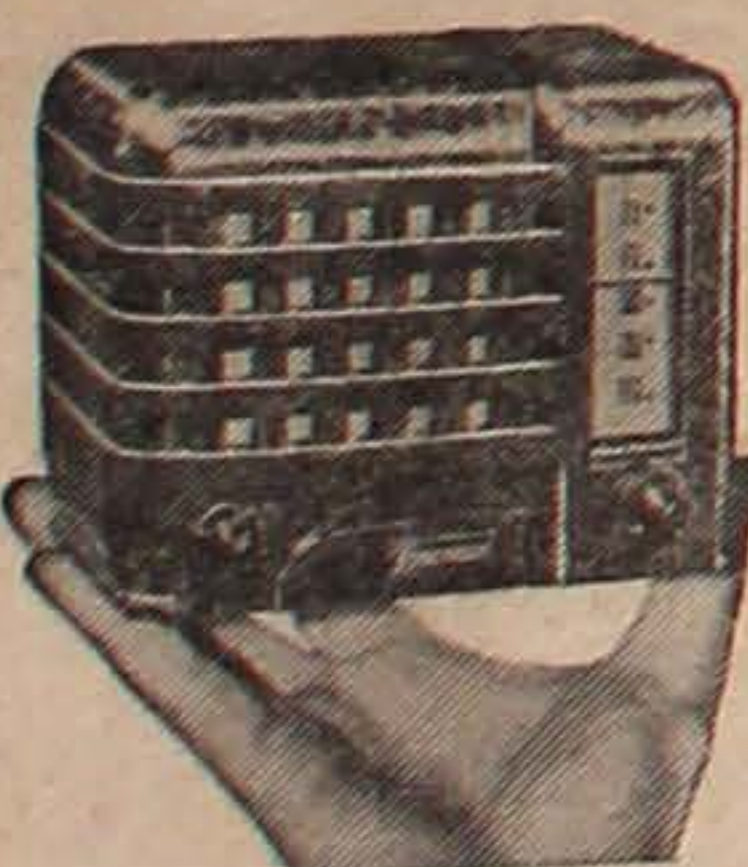
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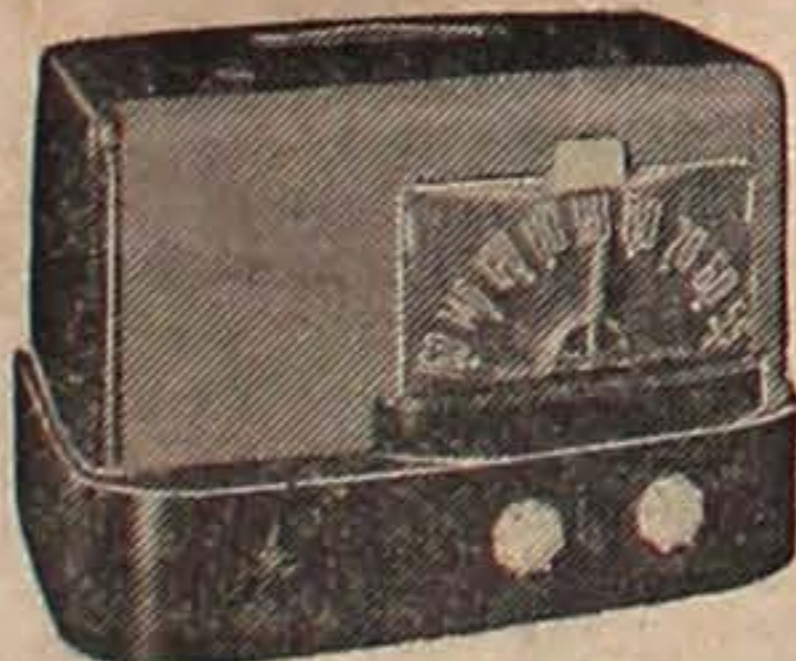
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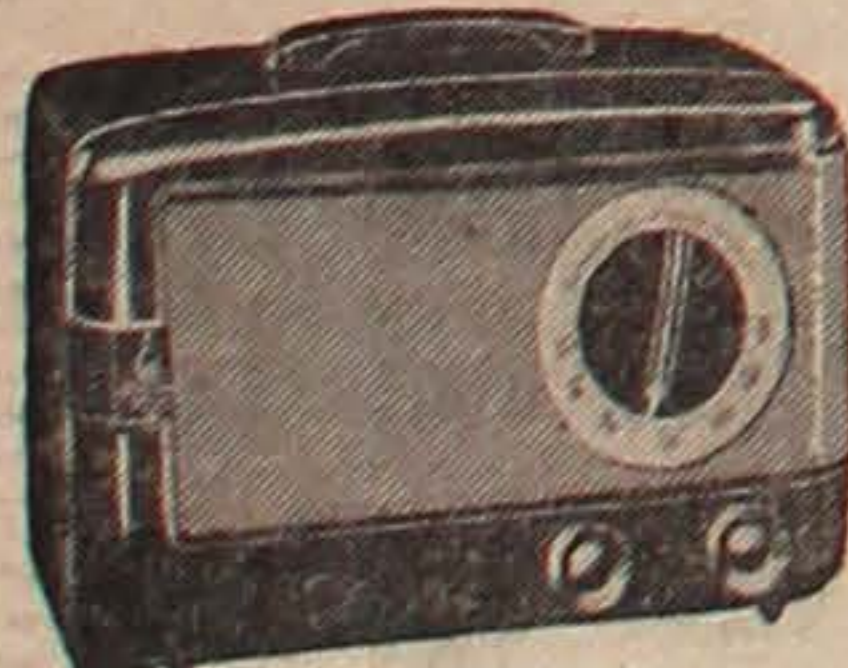
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
