Meeting at Thomas, Washington on the 15th day of September 1930, a group of American citizens of Japanese ancestry met with the purpose of forming what is now known as the Valley Civic League. It was with the following aims in view that the league was formed: "to encourage friendly intercourse, promote intelluctual and cultural advancement, and by organized effort, to ameliorate themselves and their posterity to the highest standard of citizenship".

Some of those leaders instrumental in the formation of this chapter were: Mr. H. K. Fukuhara, Minoru Terada, Thomas Iseri, James Y. Sakamoto (who gave a brief talk on the object of the league) and George Ishihara, who explained the Constitution of the Seattle Progressive Citizens League. The league was attributed to having been an outgrowth of the JACL convention held in Seattle in 1930.

The inaugural banquet was held in the Auburn Chamber of Commerce rooms on Saturday, October 4, 1930, with more than one hundred and fifty in attendance with Mayor McKee giving the opening address. Fifteen prominent American business men were honored guests, besides the parents and several prominent Japanese of Seattle, Washington.
