All utilities will be discontinued in one Tule Lake Center block tomorrow and in another next week, Joe Thomas, daministrative officer in charge of housing, announced today. These blocks no longer will be available for residential nursess.

All residents either have moved or now are moveing out of Block 35, mainly to vacant apartments in Block 32, Thomas said. The water service in that block already has been discontinued, and electricity will be turned off tomorrow.

Water also has been turned off in Block 36; and residents are moving from there to adjacent blocks. Electricity in Block 36 will be discontinued next week.

This procedure will be followed, with several days of notice given the remaining residents, whenever the population of blocks in which mess halls are not operating falls to a point to make continued operation of utilities unjustifiable. Residents will move into blocks in which mess halls continue to operate.

WRA DISPOSES OF GRANADA CENTER

The War Relocation Authority has completed liquidation of the Granada Relocation Center, Dillon Myer, national director, announced from Vashington this week.

"The Granada Relocation Center was turned over to the Farm Credit Administration for disposal, effective Jan. 27, 1946," said the Director. "The work of the War Relocation Authority at this center is complete and finished."

All inquiries pertaining to Granada Relocation Center now will be handled by the Washington office of WRA.

FULL SWING THIS WEEK

Tentative planning for relocation by persons who soon may become eligible, by Department of Justice action, to resettle in the United States was in full swing in Tule Lake Center this week.

Yesterday's official announcement by Harry L. Plack, acting project director, and Ivan Williams, representa-

tive of the Department of Justice, of a co-operative agreement between WRA and the Department of Justice by which WRA Tule Lake Center services to evacuees are extended into February has given these tentative planners assurance that WRA facilities will be available for their departures if they become eligible for relocation.

In this connection W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, said every facility previously accorded residents who were required to leave the center on or before Jan. 31 is being made available to residents now planning relocation on an if and when basis, and the Reports Office announced resumption of issuance of the Tule Rosettlement News, a publication containing specific information for the assistance of relocation planners.

Thus, said Holland, all persons who now may become eligible to relocate will be able to leave the center under exactly the same conditions as those who departed before the end of January, and transportation schedules will be arranged and maintained to serve them.

In many instances, interested residents are being notified by Relocation Headquarters of appointments for interviews, it being impossible for all who seek to make tentative plans to be interviewed at once. These interview appointment invitations should not be misunderstood, Holland pointed out. They do not constitute notification that the person

involved has become eligible to relocate. WRA has no knowledge of what Department of Justice decisions will be.

Williams said that notifications to residents of Department of Justice decisions regarding their status as the result of the now virtually completed hearing program carried out here during most of January will be delivered to the individuals concerned through his office.

FIRST PHASE OF THE RELOCATION PROGRAM ENDS

Tule Lake Center completed the first phase of its relocation program with a population of 5045 at the close of Jan. 31, when all persons required to leave by that time had departed, and the Administration turned its attention to aiding residents who may become eligible to relocate this month.

During J nuary 2244 individuals left Tule Lake on terminal departure for resettlement in various parts of the United States, bringing to more than 8600 the number of resettlers leaving during the 13 months it has been possible for Tule residents to relocate.


