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MORE ARRIVALS EXPECTED AS SEGREGATION PLAN RESUMED

More segregants are scheduled to arrive in Tule Lake, with the first contingents expected sometime between now and May 1st, according to Harry L. Black, acting project director.

First arrivals will be 50 each from Minidoka and Gila who will come in WRA

busses. Two groups of 500 and 160 from Jerome will reach Tule on May 12 and 21; while groups of 500 and 200 from Rohwer will arrive here on May 13 and 21. The 125 segregants from Heart Mountain and 140 from Granada are expected May 20 and 21.

The 1725 new segregees will swell the total population of Tule Lake to approximately 18,500.

In order to make arrangements for the housing of these expected arrivals, Joe J. Thomas, housing director, departed today to make a tour of Jerome, Rohwer, Granada, and Heart Mountain.

FORMATION OF NEW COMMITTEE IS APPROVED

Tentative approval has been received from the Washington office of the WRA for the establishment of a committee of center residents to confer with the project management on problems of mutual interest, it was announced today by Harry L. Black, acting project director.

Final details of the plan have not been worked out and an official announcement will be made when the text of the regulations is received.

BEST TO RETURN WEDNESDAY

Project Director, Ray Best departed last week on an extended visit to Poston and Manzanar. He is expected back Wednesday.

WELFARE INSTITUTES HOME VISIT SYSTEM

A home visitor system under which welfare workers will visit residents in their homes to discuss social problems that may affect evacuee welfare has been instituted by the Welfare Section, stated Francis Bagley, head counselor.

Clarified, was WRA policy on public assistance grants with the following categories announced as eligible: (1) Where illness or incapacity prevents working. (2) Where total income is inadequate to meet needs. (3) Children under 16 without support.

In cases of critical need, special additional grants may be authorized. Where both public assistance and clothing grants

are made, the total amount will not exceed rates set forth in WRA policy.

The Welfare Section also wishes to announce that all grants were made in full amount for February because of undue hardship caused by the long period of unemployment. Starting in March, grants will be made in accordance with needs as determined by home and office interviews.

HOUSING MOVES TO BE FROZEN

Starting Tuesday at 5 p.m. all housing moves will be frozen except in cases of real emergency or where permits have been issued before that date.

BASE HOSPITAL TO BE UTILIZED

Eighty-two residents of Tule Lake Center will be ordered to appear for pre-induction physical examinations under the Selective Service Act, it was indicated in word received by the project administration. The examinations will be given at the hospital on May 2 and 3. Notices from the Selective Service will be mailed to those who are ordered to appear.

Word of these examinations came in the form of an inquiry from the Selective Service headquarters for Modoc county at Alturas, when project officials were asked whether facilities could be provided for the examining team to come here and conduct the examinations. Harry L. Black, acting project director, advised the secretary of the board that a ward in the hospital will be made available for this purpose. NO WRA CONNECTION

The WRA has no connection with the examinations except to provide facilities at the hospital. The pre-induction examination work is exclusively the duty of the Selective Service officials, it was stated by Mr. Black.

Examinations will be held here in order to eliminate the necessity of travel on the part of residents of the Tule Lake Center. It is expected that other examinations will be held at a later date as other men of military age are called for pre-induction physicals.

Pre-induction physical examinations are given to men prior to being called for service in the armed forces. Those who do not meet the physical requirements of the army are rejected by the examining board and later classified by Selective Service in 4F. Those who are found physically acceptable will be processed further by Selective Service, it was stated.

The expected arrival of new segregees makes this action necessary.

THOMAS TELLS RESIDENTS OF HOUSING NEEDS

Residents within the center who have excess room and desire to have friends or relatives coming in from other centers live with them are asked to inform the Housing Department. There is still a lack of sufficient vacant rooms in which to house the expected segregates and help on the part of center residents will be appreciated, stated J. J. Thomas, Housing director.

Payment of the March payroll was completed Tuesday, announced Arthur J. Muir, finance officer. Approximately 5219 checks totaling \$79,006 were distributed to the division heads.

RED CROSS GIFTS DISTRIBUTED TO CA AND JAPANESE LIBRARY

Distribution of gifts recently received from the Japanese Red Cross was decided upon at a meeting between members of the Coordinating Committee and Ward chairmen.

On the way he stopped over at St. Paul and Minneapolis for the purpose of interviewing professional welfare workers who would be interested in employment in the Welfare Section of the various centers.

He is expected back here during the first week of May.

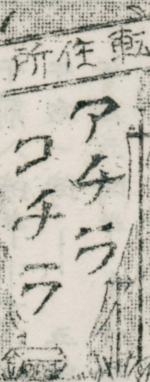
