

# MYER APPROVES FORMATION REPRESENTATIVE COMMI

The following text of the provisions of the WRA administrative manual provid--ing for a committee of residents to work with the Administration, was received today from Dillon S. Myer, director of the - War Relocation Authority.

"The residents of the segregation center will be invited to establish a Representative Committee. The membership of this Representative Committee shall be selected by orderly, representative, elective procedures. The members shall -be selected on a geographical basis to represent residential areas within the center, shall be selected for fixed er than 12 persons.

"The function of the Representative Committee shall be that of acting as the official representative of the residents of the center in communicating to the project director the viewpoints, attitudes, and requests of the residents, in conveying to the residents information concerning WRA regulations and determinations affecting them, and in advising with the project director on matters as to which collaboration between the Administration and the residents is need-
