STATE X-RAYS FOR PHYSICALS

The Selective Service Board in Alturas has requested the Base Hospital to prepare advance data on prospective inductees such as X-ray plates to facilitate the pre-induction physical examination program scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday, stated Harry L. Black, acting project director.

20 - 25 GROUP PREDOMINATES IN TULE LAKE

The predominant age group of Tule Lake residents falls between the ages of 20 and 25 with a male-female ratio of 10 to 6 in that age range, according to figures compiled by the Statistics Division during the recent block census.

Compilations which showed percentage distribution of center population by age, sex, and nativity also classified 67 per cent of residents as native-born citizens and 43 per cent as aliens.

The approximate dividing line between aliens and citizens comes at 36 years with very few of either category appearing above or below that age away from its own grouping.

Special meeting was held last Wednesday at Mess 45 to discuss the subject of the handling of special diets for ambulatory patients in the colony, announced Dr. Jack Sleath, project medical officer. The meeting was attended by representatives of the Mess Operations, hospital and Food Committee.

185 ACRES PLANTED DESPITE BAD WEATHER SAYS FARM HEAD

Approximately 185 acres had been planted on the Tule Lake WRA farm up to April 24, according to Howard Jarret, superintendent of the Farm Division.

This acreage falls behind expected plantings but bad weather hampered operations.

Planted so far are 70 acres of barley, 80 acres of oats, 15 acres of peas, 3½ acres of radish, 4 acres of nappa, 1 acre of spinach, 2 acres of garlic, and 10 acres of onions.

Cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower have been set out in the hotbed nursery.

It is also revealed that a farm mess hall and repair shop are now under construction on the farm.

VOLUNTARY TERMINATIONS AID EMPLOYMENT POLICY

Cooperation on the part of families where more than two persons have been employed in terminating voluntarily has been very good, disclosed Frank Fagan, acting director of Placement Office. The employment practice of the center limits jobs to two persons in a family.

Recently he asked for voluntary terminations in families where more than two were employed. In commenting on the results attained he said, "One or more members of 78 differ-

ent families have signified their intention to voluntarily terminate so that there will be no more than two in the family employed. This is approximately 46 per cent of the number of families to which requests have been made."

It is hoped that in so far as possible the family members will agree on which person or persons should quit work in order to comply with the present employment practice, Mr. Fagan explained. However, terminations initiated by the administration will be necessary if this voluntary action is not taken.

"I hope," said Mr. Fagan, "that in the family discussions as to who should terminate that con-

BLACK REQUESTS COOPERATION ON CENTER FIRE REGULATIONS

Center regulations for fires were released today by Harry L. Black, acting project director.

Under the announced regulations, burning without permit is permissible from 8 to 11 a.m. but permits must be secured from the Fire Protection Officer after hours and all burning is prohibited after 4 p.m.

All burning must be done in an approved-type incinerator equipped with an approved-type spark arrester or screen. (Approved-type container or oil drum with screen cover may be used.) Fires shall not be started closer than 30 feet from any building, structure, or combustible material and must be attended by a responsible person.

Openfires are permitted with the approval of the Fire Protection Officer.

SLIGHT DAMAGE CAUSED BY FIRE

Small damage was caused in the mess hall fire Saturday night in Block 52 as fire engines #2 and #3, responding to the alarm at 9:13 p.m., quickly brought the flames under control, according to Charles Yokota, fire chief.



The thin-clad boys are reminded by the Field Day committee that the promised track events will go on as scheduled this coming May 14, Sunday.



Families of Nisei soldiers are asked to refrain from making inquiries concerning dependency benefits at the local Red Cross Unit. The making of financial arrangements for dependents is not compulsory with the soldier and it is deemed best to have the serviceman originate the plan.

They should write their relative in the army directing him to make all necessary arrangements with the military officials at his camp. Definite proof of dependency is necessary.

In case of wife and children no proof is required but other relatives are eligible for the dependency benefits only when "substantially dependent" on the serviceman or in need of "chief support". It will be necessary for the soldier to submit evidence proving the dependents need of such support.

Grand opening day ceremonies will mark the inauguration of the center baseball circuits this Saturday afternoon at field #1.

BY-LAWS OF TULE BASEBALL ASSOC.

BY-LAWS OF THE TULE LAKE BASEBALL ASSOCIATION

1. Players on any one team shall be limited to 18.
2. Personnel changes shall be subject to the following regulations:
 - (A.) Registration of new players shall be made seven days in advance of the scheduled game.
 - (B.) Players from a disbanded team shall not be allowed to participate until two games have been played after registering.
3. Formalities shall be observed before and after each game.
