# BEST FORMULATES PROCEDURE TO SELECT REPRESENTATIVE BODY

### MAY 22 SET FOR WARD COUNCIL ELECTIONS. TO SELECT ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE MAY

Definite procedure for the organization of an Arrangements Committee to plan and supervise the establishment of a permanent Representative Committee was released in a memorandum issued today by Ray R. Best, project director.

This action was decided upon "in a spirit of helpfulness and cooperation" the part of the Administration because of the lack of substantial response to the Administration's invitation to proceed with the formation of the committee.

An election by secret ballot of Block Delegates to Vard Councils will be held May 22 from 2 to 8 p.m. in each block manager's office, following preliminary

block meetings on May 18, under the pro tem chair-manship of the block manager to nominate five candidates and to choose an Election Board consisting of three to five members. The board members, who will be excused from their duties on the election date, will prepare lists of eli-gible voters (all residents 18 years of age and over), preside over the election, and certify the results to project the director through block managers and Civic Organization. The Ward Councils, composed of 18 block delegates from each ward (20 in Ward VI) will meet at 2 p.m. May 25, at a convenient location to be designated by the respective Ward Representatives of Civic Organization, who will act as chairman pro tem until a permenent chairman is elected. ### WORKER ENTITLED TO ONE DAY LEAVE FOR EACH CALENDAR MONTH

The WRA policy regarding kers and intermittent worvacation leave and sick leave of evacuee workers, was announced today by Frank Fagan, acting personnel director. Since the applies only since policy the administration of the center was turned back to the WRA in the middle of January, it was pointed out that each full time worker would be credited with one half day vacation leave for January.

The rules for accumulation vacation leave are as "All follows regularly assigned workers are entitled to vacation leave at the rate of one day for each calendar month. Trainees and emergency workers, assigned for month or less, are not entitled to vacation leave. Vacation leave can be taken only as it has been earned and can be accumulated up to and including 12 working days. Vacation leave may be taken as elected by the worker subject to the approval of the section head, but may not be taken in units of less than one




