FIELD DAY TO START AT 10 O'CLOCK

The May 14 Field Day will start promptly at 10 a.m. near the outdoor stage with track events for boys and girls and continue through the day until the entertainment at 4:30 p.m. and the final event at 5 p.m., according to latest word from the Community Activities Section.

Concessions will consist of two booths for soda pop, ice cream, and pies and one booth where potted plants will be sold.

SPANISH DELEGATE TO VISIT JAPANESE NATIONALS HERE

In connection with the forthcoming visit of the Spanish Delegate to the Tule Lake Center, Japanese nationals are asked to prepare in advance in quadruplicate all petitions and complaints to be presented at that time.

The letter from F. de Amat, consul of Spain, addressed to the "Spokesman for the Japanese Nationals," stated that the Spanish Delegate would arrive in the center in a few weeks and that the quadruplicate forms were requested, "in order to assure the presentation of the petitions and complaints of the Japanese nationals residing in that center, and....simplify the procedure."

SEGREGATION

1000 FROM JEROME, ROHWER EXPECTED OVER WEEKEND

The first two contingents of approximately 500 segregants each from Jerome and Rohwer are scheduled to arrive in Tule Lake over the week end, revealed the Housing Department. Residents who have friends among the new people coming to this center are asked to refrain from visiting them immediately on their arrival. Correct addresses of the new arrivals will be released by the department on the following day.

When the people first arrive they will be con-

cerned about getting their baggage and getting settled in their new homes, it is stated. If everyone will cooperate in eliminating unnecessary visiting at the time of arrival, it will be appreciated by the newcomers and by the administrative people working to help them get settled.

By arranging for the assignment of living quarters in advance as was done when the people from Manzanar arrived, the details of getting the people settled here is greatly simplified.

In the case of people from Manzanar practically all the assignments were to quarters in the newly constructed area. In the present instance persons will be assigned not only to quarters in the new area but to vacant apartments in other parts of the colony.

The remaining housing facilities in the new area

CA DEPARTMENT TO REASSIGN ALL REC HALLS

Authority to assume responsibility for the assignment of all recreation hall space for various colony activities was vested in the Community Activities Department and all space assignments to all types of activities are nullified as of today, according to a memorandum from Project Director Ray R. Best.

Assignments of space in recreation halls will be made upon the basis of a written request to Community Activities Section by the activity desiring to use the space and all activities concerned should make immediate application for continued use of space now occupied.

LIST OF NATIONALS

At the same time, the Embassy asked that a list of Japanese nationals residing in the center be prepared so that it may have on hand in its files the exact number of Japanese subjects existing in the United States.

Also requested was a list in quadruplicate of the names of those persons who have applied for re-

patriation, but NOT through the Spanish Authorities.

Japanese nationals were advised that the making of these lists, "which can be sent all at once or little by little", was for the benefit of the Japanese rather than for the Spanish Representative and that interested parties can communicate freely with the delegates.

MAY 20 DEADLINE SET FOR VOLUNTARY TERMINATIONS

Unless terminations in line with the new center employment policy are made voluntarily before May 20, the Placement Office announces that it will be necessary for the Personnel Officer to decide who in the family shall be terminated.

It is urgently requested

that terminations be made voluntarily as it will be much more satisfactory for all concerned.

To date, a total of 188 persons from 145 families have volunteered to terminate immediately and, of these, 80 have been terminated.

Of the 301 families requested to make voluntary terminations, 156 families with 225 excess people employed have not volunteered terminations.

PINK PASSES INVALIDATED

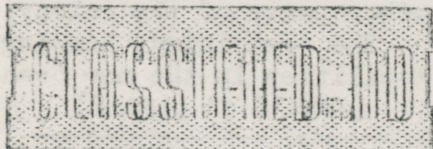

Baby food diets are being distributed to the central block mess halls of each ward, where the dieticians will prepare and make the food for the mess halls in their respective wards.

HOUSING HEAD RETURNS FROM TOUR OF CENTERS

Joe J. Thomas, head of the housing section, has returned from a trip to Rohwer, Jerome, Heart Mountain, and Granada where he made advance arrangements for the assignment of living quarters for families coming to this center.

Mr. Thomas reported a successful trip but that

he found travel difficult because of floods at certain points in the midwest. Outside of Topeka, Kansas, his train was stalled because of the floods for ten hours. Finally it was routed out over another railroad and he reached Kansas City a full day late.

After leaving that city for the south the train ran over tracks completely covered with water for a long distance. The train crept slowly along and when it reached Little Rock, Arkansas, he missed his connection by fully three hours, necessitating further delay.

He reported also that he saw the Mississippi river at the highest stage of water it has reached in a hundred years.

KEEP DOORS LOCKED - C.P.

Because of the high incidence of petty thefts reported to the Colonial Police, residents are asked to keep their apartment doors locked at all times. Evidence seems to indicate that most thefts occur during meal hours and when occupants leave their rooms "just for a minute."

Alarm clocks and wrist watches are most frequently missing, it was stated.

HOUSING DEPT. REPORTS THEFTS

Cots and mattresses are placed in vacant rooms and rec halls prior to the arrival of occupants; however, cots and mattresses have been found missing in several instances, thus causing the new arrivals undue inconveniences, states Frank Kawai, evacuee Housing Director. Residents are asked to refrain from pilfering such bedding.

will accommodate about 1000 people. These apartments for the most part will go to people coming from Jerome and Rohwer, it was learned.

There will be about 145 persons from Jerome and about 200 from Rohwer who will be housed in the old residence area. In addition there will be people from Heart Mountain and from Granada who will be located in the old area.

The department also disclosed that certain recreation halls are being partitioned for living quarters. This has been necessary in order to provide adequate housing for the new arrivals.

SOCIOLOGY AND ANTHROPOLOGY TAUGHT AT 701

A sociological study room has been opened in the center so that students of sociology and related subjects like economics may study, according to a release from the Community Analysis Division. Training courses in sociology and anthropology have been organized.

The study room is located at 701-B and is under the direction of Dr. Marvin Opler, formerly Professor of Sociology and Anthropology at Reed College and the University of Colorado.

"In the scientific study of communities," states Dr. Opler, "one is interested in mass data and not in individual cases. Community Analysis has no administrative power. On the other hand, it is important that history be written accurately and with the proper sympathy and understanding of the people who live history, so to speak. What we are interested in, namely cultural history, cannot be studied by any one person in particular or through individuals. Any community may be studied as if the individuals in it did not exist."

Dr. Opler states that the office is open to anyone interested in scientific study as well as in the welfare of the community. Since his profession has always been that of sociologist and anthropologist, Dr. Opler says that he shares with the residents a deep concern for the welfare of the people of the community.

CA CONTACTING OTHER CENTERS TO OBTAIN JAPANESE MOVIES

Other centers are being contacted to obtain Japanese motion picture films for the benefit of the residents, stated the Community Activities Motion Picture Department. Funds accumulated through present admission charges will be used for this purpose.
