## BAKERY SCHOOL TO BE FORMED

Organization of baking classes to be held at a designated kitchen in each ward under the instruction of Harry K. Nakahiro was announced by Raymond B. Hayward, chief of Mess Operations. He stated that schedules for the classes will be posted in every messhall bulletin board and one baker will be selected from each messhall will attend these classes.

The project steward revealed that all persons interested in baking may attend these classes.

It was also learned that a center bakery shop is under construction adjacent to the tofu factory in the warehouse area.

## ARRIVALS FROM FOUR CENTERS EXPECTED OVER THE WEEK END

One hundred and twenty persons are tentatively scheduled to arrive here from Heart Mountain on Saturday and on the following day 500 are expected from Rohwer, Jerome, and Granada, all of whom have been pre-assigned and processed. On the 26th and 27th about 60 from Gila are anticipated, according to Frank Kawai, evacuee Housing Department head.

Twenty recreation halls are at the disposal of the Housing Department to assign as temporary residence for the newcomers. These recreation halls were selected after due discussion with the Japanese language school heads and Community Activity Leaders.

In the near future, further consolidation of families will be effected so that the living space per individual will be cut down to the minimum of 80 sq. ft. A family of three occupying a 24' room will be asked to occupy a room not more than 16', and a family of four will not be permitted to live in a room larger than 24'.

## ADMINISTRATION RELEASES LATEST STOCKADE FIGURES

The number of people who have been confined in the stockade area has declined steadily since the WRA set up its program of reviewing evidence on which the men were detained.

stockade was 319, although there was never quite this number in the area at any one time. This was because some arrests were made after others had been released.

The total number of men released from the stockade to date is 264. Most of these people were returned to their homes in the center residence area. A small number of aliens were transferred to the Department of Justice.

The number of persons remaining in the area to date is 55.

Each case is reviewed by the Administration's committee, and the evidence made available from Army files and from the reports of the FBI are carefully studied. Releases have been made on the recommendation of this committee, which works closely with the Army officials.

Releases of from two to five persons are being made almost daily.

## FOREIGN PROPERTY FORMS MUST BE FILED BY JUNE 15

Residents who own any foreign bonds or other foreign securities, have bank deposits in a foreign country, or possess other foreign property should see the Legal Aid Section at 1608 to file a report on Treasury Department Form TFR-500 unless they have already done so or are exempt from reporting. Reports must be filed not later than June 15, 1944.

Any person otherwise required to report is exempt if his foreign property on May 31, 1943 had a total value of less than \$10,000, measured by "cost or face value" or "market or estimated value," which



## POPULATION INCREASED TO 18,027

The arrival over the week-end of 993 evacuees under army supervision swelled the total population of the center to a new high of 18,027. The first group of segregants from Jerome Relocation Center numbering 497 reached the center 8 o'clock Friday evening and the second group from Rohwer Relocation Center comprised of 496 persons arrived 8:30 Sunday morning.

The new arrivals were immediately directed to their residences in Blocks 79, 80, and 84 as they had been processed and assigned quarters prior to their removal from the relocation centers.

Enroute, two nisei who were in the enlisted reserve corps of the United States Army were called for active duty. They were transferred from the Rohwer train at Gallup, New Mexico and ordered to report for active service.

## GUNNISON COMPARES TULE LAKE CENTER WITH MANILA, SHANGHAI INTERNMENT CAMPS

Royal Arch Gunnison, MBS news commentator who returned from Japan with the second exchange of nationals after internment at Manila and Shanghai, recently visited the Tule Lake Center in order to gather first hand information on camp conditions. Results of his findings were broadcast May 3 over Station KOL, Seattle.

The commentator, who was allowed complete freedom during his investigation tour, declared that the administration is not pampering the residents as some individuals believe. "From what I saw, there is no coddling or pampering going on. I would give the present administration

## MAXIMUM PENALTY OF 90 DAYS METED TO THIEF

Yoshimasa Iiyoshi, of 1717-A was brought before Project Director Ray R. Best Wednesday morning for trial on a charge of theft. He entered a plea of not guilty and the evidence was presented by the Colonial Police in the case.

Mr. Best found from the evidence a verdict of guilty and sentenced him to a term of 90 days in the Klamath Falls jail, which is the maximum penalty permitted under the WRA regulations.

In passing sentence, the project director stated that he would protect the people of the center against loss of property by theft in so far as it is possible to do so, and complimented the Colonial Police on the investigation work which resulted in the evidence presented in the case.

Utakichi Kawasaki of 1507-C also appeared before the project director on a charge of violating WRA regulations by refusing to move from his apartment after being ordered to do so by the Housing Section.

He was found guilty but the sentence of 15 days in jail was suspended upon his promise to move.

of the Tule Lake camp, which is headed by Ray Best, a clean bill of health."

He stated that life at the center is bare and spartan, and discipline rules are strict. Food in this center is good; but not luxurious as has been claimed by some people, he said, the Japanese are receiving food under the same rationing regulations as American citizen. "And I believe they should. We are fighting to maintain certain principles. It would be destroying one of those principles for which we are fighting to maltreat the Japanese in our camp."

Gunnison reported that there was nothing luxurious about the living quarters; but he considered them adequate. As a point of comparison, he stated that "we had less than an average of 30 square feet of space per person in camps out in the Far East. The Japanese in our camps have approximately 110 square feet of space per person. But that is little enough living space for anyone." (A reduction of space to 80 square feet per person in the near future was announced by the Housing Section. --Ed. Note)

The commentator concluded from his investigation "that there are some American-born Japanese who have used this Tule Lake segregation center as a dodge to escape the draft in the U.S. armed forces. I don't feel they should be able to dodge their responsibility and then be permitted (when the war is over) to return to the towns and cities where they lived before."

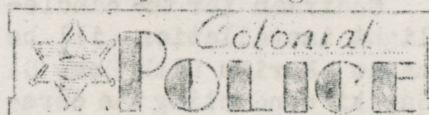
The former Heart Mountain boy negotiated the three and a quarter mile course in twenty minutes flat despite the gale-like

SEINEN WIN FIRST

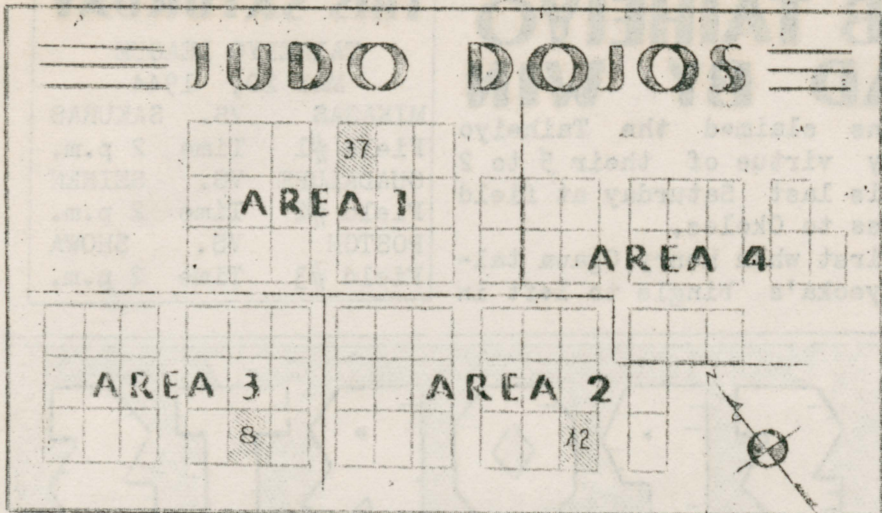
The Seinen Dan struck the win column by handing the Showa their second defeat in as many tries.
