(cont'd from page 2) animals is handled by a specialized staff of 42 workers," explained George Takehana, evacuee supervisor. We were greatly impressed by the appetites of the piglets -- the old saying 'like a pig' was well illustrated by their feeding habits. The ones that were not feeding seemed to be only catching their FALL SEMESTER breath before they went back to their suckling and we could not but believe the fact that they attain a weight of a couple hundred pounds in a few months.

We next inspected even rows of individual stalls each housing a sow and her litter, averaging about eight in number. "When' they are three-weeks old, they are transferred to these stalls, explained the foreman. "Those you see over there," pointing to a large pen, "have been already weaned." We saw hundreds of half-grown shoats romping toward a feeding trough which was being filled with grain and garbage. When we questioned him about the absence of garbage.odor, we were told that the use of portable feeding troughs had greatly improved the sanitary situation. We also asked George about the curious mercurochrome-like markings daubed on many of the shoats and learned that it signified the shoats that have been wormed. An interesting item of the hog farm was the 'sick pen'; or less a convalescence home for pigs. We saw them limping, sleeping, and loafing in the pen waiting to get well.

As the tour, of the hog farm neared the end, we came upon a large pen containing medium-sized porkers weighing perhaps 200 pounds and ..up. This pen, we learned, was the readyto-slaughter pen. Next to this the grim slaughterhouse reared up in contrast to the low fence . pen; and on leaving the hogfarm for the field inspection, we could not but help feel a tinge of soft-heartedness for the dumb but useful beasts awaiting their fate to be turned into bacon. and porkchops. . (A · visit to the fields will be described next week.)


