Repatriation Requests In Transit To Japan

It was revealed in a recently released letter from the Spanish Embassy to the State Department that all repatriation applications (well over 10,000) from Japanese internees in the United States have been sent to the Minister of Exterior Affairs in Madrid for transmission to the Japanese government.

Submitted at the same time were special listings including, "Priority Lists," "Lists of Japanese who have asked for repatriation" (13 in all), the State Department "List of 3101," and the "List of 3961" (those who have signed that they decline to repatriate.)

It was also stated that the Embassy had declined

the thousands of requests to forward cables asking priority for the next exchange vessel because the Embassy had no funds available for that purpose and because the Japanese government had already submitted an extensive priority list making such requests of little real value.

The Embassy believed that the internees, with little funds at their disposal, should not be permitted to defray the cost of these telegrams, and had asked the Japanese government as early as last September for authorization to send individual telegrams soliciting priority and charge the cost of such cables to the Account for the Protection of Japanese Interests. No answer had been received from the Japanese government at the time of writing.

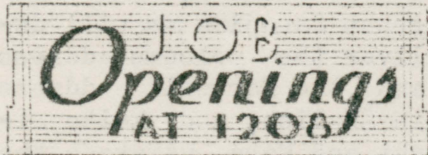
gradual process and will be carried out only as replacements are needed.

REPORTERS INSPECT PROJECT FARM AREA

Hoping to somewhat acquaint the residents on the progress being made in the project farm, three energetic reporters of the NEWELL STAR asked for an inspection tour of the farm area. Farm Supervisor Howard Jarret readily complied with our request for a guide to explain the technical points of the flourishing project.

We left the vest entrance one morning, stopping by to pick up an escort of two soldiers who followed us by jeep. As we traveled over the winding road leading to the farm, large green patches of barley, oats, and alfalfa fields grown for livestock fodder could be seen on the other side of the canal. Rounding the base of Castle Rock, we saw the farm barracks nestling below the west slope about half a mile away. This was the site of the hog farm

LEAVE REPAIR OF STOVES TO MAINTENANCE MEN; ROBERTSON

"Colonists should not disconnect or move heating equipment in the colony," warned Paul G. Robertson, assistant project director. "The disconnection of heating stoves by residents is prohibited. All work of this nature will be done by the Maintenance Division."

"Colonists are again called upon by the Administration to open air spaces

beneath barracks. There is little evidence of colonists starting the work after the published request two weeks ago," he stated.

"Air spaces should be opened at each end of the barracks and wherever possible add spaces on the side. You are urgently requested to cooperate in this matter," concluded Robertson.

ALL MEETINGS, ENTERTAINMENTS MUST BE REGISTERED WITH POLICE

Failure to register all meetings and entertainments with the Colonial Police, 1808, at least 24 hours beforehand may result in the closing of such meetings or entertainments by the Police Department, according to an order received from William C. Holding, supervisor of the Colonial Police Department. Where notice cannot be given 24 hours in advance and emergency requires a meeting, registration should be made by telephone.

Permits for social entertainment gatherings are issued through the Buildings and Grounds Clerk at Community Activities, 901, and those for non-entertainment purposes are issued through Civic Organi-

zation, 1608. In all cases where more than 50 persons will meet, a fire permit must also be secured through either organization.

It was emphasized that this police order applied to all meetings without exception.

OPLER TO LEAVE FOR WASHINGTON

Dr. Marvin K. Opler, community analysis officer, will leave sometime next week for Washington D.C. to attend a five-day conference from June 26 to 30 with the community analysis officials of other centers.

Discussions and interchange of views on analysis problems will be taken up. Dr. John H. Province, chief of the WRA Community Management Division, will be in charge of the convention.

TWO RELEASED FROM LOCAL JAIL

Torahachi Nishida, 504-D, and Eddie Okada, 1813-C, were both released from the local jail at 1808 early this week, according to Minekichi Shimokon, Colonial Police chief. The two had been serving sentences for drunkenness and disorderly conduct.

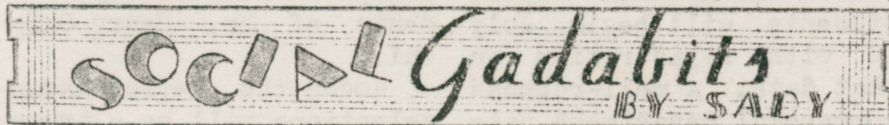

animals is handled by a specialized staff of 42 workers," explained George Takehana, evacuee supervisor. We were greatly impressed by the appetites of the piglets--the old saying 'like a pig' was well illustrated by their feeding habits. The ones that were not feeding seemed to be only catching their breath before they went back to their suckling and we could not but believe the fact that they attain a weight of a couple hundred pounds in a few months.

We next inspected even rows of individual stalls each housing a sow and her litter, averaging about eight in number. "When they are three-weeks old, they are transferred to these stalls," explained the foreman. "Those you see over there," pointing to a large pen, "have been already weaned." We saw hundreds of half-grown shoats romping toward a feeding trough which was being filled with grain and garbage. When we questioned him about the absence of garbage odor, we were told that the use of portable feeding troughs had greatly improved the sanitary situation. We also asked George about the curious mercurchrome-like markings daubed on many of the shoats and learned that it signified the shoats that have been wormed. An interesting item of the hog farm was the 'sick pen'; more or less a convalescence home for pigs. We saw them limping, sleeping, and loafing in the pen waiting to get well.

As the tour of the hog farm neared the end, we came upon a large pen containing medium-sized porkers weighing perhaps 200 pounds and up. This pen, we learned, was the ready-to-slaughter pen. Next to this the grim slaughterhouse reared up in contrast to the low fence pens and on leaving the hog farm for the field inspection, we could not but help feel a tinge of soft-heartedness for the dumb but useful beasts awaiting their fate to be turned into bacon and porkchops. (A visit to the fields will be described next week.)

西國大使曰日本政府に

帰國請願者名簿録提出

帰國優先権獲得請願は無効

西國大使発表

西班牙國大使は現在米國內に在住の抑留日本人より同大使の許に提出された一万通以上の帰國請願書の日本政府傳達方を西國マドリッド在の外務大臣宛に通告した旨發表した。

又の請願書は、西國大使に提出され、同大使より國務省に報告済の帰國優先権所有者名簿

西國大使発表
及び日本帰國請願者名簿全部にて十三通の外に國務省作製の三十一名の帰國請願者名簿及び三九六一名の帰國拒否署名者名簿録である。

尚西國大使は、收容所内の日本人中に帰國に關して、種々誤解して居る處があるのを左記の如き説明をなし日

本人の了解を求めた。現在迄数千名の在留日本人が、西國大使に次回交換船に東船の優先権獲得の爲、日本政府宛電報発信方の依頼があつたが、西國大使は之れを拒否して来たものである。

是は偏に其目的に使用する基金が無いのと同時に、日本政府に於ては、既に交換名簿を作製し米國當局に交付した事實に依るもので、西國大使は少額の基金を有して居るが、之は日本人の帰國優先権獲得の爲の電報料に使用する事を許容され

て居ない。先般此の問題に於て、其の許可方を日本政府に問い合わせたが何等の返信に接して居ない。

然し例外として西國大使は、マドリッド在の外務大臣を通して昨年九月第二回交換船グリプスホルムに東船出来なかつた九十七名の人員を第一、鶴嶺湖隔離所内のインタニを第二、パルより拘引され、サンタフェー検束所内のインタニを第三として、帰國優先権附與方を日本政府に申請した。
