## ARMY TRIAL TO DECIDE OKAMOTO CASE OUTCOME

Investigation of the fatal shooting of Shioichi James Okamoto ordered by the military has been completed and the report forwarded to the Army authorities. No statement as to the findings or recommendations of the military board of investigation has been made public because military regulations require them to be submitted to higher authority for review.

Project Director Ray R. Best has furnished to the members of the Okamoto family information from the signed statements secured by the Internal Security officers of WRA and of the testimony given before the coroner's jury at the inquest. He also provided to the members of the family the information available to WRA as to the hearings conducted by the military board of investigation and Assistant Project Director Harry L. Black's meeting with members of this board.

### COURT MARTIAL

As yet no court martial has been held for the military police sentry involved in the shooting. He has been placed in a guardhouse under Army custody. The court martial has been ordered and will be held at the military area. It is expected that the report of findings and the recommendations of the court martial, which will be conducted by Army officers, will be forwarded to the War Department.

The findings of the coroner's jury (which appeared last month in outside newspapers) is not the final judgment. That

decision will be determined by the result of this court martial conducted by Army officers.

### TRANSFER OF GEN. EMMONS REVEALED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 20—Lieut. Gen. Delos C. Emmons has been relieved as commanding general of the Western Defense Command for transfer to an unannounced command, disclosed the Army Headquarters here.

The name of the successor as commanding general, Western Defense Command, has not yet been made public. Emmons replaced Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt as commanding general last September 15.

### TERMINATIONS TO BEGIN JULY 1 FOR WORKING COUPLES

Reduction of employment in families of two where both had been working, is going ahead in good shape, according to a statement from Personnel Officer Frank D. Fagan.

Voluntary terminations in families of two where both are working will continue until July 1. After that date, the Personnel Officer will request division and section heads to make the necessary terminations. However, at the rate the voluntary terminations have been progressing it is expected that there will be very few left on the employment rolls where action by the division and section heads will become necessary.

### PROPOSAL TO SELECT EIGHT WARD POLICE COMMISSIONERS

Residents are notified of a plan advanced by Project Director Ray Best for the selection of a body of eight men who will act as Commissioners of the Colonial Police Department. The Commissioners will have the responsibility of bringing about an understanding and cooperation between the colonists and the Police Department in the enforcement of rules which have been set up for the good of the center.

#### PROCEDURE

An election will be held Wednesday in each block to select by ballot or by acclamation one man whom they consider qualified to act as a Police Commissioner. At the block elections, the block manager will take charge of the meeting and appoint a committee of three persons from the block to act as judges and to count ballots if the balloting system is used.

No person who is serving as a block manager will be eligible to be selected for this position.

After the elections are

completed, the ward chairman will be provided with the names of persons elected in each block. He will prepare the necessary ballots by listing the names of persons selected from each block and the number of the block which they represent. He will then call for an election to be held at every block in his ward on Wednesday, July 5 wherein all persons over the age of 21 will be entitled to vote. They will cast their vote for three persons on the ballots.

The three persons who receive the greatest number of votes in this ward election will be called in at a later date for an interview with Assistant Project Director Harry Black and Supervisor William C. Holding of the Police Department; at which time one of the three men will be selected to act as Police Commissioner for the ward.

### PLAN TO REVIVE HOSPITAL KOENKAI

Reorganization of the Hospital Koenkai, which has acted in the past as a medium of contact with the Japanese doctors and in offering possible suggestions to the Administration

to improve hospital facilities, will be discussed at a block representatives' meeting at 1608, Friday at 7 p.m.

Dr. G. K. Hashiba will lecture on sanitation and public health.

## LOWERY BACK FROM NORTHWEST

J. Sheldon Lowery, evacuee property officer, returned last week from his eight day inspection tour of Oregon and Washington. "The purpose of the trip was to inspect evacuee farms, hotels and commercial property and to discuss property problems with field supervisors," revealed Lowery.

## FIVE JUVENILES ON SIX MONTHS PROBATION

Five boys ranging in age from 15 to 18 have been arrested by the Colonial Police for theft of barbell equipment and placed on six months probation, according to William C. Holdring, supervisor.

The youths must report to the Colonial Police each Monday for the next six months and will be subject to court trial for the theft if they are involved in any future trouble.

## REPORTERS REVEAL STORY ON TULE LAKE FARM AREA

(Editor's Note--This week's story will complete the report made by the NEWELL STAR reporters upon recent farm tour made under the guidance of Toward Jarret, supervisor of the agricultural division.)

After leaving the hog farm we were taken to the vegetable fields, which lie just north and west adjacent to our project. The main water supply for the irrigation of the farm is carried through the "J" canal which is tapped from the Lost River reservoir. We viewed acre after acre of fertile lake bottom being tilled by experienced evacuee farmers.

At our first stop, we came upon workers harvesting the initial crop of "daikon" (icicle white radishes) which is used mainly on our menu in the form of "tsukemono." We also noticed that the majority of the vegetables grown here were root crops such as radishes, carrots, gobo, potatoes, onions and garlic. Other fruit bearing plants and vegetables were found not suitable here, due to the extreme cold and the windy weather. Much of this year's crop was damaged by wind and dust and is now being busily replanted.

Farm machinery used includes a number of track-laying tractors, caterpil-

the vegetable farm section covers approximately 1300 acres with 360 acres in vegetables and 360 acres in grain and fodder. Break-down figures on the total acreage were given to us for newspaper release by Sam Kawamura, evacuee supervisor of the farm, which reads as follows: alfalfa 239, oats 100, barley 450, clover 71, potatoes 153, onions 22, garlic 2, radish (red and white) 10, turnips 10, table beets 16, gobo 6, spinach 10, nappa 20, lettuce 20, cabbage 15, cauliflower 9, broccoli 3, carrots 25, peas 30, and daikon 30.

Coming to the end of our inspection tour of the farm area, we can readily say that the farm workers are doing their utmost, despite the handicaps of bad weather and poor working conditions, to satisfy center residents in producing the necessary vitamin-laden food for center consumption.


