STATUS UNCHANGED 27 FREED; DUE PROCESS OF AS HUNGER STRIKE LAW NOT ACCORDED - JUDGE ENTERS NINTH DAY

The hunger strike of 13 nisei confined in the stockade went into its ninth day today. As yet no definite change in the situation has been released by the Administration. When the strike started, there were 16 men in the stockade. Two of them were released a day or two later through normal procedure of processing the cases of stockade occupants. This number was reduced again when one member, Tokio Yamane, 21, was taken to the community hospital Tuesday night in a weakened condi-

Ruling in one case, Goodman said that the internee was in custody under a presidential citation and "is under the circumstances not a free agent nor is any plea he may make free or voluntary, and hence he is not accorded due process in this very proceeding."

His decision said "it is shocking to the conscience that an American citizen be confined on the ground of disloyalty and then, while so under duress and restraint, be compelled to serve in the armed forces."

COMMITTEE COMPLETES AGENDA AS CONSUL EXPECTED FRIDAY

Final preparation on behalf of the Japanese nationals was completed this week by the Spokesmen Committee for consultation with Capt. Antonio Martin, vice Spanish Consul, who will arrive in this center tomorrow, it was announced by the Civic Organization. The Civic said that this committee, which consists of two representatives from each ward, agreed to act as a medium of contact between the Japanese nationals and the Spanish Consul. They will serve for a term of three months.

The Civic Organization stated that the committee has compiled an agenda of grievances and inquiries which will be presented to the consul. Among those to be presented are re-

quests and inquiries for hospital facility improvements, progress of negotiation between the two countries on exchange of nationals, and clarification of the status of nisei who renounce their American citizenship.

49 BLOCKS RESPOND TO BEST'S NEW PATROL BODY PROPOSITION

HOUSING GIVEN AUTHORITY SIREN TO INFORM TO EFFECT ADJUSTMENTS WORKERS OF

The Housing Unit has been empowered by Ray R. Best, project director, to make any housing adjustments to effect a fair distribution of living space, it was revealed in his statement issued last week. These moves are necessary to clear the recreation halls now being used as quarters, to make room for potential newcomers, and to create equal living space for all.

According to the project director's statement, Block 9 was designated as a convalescent and old folks' area, where the aged and ill who need an apartment by themselves for health reasons will be required to live. The invalid residents of Block 9, single doctors, and recognized ministers are the only people to be excepted to the rule that no single man or woman be permitted to occupy an unit by themselves.

The maximum and minimum space per person is 120 and 80 square feet respectively. If excess space (cont'd on page 4)

es or prosecuted for not yielding to such compulsion."

The judge stated whether an internee's confinement under the presidential order "is lawful or not is beside the question."

"The issue raised by this action is without precedent," the decision pointed out. "It must be resolved in the light of the traditional and historic Anglo-American approach to the time-honored doctrine of due process. It must not give away to over-zealousness in any attempt to reach via the criminal process those whom we may regard as undesirable citizens."

Assistant U. S. District Attorney Emmett Seawall entered an exception to the decision, keeping open the way for an appeal.
