RESULTS OF CONFERENCE WITH CONSUL REVEALED

COMMITTEE PRESENTS REQUESTS

Result of the conference held Friday at 1608 between Capt. Antonio Martin, vice Spanish Consul, and the Spokesmen Committee, official elected body representing the Japanese nationals was announced today by the Block Managers' Headquarters. In addition to the Spokesmen Committee, many residents attended the conference.

The Block Managers' Headquarters reported that Spokesmen Committee presented their list of requests which were accepted by Captain Martin. Among inquiries presented, some were defined as requiring legal interpretations beyond his authority. As to the question of the Denationalization Bill, Martin stated that a complete text of the bill is expected at the Spanish Embassy from the State Department. He acknowledged that if nisei renounce their American citizenships according to the bill, they would be regarded as Japanese na-

NEW CO-OPHEAD EXPECTED SOON FROM MANZANAR

Lee Poole, supervisor of the Manzanar Cooperatives, has been appointed by the WRA to succeed Supervisor E. A. Runcorn , who recently transferred to the Central Enterprises Office in Washington D. C., according to the Co-op. He is expected to take over his new post here within a few weeks. The Co-op is at present under the temporary supervision Ralph Currie.

First session of the Board of Appeals for Tule Lake residents desiring leave clearance was concluded Tuesday at Nevell. A total of 19 requests for reconsideration leave clearance denials which were filed on or before July 14 were reviewed by the board.

The appeals board, composed of Chief Justice James Volfe of the Supreme Court of the State of Utah and Bruce Bartley, attorney of Seattle, Washington, began the examination of cases Friday.

BLOCK PATROLMEN

NEWLY ORGANIZED BODY TO ASSUME DUTIES THIS WEEK

The newly formed patrol body of 94 men held their initial meeting Monday to draw up plans and methods of operating the new police organization, disclosed William Holding, senior officer. Tanzo Toyofuku, Tomitake Ogata, and Chuguro Ono were selected on a committee to

represent the patrol body. Quincy Cook was chosen on the committee to serve as interpreter.

The committee met with Project Director Raymond Best, Harry Black, assistent project director; Willard Schmidt, chief of Internal Security; and William Holding, Tuesday morning to discuss proposed plans of operation.

Officer Holding revealed that a meeting was held prior to Monday but the minutes were set aside since it was dominated by radicals and pressure bodies, whose ideas, plans, and wishes were contrary to WRA policy.

Captain Martin presented to the committee a statement received by the Spanish Embassy from the State Department regarding clothing allotments for evacuee. According to this statement all evacuees, whether working or eligible not, are for clothing allowances; therefore, heads of unemployed families are asked to file an application with the Social Welfare Department. However, the Spokesmen Committee pointed out, clothing allowances are included in the public grants and that upon termination of employment, a prompt application for public grants is necessary in order to receive clothing allow-ances. Persons who refuse employment are denied both clothing allowances and public grants.

With the passing of July, the center population was increased to 18,689 boosted by the birth rate of 274 since the beginning the year, reported the Statistical Division. This division records the daily changes in the population and the marriages.

In a further analyzed survey it was revealed that 12,713 are nisei and 5,976 are issei. Since January to July, there were 31, 38, 32, 43, 35, 45 and 50 births per month, respectively. Out of this 140 were male and 134 female, From the death record, 57 residents have passed away and out of that 47 were male and 10 female.

Sixty one marriages were recorded thus far, with June topping all months with 14 weddings.
