OTTAWA, Canada -- Complete exclusion of Japanese immigration after the war was announced as a government policy by Prime Minister MacKenzie King last week, according to the Associated Press.

He said that a special commission will be set up to determine which Japanese now in Canada are loyal and which are disloyal. The ones considered disloyal would be sent to Japan, whether or not they were born there. Those loy would be treated were Justly, but would not be allowed to congregate again in British Columbia, it was reported.

REORGANIZED FORCE ASKS RESIDENTS' COPERATION

A complete reorganization of the center police setup with many fundamental changes in policy was announced this week by the Colonial Peace Office.

In a statement addressed to all residents of the center, the new peace officers asked for guidance and whole-hearted cooperation in maintaining peace and or-

der and promised to expend their every effort in making this a peaceful and liveable community.

Discussed at the several general meetings of the newly elected peace offi-cers were weaknesses and defects of the former police force and it was resolved that in order to create a police force operating for and by the people of the community, it was necessary first to dissolve the previous sus-

picions and opposition surrounding the old Colo-nial Police force.

In line with this, a request was submitted to the project director asking the Administration to inform the Colonial Peace Office of the reasons for arrest whenever residents are apprehended in the future by either the Internal Security officers or by the FBI. This request was taken under consideration.

At the same time, director suggested that the members or the force consist mainly of repatriates, preferably older issei and nisei because of the pos-(cont'd on page 2)

TO TULE URARSFERS DIFFICULT-ADMINISTRATION

Information governing creation halls. admission of evacuees to Center was re-Tule Lake leased today by the Administration. Permission to transfer to this center can be given only to persons who are now located ina relocation center; who have applied for leave clearance there and whose applications have been denied; and who are declared eligible for segregation to this center, it was revealed,

The Administration declared that the procedure in s'ch instances is for the proons wishing to enter Tule Lake to apply at their center for a trans-If the transfer is justified the relocation center will then request authorities here to approve the transfer.

There are over 2500 evacuees living in other centers who are eligible for transfers to Tule Lake waiting for their approval, it was disclosed. However, housing accomodations here are very strained. Eighty-four families are reported living temporarily in re-

Because of this condition no transfers may be approved in the future, unless there is an extreme emergency such as critical illness, until such time as the present population of this center has been substantially reduced.

The authorities indicated that no approval of transfers may be anticipated until accomodations permitting the transfer of at least 1000 persons are made in this center.

WRA ANNOUNCES REVISION OF FOOD RATION OUOTAS

Regulations on WRA distribution of rationed foods have been revised so that quotas alloted for any specific period but not used in that period may be carried over and used later, according to a project press release from Washington WRA office.

Ration points accumulated during summér and fall months, when center-raised vegetables are used, will be of assistance in less productive months.

Per capita quotas on processed foods have been reduced from 48 points a month to 10 points a week, and meat, fish, fats, dairy products and evaporated milk from 16 points a week to 1 point a day. All OPA quotas set for outside civilian consumption are in effect in all relocation centers.

ASK RETURN OF FAADEN CRAITES
