PUBLIC ASSISTANCE GRANTS

EVACUEES REFUSING WORK INELIGIBLE FOR GRANTS

Persons, registered for employment, refusing to accept work upon notification from the Placement Office are ineligible for public assistance grants, announced the Welfare Section. After notifying the unemployed persons of the position available, Placement will notify Welfare if the position is not accepted.

WRA regulations state that public assistance may not be extended to any person who is employable and refuses to work. The Welfare may not approve any public assistance to that person's family if they apply for assistance at a later date.

The regulation that public assistance may not be extended to employable persons who refuse to work is a standing regulation adopted in all public as-

sistance agencies. It agrees with the basic condition governing public assistance, which requires that no one is eligible for public assistance who can provide for his own needs through employment or other means, the section stated.

CENSUS REVEALS 79,484 LIVING IN 9 CENTERS

Population figures of evacuees residing in the nine WRA projects totaled 79,484 as of August 18, 1944, revealed a census tally received from the WRA Statistics Section in Washington D. C. (Evacuees formerly residing in Jerome Relocation Center, closed by the WRA June 30, 1944, were transferred to every center with the exception of Manzanar and Poston).

The report showed Manzanar Relocation Center--less than 5,000 residents--as the least populated center and Tule Lake Center--more than 18,500--the highest.

VISITING HERE RESTRICTED TO URGENT CASES

Future visits to Tule Lake Center will be limited to emergency situations only, according to a statement received from Dillon Myer, national director of the WRA. This restriction has been found necessary because of the special situation here and the difficult administrative problem created by their visit.

Hereafter, permission to visit this center will be granted only to those persons having an urgent reason for making such visit. Death or serious illness in the immediate family will be considered sufficient cause for granting visiting permits. Other reasons for visiting the center will not be recognized except in special cases, it was reported.

FARM ENTERS HARVEST PEAK

Harvesting of produce from the farm for center consumption has been increased this week, stated Toward Jarrett, superintendent of the Farm Section, as he promised delivery of more vegetables to the mess halls.

Workers are now engaged in harvesting gobo, peas, radishes, potatoes, beets, nappa, turnips, and green onions.

During the past month, mess halls have been supplied regularly with fresh vegetables from the farm, and with the continuance of favorable weather, an increase in delivery to the mess halls may be expected, the superintendent concluded.

URGE RESIDENTS TO OBSERVE REGULATIONS

Colonial Peace Headquarters have received numerous complaints from residents concerning the unsanitary conditions of bird cages.

The Peace Office wishes to bring attention to the residents that the cages should be cleaned and taken care of regularly.

Persons who have been playing golf on the fire-breaks are requested to refrain from this practice hereafter.

Clarification on types of telegrams handled was also given. The department said, "Contrary to the recent report on telegrams, the department handles all telegrams except money order telegrams and telegrams to Hawaii which are handled by the Administration."

Scripts amounting to \$2250.14 were still outstanding as of Saturday, August 19, Takizawa reported.

CLEANLINESS OF MESS COMMENDED

Raymond Hayward, project chief steward, complimented the mess crews this week on the general appearances of the colony mess halls and anticipates keen competition for the cash awards which will be given sometime in September to the three mess halls judged best in exterior and interior appearance.

At the same time, Hayward said that beginning early this week, the project stewards and their assistants have been making daily inspection tours of the mess halls.

PROPERTY TAX NOTICE NEEDS PROMPT ACTION

According to a memorandum sent to Sheldon Lowery, Evacuee Property officer, the Sacramento County Assessor has sent out notices concerning personal property taxes to a considerable number of evacuees, enclosing a schedule to be filled out and returned to the assessor.

Residents who have received these notices should fill out the schedules promptly and return them in order to avoid penalties. Some of the notices bear a notation to the effect that the schedule is to be returned within 10 days. No penalties accrue as a result of failure to return it within that period. However, prompt action is desirable because penalties begin to accrue September 1.

The signed schedule should be returned without delay so the evacuees can receive their tax bill and send payment before September 1, the memorandum stated.

There will be a few orientation lectures and discussions on "Racial and National Minorities" preceding the course in anthropology proper.

must be sealed and prepaid at first class rate. One package per week will be accepted when sent by the same person to the same addressee.

2. These parcels must not exceed the present limit of five pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. (Slightly larger than a man's shoe box).

3. All articles must be packed in boxes of wood, solid fiberboard, or metal with strong gummed-paper tape or tied with strong twine, or be securely wrapped in heavy paper.

4. Hard candies, nuts, caramels, (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cakes, and chocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper must be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or cardboard. Perishable matter, intoxicants, inflammable material (including matches of all kinds and lighter fluids), and poisons will not be accepted.

5. The complete address must also be written on a sheet of paper inside of the package as well as on the wrapper. All parcels must be addressed as follows: name, rank, army serial number, branch of service, organization, A.P.O. number, and the post office through which the parcels are to be routed.
