MUSCHING HERE RESTRICTED URGENT CASES

Future visits to Tule Lake Center will be limited to emergency situations only, according to a state-ment received from Dillon Myer, national director of the WRA. This restriction has been found necessary because of the special situation here and the difficult administrative problem created by their visit.

Hereafter, permission to visit this center will be granted only to those persons having an urgent reason formaking such visit. Death or serious illness in the immediate family will be considered sufficient cause for granting visiting permits. Other reasons for visiting the center will not be recog-nized except in special cases, it was reported.

CENSUS REVEALS 79484 TIVING IN

Population figures of evacuees residing in the nine WRA projects totaled 79,484 as of August 18, 1944, revealed a census tally received from the WRA Statistics Section in Washington D. C. (Evacuees formerly residing in Jerome Relocation Center, closed by the WRA

June 30, 1944, were trans-ferred to every center with the exception of Manzanar and Poston).

The report showed Manzanar Relocation Center --less than 5500 residents-as the least populated center and Tule Lake Center--more than 13,500-the highest.

A breakdown of population according to each center is as follows:


At the same time, Hayward said that beginning early this week, the project stewards and their assistants have been making daily inspection tours of the mess halls.

URGE RESIDENTS PROPERTY TAX NOTICE MEEDS PROMPTACTION

According to a memorandum sent to Sheldon Lowery, Evacuee Property officer, the Sacramento County Assessor has sent out notices concerning personal property taxes to a considerable number of evacuees, enclosing a schedule to be filled out and returned to the assessor.

Residents who have received these notices should fill out the schedules promptly and return them in order to avoid penalties. Some of the notices bear a notation to the effect that the schedule is to be returned within 10 days. No penalties accrue as a result of failure to return it within that period. However, prompt action is desirable because penalties begin to accrue September 1.

The signed schedule should be returned without delay so the evacuees can receive their tax bill and send payment before September 1, the memorandum stated.

2. These parcels must not exceed the present limit of five pounds weight or 15 inches inches length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. (Slightly larger than a man's shoe box).

3. All articles must be packed in boxes of wood; solid fiberboard, or metal with strong gummed-paper tape or tied with strong twine, or be securely wrap-

ped in heavy paper.

4. Hard candies, nuts, caramels, (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cakes, and shocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper must be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or card-board. Perishable matter, intoxicants, inflammable material (including matches of all kinds and lighter fluids), and poisons will not be accepted.

5. The complete address must also be written on a sheet of .paper inside of the package as well as on the wrapper. All parcels must be addressed as follows: name, rank, army serial number, branch of service, . organization, A.P.O. number, and the post office through which the parcels are to be routed.


