TURTHER ACTION DROPPED LASE

SAN FRANCISCO --- Twentyseven Tule Lake Japanese whose indictments on draft dodging charges were dismissed by Federal Judge Goodman of San Francisco, sitting in Eureka a month ago, will not be prosecuted by the government.

This was disclosed Saturday by Frank Hennessy, United States attorney, who said he had received instructions from Washington not to appeal the case, reported the San Francisco Chronicle.

STOCKADE

ON TULE DRAFT ISOLATION AREA EMPTY; OCCUPANTS RETURN HOME

All occupants of the isolation area, commonly called the "stockade," were returned to the colony Saturday, announced the Administration. This marks the first time that the isolation area has been empty since its establishment last November. Conditions in the center

at the present time are such that isolation of individuals is no longer considered necessary, it was reported.

A total of 386 men have been occupants of this isolation area since its establishment. Persons originally moved into the area have lived there for periods ranging from one to

ten months.

The Administration said that the cases of these men were reviewed from time to time and when conditions both in the isolation section and the residential area indicated that the presence of these men in the colony would not interfere with the project administration they were accordingly transferred.

Twenty-eight aliens were transferred from the isolation area during the past six months to the Santa Fe Alien Internment Camp in New Mexico, which is under jurisdiction of the Department of Justice, it was stated.

RELEASE NEW EMPLOYMENT RULING FOR KEY WORKERS

Harry Black, acting project director, announced this week that an opportunity will be given to families where three or more evacuees are employed, one of whom is a key worker, to decide which of the two, other than the key worker, shall terminate.

However, Black said, "If neither of the other two terminates, the personnel officer will terminate one of the two, the key worker remaining on the job, Should the key worker refuse employment, then the entire family will be terminated.

"In the case of both members of a family of two being employed, the key worker will remain on the job and the other member must terminate. Should the key worker refuse employment, both members of the

TULE LAKE CO-OP

HOLDS INITIAL MEETING SINCE RE-ORGANIZATION

The initial Co-op General Assembly since the re-organization of the Executive Body and Board of Directors was held Monday evening in liess 17 with over 100 Co-op representatives present, announced K. Takizawa, head of Co-op publications.

The assembly opened with the new executive officers expressing greetings and hopes for the efficient management of the center cooperatives. An address was then given by H. Sakuma, chairman of the Board of Directors, and also chairman for the evening.

Main subjects discussed were motion pictures, photo studio, and age-tofu. The plan to have the Co-op operate motion pictures was voted down 54-7. It was also proposed to sell the two standard motion picture projectors which it owns. Forty-nine blocks agreed on having the photo studio (subject to certain conditions) and three voted no. Forty-four blocks assented to age-tofu pro-duction on condition that it be sold to the WRA and then distributed to the mess halls. Production will begin as soon as URA officials accept the pro-




