"Judo is the art of treachery. It teaches a man to shake hands and then break the other fellow's arm or neck....It should not be allowed in any American institution."

Harry Black, assistant obtain these necessities through their own efforts, it' was reported.

"This standard regulation," said Black, "also applies to public assistance in Tule Lake Center. Public assistance in Tule Lake may be given only to persons who are without certainminimum necessities and who are unable to secure these necessities. Consequently, public assistance grants may not be given to any persons or families who have sufficient income or other resources.

"There is one exception to this regulation. If the total income or resources is less than the amount of public assistance which the person would receive if he did not have any income or resources, he might be eligible to receive a public assistance grant to provide the difference.

"This is on the basis that the amount of public assistance which may be given to the person who has no income or resources has been established as the minimum budget necessary to provide his necessities

and prevent hardship."
"However," concluded the assistant project director, "no assistance may be authorized for any person unless the total of his income or resources is less than the amount of this minimum budget."


