## REGISTER BOOKS

### REQUEST ALIENS TO REPORT LOSS

An evacuee resident who has lost his alien registration book is urged to report the loss to the processing building in near Gate #1 so that steps may be taken to obtain a duplicate immediately, stated Alan Campbell, project attorney. If a Japanese alien has never been issued a registration book, that fact should also be reported at once to the processing building so that the matter can be taken care of, he reported.

## LA POLICE DROPS

### JUDO TRAINING FROM CURRICULUM

LOS ANGELES--After an investigation of trips made to Manzanar Relocation Center by Police Sgt. Jack Sergel and members of his judo class, the Los Angeles Police Commission this week ordered judo eliminated from police training courses. The commission also condemned the journeys to Manzanar for judo bouts undertaken by Sergel and his class.

Sergel had said that he took his class to Manzanar because there is no suitable competition for his devotees in Los Angeles.

Police Chief C. B. Horrall was instructed by the commission to prohibit the teaching of judo at the pe-

## ONLY UNMARKED COINS ACCEPTED

The Co-op canteens will not accept coins defaced in any manner, announced George Matsumura, Co-op treasurer.

He stated that defacement of coins is a violation of the federal law, and that to date the Co-op has \$10.44 in deformed coins, a loss which must be absorbed by the people since the bank will not accept them.

## BLK. 34 SITE OF TRACK AND FIELD MEET SUNDAY

This Sunday, a capacity crowd is expected to gather at Block 34 field where they will witness the first joint kokumin gakko track and field meet ever to be held in the center. Sponsored under the auspices of the Chuo Nippon Kyoikukai, whose student body includes 5000 pupils, the all-day meet will feature finalists of seven ward schools to decide the ward championship.

The opening program, under the chairmanship of Yasunosuke Miyamoto, will begin shortly after 8 a.m. with a grand march of the

students upon the field for a full minute of silent prayer; followed by the national anthem. A greeting and an opening address speech will be extended by Sanae Ikeda, executive secretary of the kyoikukai and Shinzaemon Sugita, Ward IV director. A 20-minute grace will follow the adjournment of the students for field preparations.

After a "warm-up" period by the 200-odd contestants, preliminaries for the various dash events will initiate the cinder-fest.

## RESPONSE FAVORABLE ON JOB TERMINATION POLICY

Cooperation of all but a few families has given many other families much-needed project employment and clothing allowances, Frank F. Fagan, personnel officer, declared today.

"When we asked for voluntary terminations in families of more than two workers or one worker in two-person families, the response was good from families wanting to help their fellow evacuees," he said. "A total of 533 evacuees have been given employment through this procedure.

"However, there remain 61 families with more employees than allowed and one of the employees in each of these families is a key worker. We have not terminated the surplus worker because these families took the unreasonable attitude that the key worker should be the one terminated and for the good of the project we did not want to lose these workers.

"We are giving each of these families a final opportunity to have a non-essential worker terminate leaving the key worker on the job. If they refuse to do this, the Personnel office will terminate the non-essential worker in each of these families. If the family refuses to comply, all workers in the family will be terminated."

The present status of unemployed is as follows:

Bachelors, 973; families of two with no worker, 180; families of three, 116; families of four, 84; families of five, 63; families of six, 18; families of seven or more, 26.

## RENUNCIATION BILL UNDER REVIEW-MYER

Word has been received from Dillon S. Myer, national director of the WRA, that the first draft of the Justice Department regulations under statute providing for voluntary renunciation of citizenship is now being reviewed, announced the Administration.

No prediction can be made as to when the regulations may be put into effect, it was reported.

The law, dealing with the relinquishment of their citizenship by American citizens, was passed by the Congress and signed by the President in July.

**PUBLIC ASSISTANCE**

**BLACK GIVES FURTHER INFORMATION ON GRANTS**

Harry Black, assistant project director in charge of Community Management, this week issued additional information governing eligibility for public assistance grant. Public assistance regulations in all states require that public assistance grants may be given only to persons who are suffering from hardship caused by lack of minimum necessities and who cannot

obtain these necessities through their own efforts, it was reported.

"This standard regulation," said Black, "also applies to public assistance in Tule Lake Center. Public assistance in Tule Lake may be given only to persons who are without certain minimum necessities and who are unable to secure these necessities. Consequently, public assistance grants may not be given to any persons or families who have sufficient income or other resources.

"There is one exception to this regulation. If the total income or resources is less than the amount of public assistance which the person would receive if he did not have any income or resources, he might be eligible to receive a public assistance grant to provide the difference.

"This is on the basis that the amount of public assistance which may be given to the person who has no income or resources has been established as the minimum budget necessary to provide his necessities and prevent hardship."

"However," concluded the assistant project director, "no assistance may be authorized for any person unless the total of his income or resources is less than the amount of this minimum budget."

As a result of the weekly Co-op Board of Directors meeting Monday, it was decided to open a depository in which residents may deposit their money for safe keeping, said George Matsumura, Co-op treasurer.

Deposits will be handled at the Co-op Office, 717, beginning Monday. A charge of one fourth of one per cent will be made on the deposit for service charges, it was reported.

The treasurer also disclosed that two additional check-cashing stations will be opened Monday in blocks 27 and 41 for the convenience of the residents.

**ACCEPT STUDENTS AS BAN LIFTED**

Clearance by the Provost Marshal General's Office for persons of Japanese ancestry attending or employed by educational institutions important to the war effort is no longer required, according to information received from Dillon S. Myer, national director of the WRA.

Students will be accepted at all schools on the same basis as others.

Cabbages, cauliflower, carrots, and broccoli are expected to be harvested this month. Jarrett reported that first cutting of alfalfa was finished and 329 tons were baled.
