ADOPT RESOLUTION TO SEND GIFTS TO JAPANESE SOLDIERS HELD BY U S

GIFT DRIVE EXPECTED IN NEAR FUTURE

A resolution was drawn and unanimously accepted on September 11 to send gifts to some 750 Japanese prisoners now held in the various war prisoner camps in the United States, disclosed the Block Managers' Headquarter.

Ward chairmen were appointed to take full charge of negotiations to carry out this resolution and contacts are already being made with authorities in Washington, D.C., and with the Spanish Consul.

A recent official communication received from the Spanish Consul confirmed that prisoners of war might be allowed individually to receive parcels containing food and other articles. This is according to Article 37 of Geneva Treaty.

A drive to collect gifts is expected to start in the near future.

MEXICANS WANT TO INTERN JAPANESE

MAZATLAND, Mexico--The local Mexican newspaper, El Alachan, published recently a demand that authorities of this state place all local Japanese in concentration camps.

The paper hinted broadly that the Japanese are acting as spies. It was also reported that in certain other Mexican states some Japanese have been interned.

The long sought project bakery began operations this week, according to Chief Steward Raymond Hayward. Under the supervision of Andrew Hienzelman, and operated by a 25-men crew, the bakery will supply the needs of all center mess halls, it was reported.

MYER REPORTS 45 CENTER NISEI KILLED IN ITALY ; TULE CASUALTIES GIVEN

Forty five American soldiers of Japanese ancestry with next of kin living in relocation centers have been killed in action in Italy, Dillon Myer, national director of the WRA, reported on September 7 to Secretary of Interior Ickes.

Myer said that other casualty telegrams received in the centers have told of 92 wounded and two missing.

The men, most of whom were volunteers from the relocation centers in 1943 for the Japanese American combat team, were evacuated with their families in 1942 from the three Pacific Coast states.

It is presumed that the 45 reported killed are part of a total of 120 Japanese Americans previously reported killed in action with the 442nd Regimental Combat Team since the unit entered the front lines late in June.

The following soldiers with next of kin residing in Tule Lake Center were listed by the War Department as casualties in the Italian campaign during the month of July and Au-

gust, 1944.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

REPORT SHOWS DECREASE IN ALIEN POPULATION

The Department of Justice announced recently that the alien population of the United States now stands at approximately 3,400,000 as compared with approximately 5,000,000 at the time of the alien registration in 1940.

Earl G. Harrison, who resigned as director of Immigration and Naturalization Service in July, said in a fiscal year report to the Attorney General that this was the smallest recorded alien population in 35 years.

of aliens illegally in the United States who departed in the past year either voluntarily or through deportation proceedings. A total of 39,371 aliens, the highest number of such cases ever handled in any single year, left the country through the intercession of the Immigration Service. EMPLOYMENT OF DOMESTICS TO BE HANDLED BY WRA

Effective October 1, employment of domestics in the administrative area will be handled by the appointed personnel under new regulations outlined by WRA, it was announced today.

All domestics will be transferred from the Business Enterprises in line with the new regulations. They will receive the same salary as at present and draw clothing allowances for their families. Vacation and sick leave will be provided and domestic workers will be further protected by compensation insurance, the Administration said.

There are a number of openings for domestic workers and applicants are urged to register at once with the Placement Office.

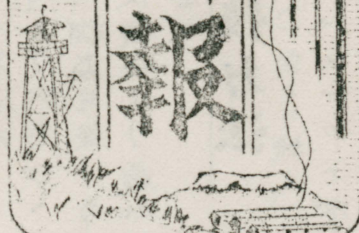
