ARMY CONTROL OF ALL JAPANESE URGED BY LEGION

CHICAGO--Passing of a resolution at the national convention of the American Legion last week demanding the "control of all Japanese in America" be transferred from civilian authorities to the military and that the WRA be abolished was reported by the Pacific Citizen.

The Legionnaires adopted the report of its National Americanism Committee, headed by D. M. McDade of Oregon, which also urged that the WRA be prevented from relocating inmates of the Tule Lake Center in California.

NEW TRAINING CLASS FOR HOSPITAL AIDES TO BEGIN

On October 23, another class for nurses aides and orderlies will be started at the hospital, according to Dr. Harry K. Marks, acting chief medical officer. The full-time daily classes will include study of practical nursing, anatomy, physiology, materia medica, hygiene, sanitation, nursing ethics, bacteriology, dietetics and other subjects. The course will last one month.

The training offered by this course including two to three hours daily work in the wards is valuable for young men and women, Dr. Marks said. They gain information and learn to do things which they will use in their own homes, he said.

Young men and women over 18 are eligible. A high school education is preferred, but exceptions will be made. Working hours and pay are on the same standard as for the rest of the project.

Beginning Monday an hour of class will be held daily for the aides and orderlies already working in the hospital. Experienced nurses aides and orderlies also are needed.

SUPERVISOR THOMAS

PROJECT DIRECTORS MEET IN DENVER

Project Director Raymond Best and Assistant Project Director James Wells left for Denver last week to attend a project directors' conference which began Monday.

At the same time, it was revealed that John Bigelow of the Reports Division will depart for Denver tomorrow morning to attend a reports officers' conference which will convene the following week.

The supervisor said that this tends to circulate rumors that are sometimes unfounded, making the problem more difficult. It was further stated that if this unauthorized practice continues, the Administration might be compelled to take definite action toward curbing that practice. He emphasized that all such matters should be and has to be officially cleared through the Block Managers' Headquarters.

Thomas also revealed that distribution of soap to every person will take place in connection with the census.

FLORIN FIRE LOSS REVEALED BY WRA

Personal property belonging to Mary Kawamura of Topaz Center was lost in a fire which destroyed several buildings July 20, at Florin, Calif., according to a news release by the WRA in Washington. The property was stored in a privately owned building.

This loss was discovered in an investigation, conducted by G. F. Cattleberry, Washington Evacuee Property officer, which followed several conflicting reports of a fire at Florin on June 21.

Chester Hatch, Evacuee Property officer at Sacramento, reported to Cattleberry that insofar as could be determined there was no fire at Florin on June 21

CANADA NISEI NEARLY MOBBED

INGERSOLL, Can.--A mob of more than 200 persons were prevented by the police from storming the quarters of 19 Japanese Canadians working in a factory in Ingersoll, according to an INS release this week. The near riot, during which the police were forced to use their batons and fire one shot to break up the mob, was blamed on racial strife.

The mob, armed with stones and clubs, began gathering in the business section of the town about 7 p.m., and tried to reach the Japanese, who stayed behind a five foot factory fence. It gave up when, according to Chief Constable A. Collander, the crowd saw "that we meant business."

CO-OP ASSEMBLY

SYSTEMATIC PAYMENT OF REBATES FAVORED

A plan, whereby payment of rebates would be on a systematic basis, starting from the earliest date of issuance, was adopted at the second General Assembly meeting Monday evening at Mess 1720, stated K. Kamiya, executive secretary of the Cooperative Enterprises.

A proposal by the Co-op Board of Directors to pay off the rebates for April, May, June quarter before calling the outstanding certificates of indebtedness was introduced to the representatives at the assembly. However, this measure was abandoned in favor of the systematic payment plan.

The shifting of certain merchandise from canteens #2, 3 and 5 was also discussed but it was decided to leave them as they are now.

GIVEN 10 YEARS IN SAN QUENTIN

Teruyuki Terao, 23, formerly of Los Angeles, was sentenced to serve a maximum of 10 years in San Quentin prison for assault with a deadly weapon by Superior Court Judge Wylie last week at Alturas, Calif. it was learned from the Administration.

He pleaded guilty to four charges of threatening with a knife at different times four residents of this center. He was given a maximum of 10 years on the four counts, the sentences to run concurrently. No minimum was fixed.

NEW STEWARD AUGMENTS STAFF

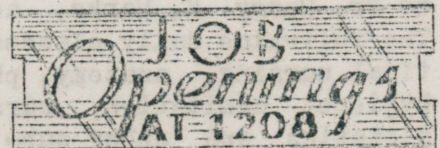
FROZEN ASSETS; SEE LEGAL AID

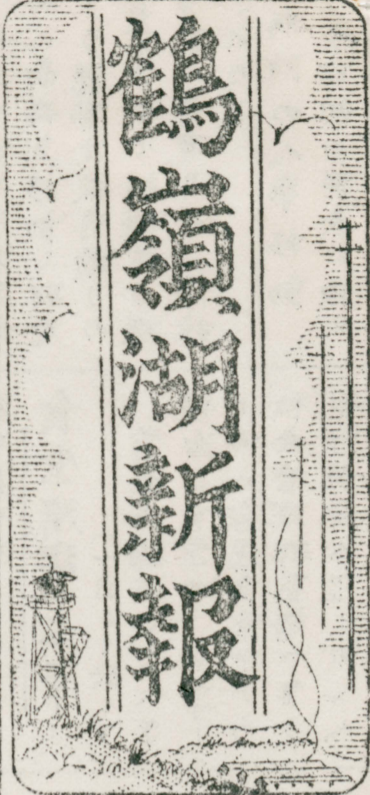
