RENUNCIATION BILL

INITIAL PROCEDURES CLARIFIED BY LEGAL AID

Japanese Americans in this center desiring to renounce citizenship should write directly to Edward J. Ennis, Director, Dept. of Justice, Alien Enemy Control Unit, Washington, D.C., revealed T. Nakamura, counselor of the Legal Aid Section. The necessary forms will be sent directly to the individual applicant, he stated.

Completed forms, together with a certified copy of the applicant's birth certificate, should then be sent to the Attorney

General, Dept. of Justice, Washington 25, D.C. for his approval for the applicant's local hearing, according to Nakamura. (It can be recalled in the earlier announcement regarding renunciation of citizenship that hearings for the individual applicant may or may not be approved by the Attorney General, and that in any event the mere sending of the application does not in itself constitute the applicant's cancellation of citizenship.--Ed. Note.)

The Legal Aid counselor further advised that photostatic copies of birth certificates may be obtained by sending the original to Edgar Pippin, c/o WRA Health Section, 461 Market Street, San Francisco, Calif. Prices are: $8\frac{1}{2}'' \times 11''$, \$1 for one side and \$1.50 both sides; $8\frac{1}{2}'' \times 14''$, \$1.50 for one side and \$2 both sides.

BLOCK MANAGERS REVEAL IMONHIN SHIPMENT NEAR

Headquarters revealed that the quota of Japanese slippers was filled this week, and last Saturday ward volunteers, assisted by Mess Operations, made 8000 okoshi cakes. It was further stated that pickled radishes have nearly seasoned for shipping.

It was also reported by the block managers that a decision to send salted fish as a substitute for cigarettes was reached by the gift committee recently.

MESS OPERATIONS MAKES REPORT ON BAKERY OUTPUT

The Bakery Shop, in the first month of operation, produced 53,390 pounds of bread and 344 pounds of coffee cakes for center consumption, according to the October report from Mess Operations.

The average cost per pound of bread was placed at 6 cents. This cost will be substantially reduced for the following months since expenses for various fixtures were included in the October report.

The Bakery Unit is under the supervision of Andrew Heinzelman.

HOUSING CLOSES INDEFINITELY

Francis Bagley, Social Welfare counselor, announced this week that the Housing Office at 714-A will be closed indefinitely, effective today. At the same time he stated that housing changes will be frozen temporarily unless an emergency occurs. During this period the Housing staff will work on the new directory, he added.

Any housing problem should be taken to one of the branch Social Welfare offices, Bagley concluded.

APPROVAL ON 2 PROJECTS RECEIVED BY OPERATIONS

Operations Division has received approval from the Washington Office for the construction of a funeral parlor and a caretaker's office to be located at the cemetery opposite Block 59, states Paul Robertson, assistant project director in charge of Operations. Construction of these buildings is expected to start in the near future, he added.

Robertson also revealed that permission has been granted by the Washington Office to employ evacuee workers to line the "M"

canal, which separates the old area of the colony from the "Manzanar" area, with concrete. This project is being undertaken by the WRA for the Reclamation Department for the sole purpose of furnishing employment for the evacuees. The canal will furnish water beyond this camp and will not in any way benefit the camp irrigation system.

This project probably will not be under way until next spring, and can only be constructed under favorable weather conditions.

2 FIRES RESULT FROM OVERHEATED COAL STOVES

Two minor fires, both resulting from overheated stoves, were recorded this week by the Fire Department, according to Samuel Owen, fire protection officer.

One fire was reported as starting on the roof top of 5408-D Monday morning but was immediately extinguished by firemen from Station #3 with negligible damage.

The fire protection officer also revealed that slight damage was incurred at Shasta View Nursery School, 7803-A, Tuesday morning from a fire apparently caused by an overheated stove. This blaze also was quickly brought under control by firemen from Station #3.

BURGLARS LOOT HOMES, FISH MARKET; TAKE \$472

On the heels of a public caution against increasing burglaries within the colony, four separate thefts totaling \$472 in cash were reported to the Colonial Peace Department during the past week.

Early Saturday evening, 7517-A was ransacked with the loss of \$47, and in quick succession \$200 was stolen at 518-D on Sunday night. Peace prevailed for only a night for on Tuesday evening, two more burglaries were reported. Prowlers breaking into the local fish market, made an unestimated haul of chicken and fish as well as \$100 in cash, while 507-B reported a theft of \$125 in cash.

EVACUEE PROPERTY OFFICE

REAL ESTATE PROBLEMS AIRED FOR EVACUEES

(Beginning today, the *NEWELL STAR* will carry in installments a general digest of the program information released by the Evacuee Property Office for the benefit of evacuees with property problems.—Ed. Note)

REAL ESTATE

Evacuees desiring to initiate the sales of real estate through the Property Office should supply the exact geographical location as well as a legal description of the property involved; the name and marital status of the titleholder; and, in case where

the property is jointly owned, authorization for the sale from all the co-owners. The amount of all taxes levied against the property, amount, payment terms and type of mortgage, and the balance due on all outstanding debts involving the property should also be included in the information supplied. The evacuee should also state the status of the title and give full particulars concerning any type of insurance that may be carried on the property including the name of the company, the amount and expiration date.

Because of the Alien Land Law, the evacuee must supply a birth certificate (original or certified copy) with his request for sale of real estate. If the evacuee wishes the Property Office to obtain a certificate for him, he should give his date of birth, the name of the city and county in which he was born and the necessary fee. (County fee usually \$1)

Most real estate sales are normally made through licensed real estate brokers. While the customary

It was also stated that the vandalism has recently spread to other sections of the cemetery. Officials of the city are making a thorough investigation and have offered a reward for apprehension of the vandals.


