## COMMENCEMENT TOMORROW EVENING

### 3-MAN COURT TO DIRECT CANADA SEGREGATION

VANCOUVER, B.C.—George Collins, superintendent of the British Columbia Security Commission, declared on his return from Ottawa last week that segregation of "loyal" from "disloyal" Japanese in Canada will be supervised by a three-man tribunal.

This was decided on during his meeting with Dominion Government officials during the past fortnight, Collins disclosed. How soon the machinery will go into action depends on the outcome of the special parliament session and the conscription issue.

## ARRIVAL OF 67 HAWAIIAN NISEI HERE DISCLOSED

Arriving from Hawaii via Seattle, Wash., 67 Japanese Americans were processed and inducted into this center Monday morning, announced the Administration. The group was defined as Nisei excluded from Hawaii by order of the commanding general of the Hawaiian Department.

The new group, all men, is quartered in the newly-established Block 99, area in the western corner of

the center. This area is under the supervision of Administrative Officer Willard Schmidt. He has been relieved of all duties in connection with Internal Security.

J. B. Cook has been named acting chief of Internal Security, disclosed the Administration.

### WORKER SUFFERS SERIOUS BURNS

Wrapped in flames from his burning work clothes, 19-year-old James Mirata of 3117-Cove was seriously burned Tuesday morning while working in the project oil storage area.

Mirata was burning oil rags when flames leaped onto his oil-saturated overall, igniting it instantly. Two workers on the scene, Yoshiaki Yoshida and George Yagi, rushed to the rescue and blanketed the flames.

Early hospital reports described the patient as resting quietly.

A minor fire at the Maintenance utility shed on Tuesday morning was reported by the local Fire Department.

Three Japanese Americans, members of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, with next of kin residing in this center, were reported as casualties by the War Department.

Pfc. Masaru Tashima, 25, brother of Keiichi Henry Tashima, 5012-A, was reportedly killed in France on Oct. 29. He formerly resided in Fresno, Calif.

Pfc. Masatsu Uyeda, brother of Masato Uyeda, 7217-D, was wounded in southern France on Oct. 30. He formerly lived in Orange Cove, Calif.

Pvt. Robert Masayoshi Ono, 24, brother of Mrs. Sanami Yukawa, 7312-F, was listed as wounded in France on Oct. 31. He formerly resided in West Los Angeles, Calif.

## NIP THE COLD "BUG"

## HOSPITAL CHIEF GIVES RULES FOR PREVENTION

The ancient adage, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," was suggested in a recent announcement from the hospital regarding the current cold and flu attacks. Dr. Jack Sleath, chief medical officer, advised residents on certain common-sense rules to follow for the winter season.

1. Avoid undue exposure and sudden changes in temperatures -- especially after strenuous exercises

or sports.

2. At the slightest sign of a cold stay away from public gatherings, such as the movies and remain at home as much as possible. Be especially careful about exposing children to colds.

3. This rule follows the above rule. At the first symptoms of a cold or a flu, go to bed. A slight lousy feeling is the first indication.

4. Eat simply and drink lots of fluids.

Fifty-six persons from this center left Monday night for Klamath Falls and departed from there by train Tuesday morning for Crystal City, Tex., to be reunited with the heads of their families in the internment center. The heads of the families already had been transferred from Santa Fe to Crystal City.

The contingent consisted of 13 families. Thirty-three of the transferees were children 18 or under. The transfer was made under the jurisdiction of the Department of Justice which operates the Crystal City Internment Center.

## OUTLINE PROCEDURE FOR SELLING AUTOS, TRUCKS

(Last week the NEWELL STAR introduced the first installment of a series of program information issued by the Evacuee Property Office. The following is the second installment of the series.--Ed. Note)

Requests to the Property Office by evacuees wishing to sell autos and trucks must be accompanied by ownership and registration certificates signed by the owner of the vehicle. An "Application For Duplicate Ownership Certificates" should be made out by those not possessing such certificates.

If the car to be sold is in storage and has not been used since evacuation, the evacuees must provide an "Affidavit of Non-operation" and write to the custodian of the vehicle authorizing him to allow the WRA to inspect the car and to remove it when it is sold. Since a car in storage usually requires some servicing before it can be presented to the prospective buyer in usable condition, the evacuee should provide such necessary funds. Information

concerning all storage charges should also be provided. Other charges on the stored vehicle should be paid before it is put on sale. It must be noted here that the WRA is not able to obtain drivers to move evacuee-owned vehicles from the military area. It is the responsibility of the evacuee to hire the driver and arrange his pay. The authorized driver should then be provided with the necessary papers to obtain the car from its place of storage, as well as a written authorization for him to sign for special gasoline rations. For trucks or pick-up trucks, supplementary gas rations are authorized only

There is no charge for Red Cross messages, but there is for cable.

A family in the Tule Lake Center may write to a close friend or relative in Japan via Red Cross about once every two or three months, he said.

#### PERSONAL PROPERTY

Evacuees wishing to sell personal property through the Property Office, such as refrigerators, sewing machines and furniture, must provide accurate description of the articles as well as information regarding the location, custodianship and the storage charges. If the property to be sold is not completely paid for, the evacuee should provide information concerning the amount owned and the name of the firm to which it is owed. It is desirable that the evacuee place a reasonable price on the article to be sold, but he may also request that bids be obtained.


