REHEARING OPEN FOR EXCLUDEES, DETAINEES

Under the policy of the War Department, an evacuee, whether a citizen of the U. S. or of Japan, can, if dissatisfied with the decision or procedure, either in case of exclusion or exemption, appeal to the Army Hearing Board for reconsideration of the decision, reported the Administration today.

No formal petition is necessary to obtain a rehearing. A statement in writing requesting such hearing meets the requirements. The letter should be addressed to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio of San Francisco, Calif., attention: Civil Affairs Division.

Subsequently the applicant will be afforded an opportunity to present evidence, to support the application, answer questions, or make a statement. Information will be also given as to time and place of hearing and appropriate papers furnished.

REVOCATION DATES FOR COAST AREA EXPLAINED

Noting that there has been some confusion over the dates of Jan. 2 and Jan. 20, both of which were mentioned in the proclamation of the Western Defense Command, the Administration has reiterated the fact that revocation of the mass exclusion orders became effective at midnight (PWT) on Jan. 2 and after that time evacuees cleared by the Army were free immediately for West Coast destinations without having to wait for Jan. 20.

The proclamations and orders which are being revoked on Jan. 20 as to persons not excluded or detained are those which established relocation cen-

BURLING HERE TO RESUME RENUNCIATION HEARINGS

Five hearing officers of the Department of Justice, designated by the U. S. Attorney General to hold hearings in cases of citizens desiring to renounce their citizenship, headed by John Burling and his chief assistant, Charles Rothstein, all of Washington D. C., arrived on the project yesterday.

Burling stated that his party had come for the purpose of resuming the holding of hearings in cases of persons who had filed applications for permission to renounce citizenship with the Department of Justice. **PROPER FORMS**

He again emphasized that only applications filed on the regular printed forms would be considered, and that these forms can only be obtained by writing to the Attorney General, U.S. Department of Justice, Washington 25, D. C. He

stated however, that so long as his party remains here at the project, a person who obtains the regular printed form, might fill in the form and mail it to him here in care of Tule Lake Center, Newell, Calif. instead of mailing the application to the Attorney General. In this way the application may be considered more rapidly. Requests for application forms, however, should not be addressed to Burling, but must be sent to the Attorney General in Washington.

INQUIRIES ANSWERED

In response to inquiries, Burling said that applications made on home-made forms or typewritten forms are not being considered. Applications are being mailed out from the Department of Justice in Washington, D. C. to people who requested them as rapidly as possible. He said that he was confident that anyone who had written in requesting the regular form would receive a copy within a very short time.

He stated that a very large number of persons had written letters to him addressed to the project asking for application forms. Application forms are not being given out at the project and Burling is forwarding these letters to the Attorney General in Washington. Many applications on proper forms are being mailed to Burling by registered mail. Because of the amount of special handling which registered mail requires, postal facilities are being overtaxed, with the result that ap-

plications sent by registered mail will be received long after applications sent by regular mail. He therefore asked that no more communications be addressed to him by registered mail and emphasized that it is entirely useless to register mail that is addressed to him and that the only effect of registering such mail is to delay its delivery.

All hearings will be held in accordance with a pre-arranged schedule and no persons will be heard unless his hearing has been scheduled by the Department of Justice staff. Applicants will be notified of the time and place at which to report through the Internal Security. He stressed that it would be useless to ask to be heard in advance of a scheduled hearing. The Department of Justice staff will not see anyone except in accordance with the schedule.
STATUS CLARIFIED

In response to an inquiry as to whether the persons whose renunciations of citizenship were approved would in all cases be transferred to alien enemy internment camp at Santa Fe, N. M., Burling replied that transfer to Santa Fe would not necessarily follow renunciation. He said, however, that persons who renounce their citizenship acquire the status of alien enemies and are subject to

internment as such by the Attorney General. Which alien enemies shall be interned by the Attorney General and at what place is a matter for his discretion. Persons who become alien enemies through renunciation of U. S. citizenship are in the same legal status as Issei and though all alien enemies will be given the full protection of the Geneva Convention, no alien enemy has the right to demand to be interned either at a particular place or at all. There is no immediate prospect of any exchange of nationals between the U. S. and Japan, he concluded.

70 'RESEGREGATED' TO SANTA FE CAMP

Seventy male members of this center, some of them American-born Japanese who voluntarily renounced their U. S. citizenship under a new law, left for Santa Fe on Dec. 27 to enter the Department of Justice camp for alien enemies. They were accompanied by 40 guards provided by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

HOUSING PLAN REQUIRED FOR WEST COAST RETURN

Because of the acute housing shortage in the evacuated area and the difficulties being experienced by evacuees returning to the West Coast without proper housing arrangements, the WRA will require evacuees to show evidence of housing arrangements before approving their relocation plans. These arrangements may be temporary, but should be for a long enough period of time to permit the evacuees to obtain permanent housing.

In all cases relocation plans must be approved before travel grants and property transportation can be made available. In the case of center residents plans must be approved at the center, except where advance approval of the relocation officer is required. Such approval is required in some areas, where housing is difficult to obtain and other factors are to be considered in making relocation successful.

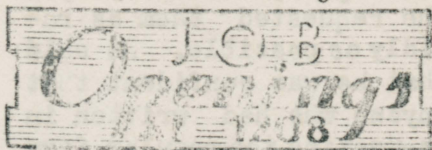
CLIENTS MAY FILE CLAIMS

Evacuees having deposits in the Sumitomo Bank of Seattle, Wash. may note the following information from the Alien Property Custodian in Washington D.C. as received by Louis Noyes, project attorney.

Noyes stated that effective Dec. 19, 1944, those persons who wish to file claims for their deposits in the Sumitomo Bank of Seattle, and who have lost their passbooks or Certificate of Deposit, may do so if their claims are supported by an appropriate affidavit.

Prior to Dec. 19, he added, it was necessary to file with the liquidators an indemnity bond unless the passbooks or certificates were forwarded; otherwise, the claims were rejected. This new arrangement has been made through the efforts of the WRA in order to help evacuees who have lost their passbooks or certificates in the course of evacuation.

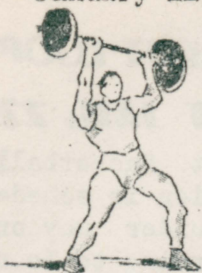
exciting bout. Yoshikawa was given the nod. The decision was not unanimous, one of the judges calling it a draw.

'45 SPORTS PROGRAM OPENS WITH WEIGHTLIFTING MEET

The first lines in Newell's 1945 sports chronology were written when iron men from Tule Lake, Venice, Block 27, Block 84 and Herculites clubs staged a meet on Jan. 2 in the gym before a sparse crowd.

In the 123 pound class, bespectacled Kaz Izumi's 535 pounds was far beyond the reach of the other contenders. Izumi competed for the Tule Lake club. Herculites' Tats Hinoki copped the 138 pound division with a sum of 560 pounds. Hinoki, indisputably the most improved of the performers, cavorted in the 123 pound class last year.

In the most closely contested match of the meet, Shig Sakamoto outpointed Moe Yamashita, last year's champ, by collecting a cool 585 pounds in the 148 pound bracket. Sakamoto lifted for the Herculites. Venice's big Shig Tanaka piled up 655 pounds to cinch the 165 pound slot. Tanaka showed mark improvement as he totaled only 615 pounds in the August contest.

After the contest, members of the Herculites club presented trophies to Dave Araki for managing the team successfully and to Hideo Morinaka for attaining the highest total for 1944.

In the exhibition lifts, Toyo Hisatomi bent pressed 160 pounds, while Dave Araki did some deep knee bends with 300 pounds and later danced with the weight. Posing and muscle control acts concluded the meet.
