CENTER FARM

TENTATIVE FARM PROGRAM APPROVED BY WRA OFFICE

Approval for an agricultural program on the same scale as the previous year was received from Washington this week, stated Toward Jarrett, superintendent of agriculture.

Three hundred and ninety-five acres of vegetables and 620 acres of field crops will be planted as soon as the weather becomes favorable.

Tentative acreage allotment of vegetables reveals that potato will again be the main crop of the farm with 150 acres, while daikon and nappa will rank second on the list with 30 acres each. Also on the farm list are 12 acres of China peas, six acres of celery, and five acres of shingiku. These vegetables are to be planted on a large scale for the first

time this year.

There will be a marked increase in center consumption of pork as the WRA Office suggested an increase in livestock production this year.

NEW LIBRARY TO FEATURE BOOKS SENT BY JAPAN

Plans toward establishing a public library for books received from Japan via the Red Cross were completed at the Spokesmen's Committee meeting recently. The library will be open at 5108 within a few days.

The committee stated that rules and regulations permit a person to draw out a book upon presentation of an identification card. Books will be loaned out free of charge for a period of five days. Five cents per day must be paid for overdue books. It was also announced that every possible consideration will be given to students who request reference books for school work.

MODIFICATION OF VISITING POLICY

As an extension of the present WRA policy on visiting which permits individuals to make visits with family members to make final relocation plans, the Administration has revealed that potential associates in business or agricultural enterprises may also visit an evacuee in the center. The visit, however, must be requested by the center resident.

In all cases, advance arrangements should be made for visiting to avoid any disappointment. The project director has authority to deny admission at the gate at his own discretion, and he should be informed beforehand of the circumstances so that there will be no misunderstanding, it was stated.

RECEIVE MESSAGE FROM HOME LAND

Persons of Japanese ancestry in Canada were comforted by a New Year message from the Japanese Red Cross, said the new Canadian last week. The message from Japan read:

"On occasion of the New Year, 1945, the President of the Japanese Red Cross, Prince Kuniyuki Tokugawa, speaking in the name of twelve million members of the Japanese Red Cross, presents to you the best wishes for your health and happiness."

BIRTH AFFIDAVITS UNNECESSARY NOW

John Burling, representative of the Department of Justice here with four assistants holding hearings on requests for renunciation of citizenship, has stated that birth certificates are not required to be submitted with applications for renunciation.

However, he added that regulations do require persons who have U.S. passports to surrender them, and also require those who acquired citizenship by naturalization to surrender their certificates of naturalization or their certificates of citizenship.

MESS DIVISION REVEALS REDUCTION OF EMPLOYEES

Between 400 and 500 evacuee mess workers were dropped from the payrolls last week disclosed Raymond Hayward, chief project steward. This step was taken in accordance with the recent order from Washington to reduce the number of workers employed in Mess Operations.

In making decisions for reduction of employees at each of the mess halls, the factors taken into con-

sideration were the number of persons employed in the family, importance of work, length of service, and training and qualification for the job. From five to 12 workers were terminated from each mess hall as a result of the WRA ruling, Hayward said.

Some mistakes resulted during the process and these errors are being corrected by Mess Operations, it was stated.

Arrival of Ralph Brown from San Francisco Regional Office of WRA last week to succeed John Bigelow as reports officer was announced today by the Administration. The new reports officer was with the Associated Press for many years and came to WRA from Phoenix, Ariz., where he was assistant news editor of the Arizona Republic newspaper. His wife, Pauline Bates Brown, is reports officer at the Colorado Relocation Center at Poston, Ariz.

John Bigelow, who had been on detail in connection with the opening of the area relocation office in Seattle, will report for induction Jan. 20, it was stated.

The Administration also reported that Allan Markley, who is head of the Liaison Section of the Reports Division in Washington, departed Monday for San Francisco after a month's detail here.

SAFETY COUNCIL APPOINTED TO INVESTIGATE ACCIDENTS

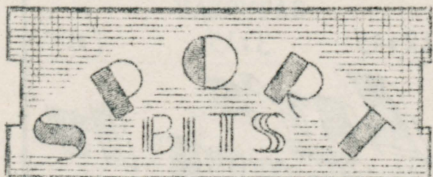
GIRLS CASABA STARTS SUNDAY

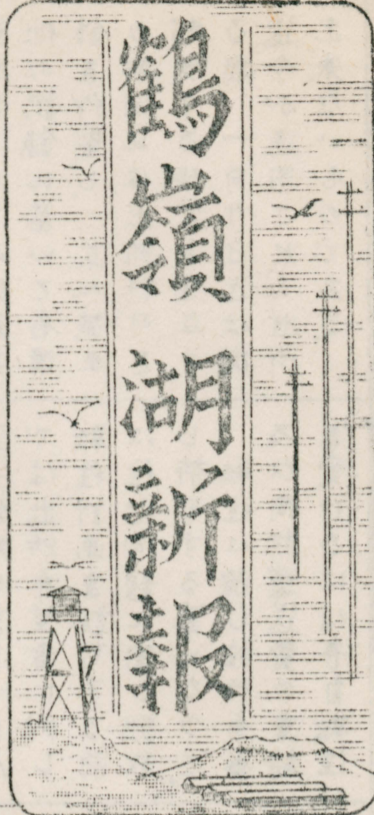
