COMMUNITY HOSPITAL

SLEATH ANNOUNCES NEW EMERGENCY CASE RULING

The hospital staff has found it necessary to put into effect a radical change in the method of handling emergency cases outside of clinic hours, it was announced today by the Administration.

Hereafter, the cases of all persons applying to the hospital for medical or dental care after 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, Saturday afternoon and at any time Sunday will be handled by the nursing supervisor on duty.

This decision was made at a special meeting of the hospital staff on Feb. 26, and announced by Dr. Jack Sleath, principal medical officer, because excessive night work and interruption of sleep for cases of non-emergency nature have so affected the health of the doctors that

they are unable to continue.

Dr. Sleath stated that the majority of the center residents have been considerate of the doctors and their time and have been visiting the clinic during the regular hours, but many have been abusing the emergency medical service the hospital has offered up to this time for patients who really needed treatment during the night and week-end hours.

The situation became such, Dr. Sleath said, that doctors were kept busy not only during the evening hours but also through the night treating cases which were not emergencies and which just as well could

Internal Security officers served notices of apprehension as enemy aliens on an undisclosed number of men yesterday, it was revealed today. They will report Sunday for entrainment to an internment camp administered by the Department of Justice.

Baggage was being picked up for inspection today. No luggage may be carried, the men being permitted only personal necessities.

In connection with the transfer, the Welfare office at 714 will be open tomorrow morning only to persons who have received departure notices and who wish to execute power of attorney so that any remaining member of the families may receive their checks.

LOCAL RED CROSS FUND DRIVE NOW UNDER WAY

Block managers offices and several community organizations began soliciting contributions yesterday as a part of the local fund drive for \$2663 so that the Tule Lake chapter might continue its vital services, according to May Nakagawa, executive secretary.

Donations are acknowledged in the form of a window sticker and a metal flag clip to each contributor, a Red Cross membership card to each person giving one dollar or more, and a round pin in addition to a membership card to those donating five dollars or more. A department, office, or block contributing 100 per cent is to be awarded a Red Cross poster.

Miss Nakagawa reiterated that money raised in the fund drive will be used exclusively for the benefit of the colony.

ALL MOVES CENTRALIZED UNDER HOUSING UNIT - BEST

R. R. Best, project director, today advised block managers that all housing in the center must be under control of the Housing Unit, and that the block managers have no authority over housing moves or apartment occupancy.

Any center resident who wishes to move must make an application at the Housing Unit, 714-C, the application showing the present address and the address to which the applicant desires to move. If the request can be approved, the unit will issue an assignment which will give the applicant authority to move into the requested apartment.

All moves must conform to the housing policy in order that all residents may be accorded fair and equal opportunity, Mr. Best said, and for that

reason it is necessary to have one central control.

The project director expressed hope that residents refrain from asking block managers to arrange any housing assignments, since they cannot take any action in solving housing problems.

The instructions regarding the Housing Unit applications were read to the block managers at Tuesday's meeting by Joseph Thomas, representing the project director.

WRA DETERMINED TO CLOSE CENTERS - MYER 3 TULE LAKE MEN SENTENCED AT PROJECT TRIALS

SALT LAKE CITY--National WRA Director Dillon Myer reportedly affirmed the determination of the WRA to re-settle all evacuees in relocation centers before Jan. 1, 1946, in an appearance at the all-center evacuee conference held here last week, reported the Pacific Citizen. No policy change for Tule Lake was stated.

The national director advised evacuee representatives to make plans for the closing of the centers and declared that the evacuee group would have the full cooperation of both government and civic and social welfare agencies during the resettlement period.

Describing the West Coast opposition as consisting of a "vocal minority" who have profited by the evacuation, Myer said, "This limited antagonism is economic rather than racial."

During the week-long conference, it was reported that the evacuee delegates prepared a list of some 30 requests and recommendations concerning relocation center policies which will

be brought to the attention of Federal authorities.

Delegates from every center with the exception of Manzanar and Tule Lake attended the conference.

OFFICER HERE TO ESTABLISH LEAVE LIBRARY

Eleanor Moore of the Relocation Division in Washington arrived here this week to help establish the proposed Relocation Library, Frank Gibbs, relocation officer, stated today.

The Relocation Library will be a part of the Relocation Office, which is to be located near the post office. In the meantime, many of the books and pamphlets are being placed on display at the temporary quarters in the Personnel Building in the Administration area.

Persons who are in doubt of their status are free to call at the Relocation Office to receive such information, Gibbs concluded.

Three center residents were sentenced to serve terms in the project jail at trials held here Wednesday, according to the Administration.

Nisato Kitadani was sentenced to serve 90 days in confinement after conviction of assault and battery on Masaru Ideta, who required hospital treatment. Kase Maeda was adjudged guilty of contempt when he refused to answer questions as a witness during the trial and was sentenced to 15 days in jail.

Sateo Hoshizaki was found guilty of assault and disorderly conduct and was sentenced to 90 days in jail, 60 days being suspended.

Harry Black, assistant project director, was hearing officer at the trials.

all those who need it, he said, but they cannot and should not be asked to continue to get up in the night in order to see people coming to the hospital with trivial complaints which could as well be treated during the regular daytime clinic hours. Dr. Sleath said it had been reported that many residents who were ill at times when they could visit the clinic during regular hours, had been waiting until after 5 p.m. because of the ambulance provided. Ambulance service still will be provided for emergency cases, but persons visiting the clinic after regular hours will see the nursing supervisor, while those in regular hours will see the doctor.

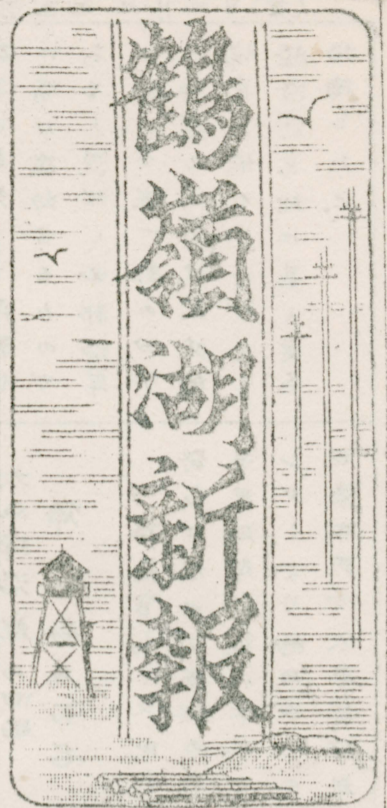
