JUSTICE DEPT.

FOURTH CONTINGENT REACHES SANTA FE

One hundred and twenty-five Tule Lake men who entrained Sunday for an internment camp after apprehension by the Department of Justice as enemy aliens reached Santa Fe, N. M. Wednesday, the Administration announced today.

Included in the contingent were S. Kawabata, president of Sokuji Kikoku Hoshi Dan, and M. Hinoki, president of Hokoku Seinen Dan, who had served 15 days of a 30-day sentence in the project jail for unlawful assembly. They were released by the Administration to custody of the Justice Department after their notices of apprehension as enemy aliens had been served.

The fourth transfer from this center raised the number of men sent to internment camps in Santa Fe and Bismarck to 1016.

NIGHT ATTACK REPORTED ON SANTA CLARA EVACUEE

SAN JOSE, CALIF.--A Japanese American family was attacked early Tuesday morning by a group of unidentified men who attempted to burn their ranch home on the San Jose-Alviso road and shot at one of them as he sought to summon aid, reported the San Francisco Chronicle.

Victims of the attack were Sam Takeda, 55, owner of the farm and his family of seven who had recently returned to their home from a center.

Investigation by the sheriff's office disclosed that the fire was discovered by Mrs. Takeda about 2 a.m. Gasoline had been applied to the scaffolding of the house and although flames charred the front, the family managed to bring the fire under control. As the fire subsided Takeda slipped out of the house with the intention of go-

JAPAN SENDS NEW MEMO ON EXCHANGE OF NATIONALS

The Administration has been informed by the Department of State of a new memorandum dated Feb. 6 from the Spanish Embassy in Washington stating the Imperial Japanese Government has asked that the memorandum of Jan. 11 concerning negotiation for exchange of nationals should not be considered as a formal proposal by Japan to the U.S.

The Jan. 11 memorandum should be interpreted, the new communication said, "solely as a promise to the internees at Tule Lake to the effect that should a new exchange take place, they would be given 'special consideration.'"

Morimoto added that no postage is necessary for letters and packages four pounds and under if INTERNEE OF WAR, POSTAGE FREE is written on the upper right hand corner.

The services of the voluntary organization includes both advice and representation in court in all types of civil matters.

HOSTEL TO LODGE 40 SET UP IN LA

The American Friends Service Committee and the Presbyterian Church in U.S.A. announced this week the sponsorship of the Evergreen Hostel in Los Angeles to provide temporary lodging facilities for 40 persons. The hostel is at 506 N. Evergreen Avenue, north of Brooklyn Avenue, reachable from the Union Station and Main Street by B car.

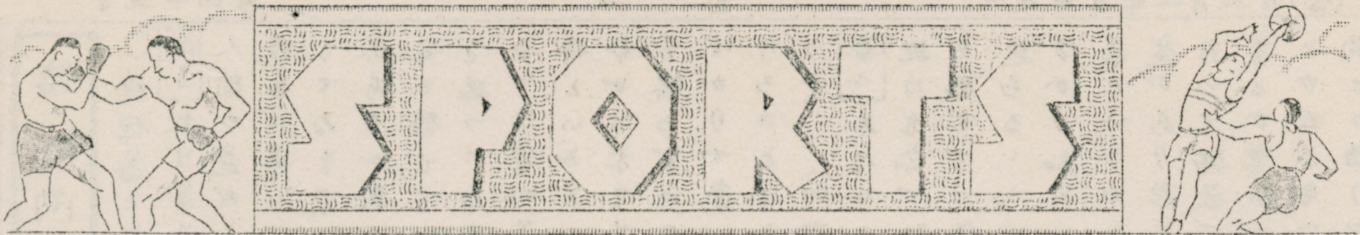
