NEWELL STAR SELECTED AS PAPER'S NAME

During the staff meeting last week, NEWELL STAR was chosen as the official name for the WRA publication which has hitherto been known as the INFORMATION BULLETIN.

Since publication of the TULEAN DISPATCH was suspended last November, the NEWELL STAR will take its place to inform the residents of this center.

Since it is published but once a week at the present time, articles for publication must be in at the NEWELL STAR office, 916-A, by Monday noon.

THOSE INTERESTED IN FARM WORK ASKED TO REGISTER

"The time is rapidly approaching when the farm land of Tule Lake Center should be prepared for planting. It is therefore essential that the farm group at Tule Lake be organized as soon as possible," according to Paul Robertson, assistant project director.

Mr. Robertson says, "The farm division is anxious to know who the interested farmers are at the Tule Lake Segregation Center. If you are a farmer and are interested in working on the Tule Lake farm project, please

register with the Placement office at 1208 as soon as possible."

Mr. Jarret, farm superintendent, has just returned from a full weeks conference at Gila Relocation Center. This meeting was attended by the representatives of farm divisions from the Washington office and all of the WRA projects. Plans were discussed for the growing of various crops and the redistribution of WRA farm equipment."

SNOWBALLS MAY CAUSE TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS - PD

Residents are asked by the Police Department to refrain from throwing snowballs at the vehicle operators to avoid unnecessary accidents. Fortunately, there have been no accidents of this nature.

Parents of all children are asked to keep their children away from the road at all times to lessen the danger of accidents. This is especially true during rainy or snowy days.

EXTRAVAGANT USE OF RICE MUST BE CURTAILED-HAYWARD

Although the local warehouses have a 45 day supply of rice on hand, Raymond B. Hayward, project steward, states that the extravagant use of the food must be curtailed.

According to a telegram received from Morris Seltzer, procurement officer of the WRA in Washington D.C., "OCMG (Office of the Quartermaster General) advises that availability of rice becoming extremely difficult and they are very much concerned. Although Quartermaster depots will stock quantities of rice, such quantities will be very limited." In conclusion it states, "Briefly the rice situation is very criti-

cal and every effort should be made to conserve."

Relative to the food situation, Mr. Hayward announces, "There is no occasion for alarm as every effort is being made to provide a nutritional and balanced diet. There is plenty of food for all. Beginning March 6, regular carloads of fresh produce are scheduled to arrive weekly."

TWO CALLED FROM TULE LAKE CENTER FOR PRE-INDUCTION

According to a report on selective service from Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director 402, two were called to take their pre-induction Army physical examination. Of those called, 32 were accepted, nine rejected, one inducted, one volunteered and seven refused to report for the pre-induction physical examination.

Of this sum 22 were girls and 18 were boys, according to statistics at the Base Hospital.

On the other hand, seven persons - two men, one woman, and four children under 18 - passed away during February.

Gila leads in number of pre-inductees with 93, followed closely by Minidoka with 93. 56 reported for pre-induction at Granada, 57 from Rohwer, 26 from Topaz and Poston, 20 from Manzanar, 17 from Jonians were also resettled in the old area.

GEROME CENTER TO BE CLOSED BY JUNE - IKES

Plans for the closing of the Jerome Relocation Center by June were announced last week by Secretary of the Interior, Harold L. Ickes.

"It has been the intention to close a center as soon as the relocation program progressed far enough to make space available in other centers to accomodate the people who will have to be moved," Ickes said. "The 18,000 persons who have left the centers under the relocation program now make it possible to absorb the residents of one of the centers without undue crowding."

Ickes pointed out that Jerome Center was last to be established, smallest in population and facilities are not progressed as far as at some of the other centers.

The Jerome residents who have not relocated as individuals or families before the first of June, will be moved to other relocation centers, including Rowher, Granada and Heart Mountain.

MYER REFUTES MANZANAR RUMOR ON EXPATRIATION

Because there has been a report circulated at Manzanar that nisei who do not want to serve in the United States Army would be under no obligation to do so, Dillon S. Myer has sent the following telegram to Ralph Merrit, Project Director at Manzanar.

"Statement attributed information from Spanish Consul not in accord with regulations of the Selective Service. Requests for expatriation made since January 20, 1944, on the part of male citizens of military age must be regarded as efforts to evade military service. A citizen designated as acceptable for services who refuses to be inducted

into the armed forces on the ground that he has requested expatriation will be subject to penalties prescribed in the Selective Service law. WRA will cooperate with Selective Service Boards and Department of Justice officials in apprehension of delinquents."

Okole House, Isleton Waves, and the Komets continued their rampaging ways in the American League as they all posted wins during the past weekend.


Four of the five tilts scheduled for Saturday were postponed because of the bad weather.
