STATEMENT GIVEN ON DEPT. OF JUSTICE SPECIAL PROJECT RULES STAFF LEAVES

R. R. Best, project director, today issued the following statement in connection with the sentencing Monday of three Sokuji Kikoku Hoshi Dan and Hokoku Seinen Dan leaders to serve 90 days in jail for participation in activities specifically prohibited by the Special Project Regulations which were put into effect Friday.

"All of the people in Tule Lake Center know the things which are prohibited by the Special Project Regulations which were placed in effect last Friday. Copies were delivered to every home in the colony. In addition, the leaders of Sokuji Kikoku Hoshi Dan and Hokoku Seinen Dan were informed personally, by me, that these regulations were in force and would be enforced.

"No one in Tule Lake Center can plead ignorance of the law. Everyone knows what is unlawful.

"Three leaders of Sokuji Kikoku Hoshi Dan and Hokoku Seinen Dan now are in jail, where they will re-

main for 90 days, because they chose to disregard the regulations.

"This is only the beginning. Others who disobey the regulations will follow, because the regulations are going to be enforced.

"These sentences of three leaders are only a warning. The sentences can be made much more severe. Instead of 90 days they can be six months, or nine months or a year.

"The Special Project Regulations have been placed in force to maintain peace and order in Tule Lake Center.

"The Department of Justice hearings on applications for renunciation of citizenship have ended. The Department of Justice staff has departed.

"The Special Project Regulations reflect the desire of the vast majority of the residents of Tule Lake Center to be peaceful and to be orderly in their lives.

"The regulations do not seek to control or to curb anyone's private thoughts or inner feelings.

"The vast majority of the residents of Tule Lake Center have indicated to the Administration that they desire to live quietly, to obey the laws, whatever may be their inner feelings. They are going to be allowed to do so."

WORK ON CANAL TO COMMENCE IN APRIL-RICKETTS

Concrete lining of the "M" canal, which is located between the old area and the Ward VI-Ward VIII area, will begin early next month if weather permits, Homer Ricketts, senior engineer, announced this morning.

Ricketts estimated that three months of work and 1200 cubic yards of concrete would be required to line the canal with four inches of reinforced concrete from former Gate #3 opposite Block 54 to the project limits southwest of Block 59.

Ninety evacuees will be employed on the project, which is to be undertaken by the WRA for the Reclamation Bureau. The necessary materials will be supplied by the bureau.

The canal will furnish water beyond this camp and will not benefit the camp irrigation system in any way as previously stated.

JAPANESE SCHOOL DAMAGED IN SECOND DELANO FIRE

DELANO, Calif.--The second serious fire to destroy property of evacuees of Japanese ancestry in two weeks in Delano seriously damaged the Japanese Association school on Eighth Avenue on March 11, according to the Pacific Citizen. The loss was estimated at \$4,000. Two weeks ago fire destroyed the Japanese Buddhist church in Delano. Cause of the two fires was

not determined.

Both buildings had been unused since the evacuation. The Japanese school was gutted by the blaze which destroyed the roof of the building. However, prompt action by Delano's volunteer firemen saved adjoining business buildings and residences.

CHICAGO DEATHS OF MAR. 15 NOT LINKED

The deaths of two Issei in Chicago on Mar. 15 were not connected in any way, stated information received this week by the Administration from the WRA Office in Chicago.

That George Kintaro Matsuura, non-evacuee Chicago resident, was killed in an accidental fall was established at an inquest. Old Chicago residents are arranging for his funeral.

Riuye Fujii, formerly of Granada, who died soon after he was found unconscious near his home, was apparently the victim of holdup men whose only motive was robbery. The inquest was postponed while Chicago police made further investigations in an effort to apprehend the holdup men. The WRA staff has offered its services to the family and is cooperating in the investigation.

NEW SR. MEDICAL OFFICER HERE

Dr. Donnell Boardman this week succeeded Dr. Harry Marks as Senior Medical Officer at the Hospital, the Administration announced. Dr. Boardman transferred here from the Colorado River Relocation Center at Poston, Ariz. Dr. Marks is now Principal Medical Officer at Rehner, Ark.

RELOCATORS GET KINDLY WELCOME ON RETURN HOME

Relocated families and individuals from Tule Lake have written letters to friends here describing their travel experiences and treatments accorded by their neighbors and others.

A letter from a family which returned to its farm home in the Sacramento area tells of a friendly welcome home. Excerpts from the letter read, "Since arriving home we have experienced nothing but kindness and friendly words. Many of our friends have brought us fresh eggs, home-made butter, jellies and fruits." "We had a call from a group of people who reside in this area who are fighting discrimination. They were so very nice and understanding... They told me to feel free to come to them if there should be any trouble..."

Another communication from a girl who has gone to Denver tells of meeting pleasant and friendly people. She is doing secretarial work and says, "Oh, the people here are awfully nice, and really make you feel at home!"

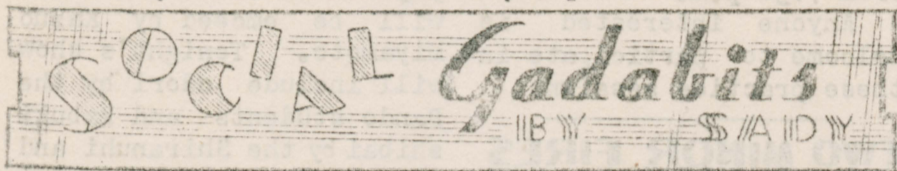

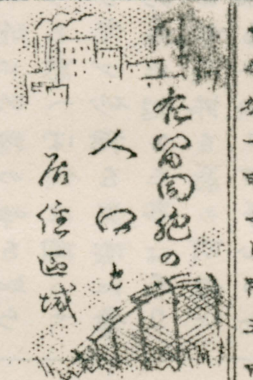

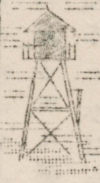

特別規則違反者の続出に鑑み

所長声明書を発し所民に警告

当管理部では各所持別規則を制定先般所民に公表したが違法行為者の続出は甚だ遺憾を感ずる所長は是れを如き声明書を発表した。

鶴嶺湖全所民は去る十六日(金)に制定された特別規則に依り禁止事項を熟知するものと認む。規則印刷物は戸別に配布し即時帰国奉仕団及報國青年団の指導者には特に個人的に傳達したもので、該

規則は現在施行中にて今般も実施されしものである。鶴嶺湖所民は該規則を認知せざることを主張は認容されないもので、如何なる行為が違法となるものであるかを認知してゐるものと認む。

即時帰国奉仕団並に報國青年団の指導者三名は規則違反の原にて九十日間の禁錮を宣告され入獄中である。之は事に端緒に過ぎざる

もので規則違反者は向後も法の適用を受けざるものため、前記三名の九十日間禁錮の罪科は単に警告的なるもので今後六月一年と嚴罰に処せられるかも知れぬ。
