## STOP LIST INTERVIEWS, DEPORTATION HEARINGS BEING CONDUCTED HERE

An Immigration and Naturalization Service staff began work in Tule Lake Center this week to clarify the status of aliens now on the Immigration Stop List, and to make available to aliens other services to enable them to comply with all requirements.

The scope of the Immigration staff here will be limited to those persons who were aliens before enactment of the law which now allows voluntary relinquishment of citizenship upon approval by the Attorney General, and thus will not include persons involved in renunciation proceedings.

Joseph Hertogs, officer in charge, explained that the staff will carry on two principal operations:

1. A "screening" process in which information regarding persons whose names are on the stop list will be checked in brief personal interviews.

2. Conducting of hearings in which persons served with warrants based on information now in possession of the Immigration and Naturalization Service will be given opportunity to present evidence combating deportation proceedings if they desire. In comparison with the alien population of Tule Lake, a small number of such warrants and hearings will be necessary.

In addition, the Immigration staff will furnish services to enable aliens to register in compliance with the Alien Registration Act of 1940 or the Presidential Proclamation covering certificates of identity if they have not done so. The staff will also furnish the required documents to aliens who have complied with the regulations but have failed to

receive them or have lost them.

### STOP LIST "SCREENING"

In the "screening" process, which does not involve hearings, Hertogs said that in most instances it will be possible to inform persons of their status at the end of the interviews.

The main intention of the Immigration and Naturalization Service in this proceeding is to clarify its records regarding the status of those persons called before it, Hertogs said, and to facilitate this each person who is notified to appear should bring with him any passports, identification documents, birth certificates, marriage certificates, alien registration receipts, certificates of identification, evidences of residence or other documents he may have in his possession. Any child under 14 years of age should be accompanied to the interview by one parent.

## CENTER'S END OF YEAR POPULATION FIGURES GIVEN

Tule Lake Center's evacuee population on the last day of 1944 was 18,727 as compared with 17,864 last Tuesday, figures compiled by the Statistics Section revealed today.

At the end of the year the population was composed of 10,950 males and 7777 females.

The largest age group was 22 to 49 inclusive, which totaled 7828. The group less than 22 years of age totaled 7579, and the group 50 and over 3320. Seventy-five people---71 men and four women, were 75 or more years of age, and in the age group 70 to 74 inclusive were 203---175 men and 28 women.

Babies born during 1944 totaled 488---246 boys and 242 girls.

The work of the staff here is expected to reduce the stop list to a fraction of its present size.

### DEPORTATION PROCEEDINGS

Hertogs emphasized that the serving of warrants will not entail immediate deportation or voluntary departure from the U. S. if the hearings develop evidence in the aliens' favor. In many cases even if deportation or other departure is finally ordered such order will not

Block contributions totaled \$2410.48 or 87 per cent of the total, while special donations by blocks, individuals and organizations accounted for the remaining amount of \$344.87.

When grouped into wards, the block donations are as follows: Ward I - \$342.59,

Ward II - \$334.05, Ward III - \$336.15, Ward IV - \$246.08, Ward V - \$343.95, Ward VI - \$245.69, Ward VII - \$317.53, Ward VIII - \$244.44.

Topping the list of organizations was the Colonial Peace Department with \$75.30, followed by Fire Protection Department and Cooperative Enterprises with \$42.75 and \$15.53 respectively.

# RED CROSS BOARD RELOCATION STAFF NOW MEETS TOMORROW WORKING NEAR GATE #1

The method of electing the 1945 Red Cross officers and board of directors will be decided at a meeting tomorrow by the present board of directors, according to the Red Cross Unit.

Only 1945 Red Cross members will be eligible to vote. They will be notified through the block managers as to method, place, and time of casting their ballots.

## FOUR VIOLATORS PLEAD GUILTY AT PROJECT TRIALS

Jail sentences were imposed during the past week on four men after they had pleaded guilty at project hearings, the Administration announced today. Three were for violation of the Special Project Regulations, plus unauthorized use of passes and work badges in two of these cases, and one was for assault and battery.

Utaka Iwamasa, English secretary and Ward VI assistant athletic director of Hokoku Seinen Dan, and Yoshio Yokogawa, Hokoku Ward IV chairman, were sentenced to 390 days in jail, 140 to be served and 250 to be suspended on condition probation terms are compiled with during a period of a year. Thirty days of the 140-day sentence to be served were for use of borrowed passes and work badges to pass from the colony into the Administration area. In addition, the borrowed passes and badges were confiscated, and the persons who loaned

Tule Lake Center's permanent Relocation Office in the building between the Internal Security Headquarters and the Army Processing Station has been in operation since Wednesday, according to the Administration. The Relocation-Evacuee Property office building has an entrance on the colony side so that either office may be visited without a pass.

Immediately inside the entrance from the colony is a library and information desk, with Marguerite Fortune presiding as receptionist and information clerk.

In the other end of the building, reached via a hall extending from the reception room and library, is the Evacuee Property Office.

On both sides of the connecting hallway are prisoners who were terminated.

Minoru Nakashimo, head of the Hokoku communications bureau, was sentenced to 360 days in jail, 110 to be served and 250 to be suspended during a probationary period of one year, for violation of the Special Project Regulations.

Hideto Tagawa pleaded guilty to charges of assault and battery on Masao Shimizu on Feb. 23 and on John Shigeo Nakao on Mar. 27. He was sentenced to 90 days in jail on each charge, with one of the sentences suspended during a probationary period of one year. Both of the altercations took place near the 720 mess hall. Nakao appeared at the hearing with a bandage over one eye.

require persons concerned to remain in the center if they desire to live elsewhere within the U. S., pending the time of their departure from the country.

Each person served with a warrant, Hertogs said, will in due course be notified to appear for a hearing during the period that the Immigration staff is here, the warrant being merely legal notice that such a hearing is impending. Aliens so notified

of impending hearings---by the serving of warrants---are allowed time to obtain counsel if they desire.

He explained further that the hearings here will not be final---that each person heard will be furnished a copy of the review and recommendations of the hearing officer, and will be given an opportunity to present further evidence, or argument to the Board of Immigration Appeals before his case is finally decided.

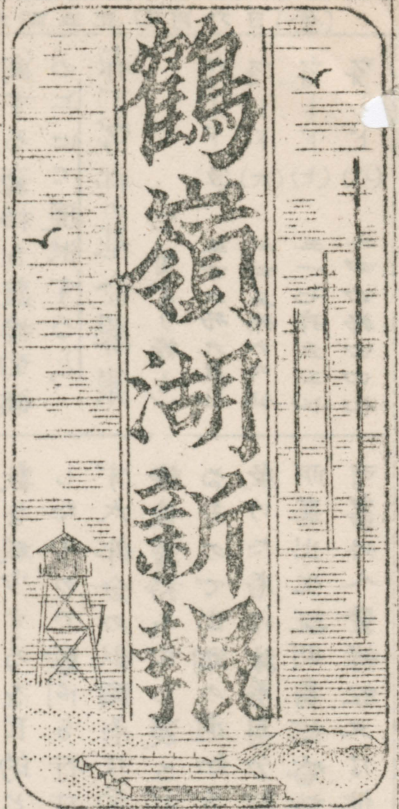
