QUESTIONNAIRE To Be Sent To UNEMPLOYED

The Placement Office will soon send to its present list of unemployed persons who have previously expressed interest in employment, a questionnaire to determine who is able to accept work at this time, the Placement Office disclosed today.

The purpose is to avoid sending job offers to those unable to take them, and to make it possible to contact employable persons more quickly. Residents are asked to return these questionnaires within five days after receipt, regardless of the number of persons in the family now employed.

DAYS SET FOR ALIENS TO COMPLY WITH REQUIREMENTS

The Immigration and Naturalization Service unit now working here with Joseph Hertogs as Officer in Charge today issued a special notice announcing Apr. 23 and 24 as days set aside to take care of Japanese alien residents of Tule Lake who do not have in their possession registration receipts under the Registration Act of 1940 or certificates of identification under the Presidential Proclamation of Jan. 14, 1942.

On those days these required documents will be issued to persons who have not yet complied with the regulations, and to those who have complied but have failed to receive the required documents or have lost them.

The notice follows:

"The Alien Registration Act of 1940 requires that any alien who is within the U. S. and over the age of 14 years must be registered and fingerprinted.

"Those under the age of 14 years must be registered, and upon reaching their 14th birthday must be re-registered and fingerprinted. (About 12 Japanese aliens under 14 years of age are residents of this center.)

"There appears to be a large number of aliens residing in Tule Lake who have not complied with these provisions. It is the intention of this service to give these persons an opportunity to do so on the

WRA TO CONTINUE TO AID JAPANESE ALIENS

Dillon Myer, national director of WRA, in a communication from Washington has assured aliens in all the centers that the WRA Administration will continue to do everything in its power to aid Japanese aliens with their problems, regardless of the fact that the Government of Spain has withdrawn its diplomatic representation of Japan.

"We have no information, as yet," said Mr. Myer, "as to what nation may take over the function of protecting Japanese interests in the U. S.

"In the meantime, the War Relocation Authority will do its best, as it has in the past, to meet the legitimate complaints of the evacuees, whether presented directly to the Pro-

ject Director, to the National Director, or through the Spanish Embassy. We have always welcomed the visits of the Spanish Embassy representatives as Protecting Power and have been glad to provide full information to them, since we have been glad to have a neutral country fully informed as to the program carried on by the WRA. We expect to provide the same cooperation to the representatives of whatever nation may be selected by the Japanese government for carrying on the work of the Protecting Power in the future.

"Until a new representative is selected, I personally and other members of the WRA staff will do everything we can to help both alien and citizen evacuees. The project directors of the centers will be glad, I am sure, to meet with representatives of the Japanese aliens at the centers and to discuss their problems with them.

"Alien evacuees should bear in mind, in this connection, that they are entitled to the same protection of life and property by law enforcement officials as are other aliens. They are also legally entitled to sue in the Federal courts, provided that their suit does not give aid to the enemy."

EXCEPTION TO EMPLOYMENT RULE MADE BY PLACEMENT

An exception to the family employment limitation rule is being made temporarily for nurses aides and orderlies, the Placement Office announced today.

In the interest of proper care of hospital patients and the advisability of opening additional wards, the hospital urgently needs at once 15 nurses aides and five orderlies.

Experience is desirable but is not necessary for

acceptance of these positions. Persons who are not now employed are urged to inquire about this vital work at 1208 immediately.

MODE TO ELECT RED CROSS BOARD

The method of electing Red Cross officers for the coming term was announced today by the local unit at 3001-A.

Each block manager is requested to hold a block meeting of Red Cross members for the purpose of electing a block delegate by Apr. 21. The block delegates will in turn select their respective ward delegates from which a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, treasurer and the board of directors, which consists of four persons, will be chosen.

USE COAL WITHOUT WASTE-LAURITZEN

If all coal delivered in each block is used without waste and if residents refrain from using more than is needed, it will help alleviate the existing coal shortage in this center, explained William Lauritzen of the Maintenance Section today.

He estimated that several hundred tons of coal have been wasted during a period of one year by a coal screening process employed in many of the blocks. Coal dust should be used with the large pieces to prevent waste.

There has been no cut-back in the coal supply. Estimates of previous years have been maintained, and when increases in the colony population have occurred, the coal supply has been increased accordingly, stated Lauritzen.

SPRING PLANTING BEGINS ON FARM

Toward Jarrett, farm superintendent, today revealed that 39 acres of vegetables were planted on the project farm during the period of Apr. 1 to 9. During the same period, part of the cabbage and broccoli was planted in hotbeds, he said.

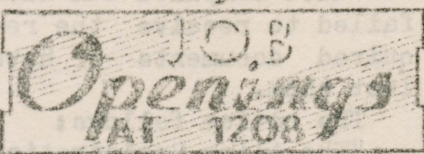
Onions comprise 10 of 39 acres planted. Other vegetables planted include seven acres of china peas, five acres of nappa, five acres of daikon, five acres of turnips, three acres of lettuce, two acres of shingiku, and two acres of spinach.

GATE CHECKUPS MADE MORE STRICT

Unless each evacuee has the required identification when using any of the gates between the colony and the Administration, he will be denied passage, according to the Army.

Army guards at Gate #1, #2, and #3 have been instructed to make sure that each evacuee going through the gates has his Army Identification Badge, Workers Pass and Army Work Badge.

This closer checkup for proper identification became effective Tuesday, Apr. 10. The Army stated that, in the past, leniency of the guards had resulted in misuse of passes.

Service office Apr. 23 or Apr. 24 without further notice. This applies only to those who were aliens prior to the recent renunciation of citizenship proceedings.

"The screening of the Immigration and Naturalization Service Stop List still is under way, and all persons presented with an appearance card must be interviewed by an officer of this service. Anyone who is ill and so unable to appear should notify this office of that fact.

"A number of persons have failed to appear at the specified time. In order to insure prompt attention and to eliminate waiting, it is necessary that persons called appear at the time stated. All persons so called should appear promptly and thus forestall any further action by this service.

"Persons who receive notices to appear, or who need to appear Apr. 23 or Apr. 24 to obtain registration receipts or identification certificates, should go to the Internal Security Headquarters, where transportation will be provided to the Immigration and Naturalization Service office."

Sam Takeda and his family, Japanese Americans who returned to their farm near San Jose this year, have not been frightened by the attack on their home last month, according to a letter received by the WRA from Joe Takeda, the oldest son.

The following excerpts of the letter explain the family's feelings after flames charred the front of the farm house and three shots had been fired in the dark:

"I say that we are satisfied the attack was perpetrated by a few individual thugs and that it does not in any way reflect the feelings of the people of Santa Clara County and San Jose with regard to our family or any other returning evacuees...At Santa Clara High School both the teachers and the students have welcomed my brothers and received them back into school activities as though they had never been away. The same applies at Alviso Grammar School... The report that we had left, or were about to leave our home is entirely without foundation. We are here catching up the threads of our lives where we left off and it would take much more than this incident to convince us that we are not wanted in this community."

RESETTLEMENT AID ASSURED EVACUEES

Resettlement assistance for evacuees resettling in Cleveland has been assured by action of the Cuyhoga County Commissioners, Mrs. Dorothy Barber, district relocation officer, has reported to the Administration.

Difficulty had arisen when the commissioners questioned their right to advance relief funds for the special resettlement assistance program. However, the commissioners' attorney held that if federal funds could be advanced, there was no question of the ability of the county also to provide the necessary service. This technicality was met when the Regional Social Security Board honored a request of the Ohio Welfare Bureau for an advance of funds for use by Ohio counties in the assistance program.
