MYER SPEAKS TO REPRESENTATIVE GROUPS DURING 4 - DAY VISIT HERE

COZZENS, LEE EXPLAINS POLICIES OF THE WRA ACCOMPANY MYER ON VISIT HERE

Three high officials of WRA, headed by Dillon Myer, national director, visited Tule Lake this week to confer with Japanese leaders and Administration officers. With Myer were R. B. Cozzens, assistant director, from San Francisco, and Rex Lee, head of the Relocation Division, from Washington. They arrived Monday and left last night. During their stay they made a complete inspection of the center.

The national director appeared personally before two representative groups in the colony. Tuesday he talked to the Block Managers in the headquarters at 1608, and Wednesday he addressed and conferred

Dillon Myer, director of WRA, during his four-day visit here told the residents of Tule Lake, through the Block Managers and the Spokesmen for Japanese Nationals, that WRA is operating on a basis of respect for everybody's feelings as far as that is possible and asked the cooperation of Tuleans in maintaining such mutual understanding in this center.

"We know there are people in Tule Lake who already have made up their minds to return to Japan," Myer

said. "That is all right and that opinion should be respected.


"There are also people who have not decided what to do, and there are people who have decided they want to remain in America.

"All of these people should have the facts, so that they can make up their own minds. Tule Lake should be a center where it is possible for people to make up their own minds without pressure from anybody."

The national director reviewed the history of WRA and explained the announcement, made some time ago, that WRA will cease to operate centers by Jan. 2, 1946, at the latest. Under an agreement between the Department of Justice and the WRA, he said, the Department of Justice will assume control of whatever is left when WRA goes out of business.

The world situation is changing so rapidly, Myer said, that it is possible there will be no further need for centers even before the date set for WRA's retirement. He mentioned possibility that the war

LIFE OF MARGARET DOI SAVED BY PENICILLIN

Chiyoko Margaret Doi, 19-year-old daughter of Mrs. Murano Doi, 4203-D, is back home, her life saved by penicillin, the Miracle Drug, and the skill and care of the doctors at the hospital.

Margaret, as she is known to friends, entered the hospital on Mar. 10 for treatment of hemolytic anemia, a relatively rare blood disease; her case was

widely discussed. She contracted pneumonia following an operation for the removal of the spleen. Her condition became critical.

Deciding that penicillin alone could save her life, Dr. Jack Sleath, principal medical officer, made special arrangements to obtain it, for the hospital's small supply was insufficient. Dr. Sleath made a special trip and secured the necessary amount on Sunday, Mar. 25.

Soon thereafter, the tide turned, and the period of danger was over. Last Saturday, Margaret returned to her home well on the way to recovery.

Prior to evacuation, Margaret lived with her father, mother, and brother at 539 Madison Avenue, Los Angeles. Her father, Shusaburo Doi, died on Dec. 30, 1942.

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HOG FARM

MONTHLY PORK PRODUCTION TO BE INCREASED—JARRETT

Beginning in April, the monthly production of pork will be increased approximately 12,000 pounds, Toward Jarrett, farm superintendent, stated this afternoon.

In March, 40,143 pounds of dressed pork, 4766 pounds of sausage, and 8360 pounds of lard were delivered to Mess Operations. The total of 53,269 pounds represented an increase of 5261 pounds from the February figure.

Jarrett also announced the purchase of 81 feeder hogs this week from the Shasta County Farm Bureau, bringing the total procured since February to 290 heads.

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS SOUGHT BY SPECIAL DETAIL-DEWITT

Joseph H. DeWitt, acting chief of Internal Security, today issued a warning to all motor vehicle drivers that a special traffic control detail has been established to deal strictly

with reckless driving, speeding and other traffic violations in Tule Lake Center.

"Tule Lake's traffic accident rate is far too high for its population," declared DeWitt in stating that during all hours of the day in which automobile traffic is moving, an officer will be assigned whose sole duty will be to apprehend violators.

1438 RETURN TO COAST; 40,000 GO ELSEWHERE

Of more than 110,000 Japanese, aliens and American born, evacuated from the Pacific Coast states, only 1438 have returned to their homes to date, while 40,000 Japanese have been relocated in various states, Director Dillon Myer of the WRA stated Apr. 10, at Los Angeles.

He said 55,000 others have been cleared by the army for relocation in any part of the country, 20,000

of them under 16 years of age.

Approximately 17,600 Japanese Americans from the mainland and Hawaii have been inducted into the army since November 1, 1940, he said the Army has advised the WRA.

Myer said of those returning to the coast, 1196 Japanese have come back to California, 116 to Oregon, and 126 to Washington.

DOI DESCRIBES ARSON ATTACKS AT COURT TRIAL

AUBURN, Apr. 19--Before a jury of five men and seven women, Sumio Doi, Japanese American farmer, testified in court today that three attempts were made to burn and dynamite his packing shed Jan. 18 and 19.

Defendants on trial are James Watson, 38, and two brothers, both AWOL Army privates, Elmer Johnson, 20, and Alvin Johnson, 18. Doi was unable to identify any of the defendants.

The defense announced it would attempt to show purchase of the ranch was not within the California alien land act and that Doi could not have made the purchase with his own funds.

Presiding Judge Lowell Sparks ruled that Doi must answer questions touching upon the validity of his property transaction.

Doi then testified he bought the 85-acre ranch in 1939, paying \$800 down. He said he paid the remaining \$8300 of the purchase price in 1941. District Attorney C. E. Tindall stated he expects to prove that the ranch was attacked.

EXTENSION BEING BUILT AT CLINIC

In order to accommodate more patients at the 1708 colony dispensary waiting room, an extension measuring 10' by 40' is now being constructed on the east side of the dispensary building, Homer Ricketts, senior engineer, announced today.

Ninety patients, an increase of 66 persons, will be able to sit in the waiting room when enlarged. Work on the building will be completed within a month, according to Ricketts.

Holland will head the relocation staff which for the past month has been in charge of Bernard Shallit, former assistant in the Social Welfare Section. Shallit now becomes Assistant Relocation Program Officer.



might be over much sooner than many people now think.

"We have no plans to make any change immediately in the administration of Tule Lake," he said. "I am not in favor of moving any more large groups of people around unless they want it or insist on it. I prefer that we work things out together. But if we cannot do that, I may not be able to control what will be done. It might be that someone else would take over sooner than I would recommend. We plan to operate the center until the first of the year unless something happens to prevent it."

WRA'S CLOSING POLICY

Myer enumerated five specific reasons for WRA's announced closing policy:

1. There are approximately 20,000 school-age children in centers whose education has been continued for three years in center schools, but who should be accorded the right and opportunity to participate in normal education life.

2. The employment and economic situation in the U. S. now is such that the time is most favorable for people to leave centers and start their lives anew, so that they may be firmly established in their private endeavors when the re-conversion period comes.

3. There is so little need for other assistance in the country now, that resettlers who need aid because of age, illness or other incapacity for self-support may receive it with the least possible difficulty. Welfare agencies are devoting much of their time to this problem in co-operation with the WRA.

4. It was necessary to inform congress, which appropriates the money to operate WRA centers, what would be needed within a reasonable period, and a year seemed a reasonable time under present circumstances.

5. The campaign of discrimination pressed by certain elements in this country has been broken, and the acceptance and good will toward people of Japanese ancestry are increas-

ing rapidly. Maintenance of centers for longer than absolutely necessary merely sets them and the people in them as targets of discrimination and criticism, whereas the people now are being accepted freely in the normal stream of life outside.

"Many people in Tule Lake are confused," he said, "and that is not surprising because the whole world has been confused."

"But our big problem is to maintain here and elsewhere the kind of atmosphere in which people can make up their own minds on their own problems. We will need your help in solving these problems at Tule Lake, and you will need our help. There are things on which we will have to work together."

BEST ACCEPTANCE NOW

Myer said there are several reasons why people of Japanese ancestry now have the best acceptance throughout the country than at any previous time. Foremost, he said, is the fact the Nisei boys not only have made good, but have made exceptional records in the army, and the people of the U. S. are proud of them. Also the people have conducted themselves well in the centers and they and the WRA have learned to live together in mutual respect, which is bringing again to the attention of the country as a whole that these people of Japanese ancestry always have been self-reliant, well-disciplined, and proud of those attributes.

FEW EXCEPTIONS

He said there are few exceptions to mutual respect in the centers, and that one of them is here. He referred to "so much noise between 5:30 and 7 o'clock in the morning."

"I have no objection," he said, "to anything that is a religious ceremony, but I do object to the noise, and I believe most people feel the same. I believe it is affecting the lives of people here adversely."

The national director said WRA has been "fighting discrimination with all

1945 TULE LAKE BASEBALL BY-LAWS

1. The number of players on any one team shall be limited to 18.
2. Players shall not be permitted to transfer from one team to another once the team's rosters are submitted to the secretary. Registration of new players shall be made seven days in advance of the scheduled game.
3. For the mutual protection of all teams entered; to insure fulfillment of schedule and right conduct on the part of players and management of all teams, forfeit money to the amount of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) shall be levied on each team before the team is entered in the league.
4. Membership fee of two dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) shall be levied on each team before the team is entered in the league.
5. Games shall be governed by Official Baseball Rules adopted by the National and American Leagues and the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues.
6. All players must show respect to umpires whose decisions shall be final. The umpires are the representatives of the League and are authorized to enforce the rules.
7. In all cases of violation of the rules by player, coach or manager, the penalty shall be prompt removal of the offender from the game and grounds. The penalties of the offender will be as follows:
 - (A) An assault upon a player, coach and manager. PENALTY: Suspension of the offender for two league games of more.
 - (B) An assault upon an umpire. PENALTY: Suspension of the offender for the entire season.
 - (C) Other minor decisions will be made by the board members.
8. Protests shall be written by the manager and forwarded within 24 hours after the protested game to the CA Baseball Commissioner. The board members shall make the final decisions.
9. Assigned umpires shall decide on the postponement of a game.
10. Postponed games shall be played on the date designated by the president of the league.
11. The players, coaches, managers, score-keepers and bat boys are the only persons allowed to sit on the players' benches.
