PROTECTION OF RIGHTS. PRIVILEGES IS SOUGHT

In an address before a recent meeting of the sheriffs of California, Robert Kenny, state attorney general, reiterated the duty and the determination of the law enforcement agencies to protect the rights and the privileges of Japanese Americans.

Referring to the San Francisco Conference as drawing

many hundreds of foreign leaders, Kennysaid, "these visitors will hear the story of democracy, the story of equality among They will be working out the machinery to build a world democracy and a perpetual equality among men and nations." "This democracy", he declared, "must be demonstrated to include Japanese Americans."

"With the determination by the War Department that military necessity no longer requires the exclusion of the Japanese Americans from the West Coast," he said, "and the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States that the rights of the Japanese Americans must be restored, these rights again are theirs. Remember--and remind people---that this applies only to those whose loyalty to these United States has been determined and who are hence being allowed to leave the War Relocation camps. These rights are meaningful, and must be protected. And it is the duty of law enforcement officials to cast aside any personal prejudices they may have and fully to protect the returning Japanese Americans."

JURY CLEARS 3 ACCUSED OF RAID ON DOS FARM HC) AAH

HOSTELS MAY GET HELP FROMWRA

In order to aid in solving the problem of temporary, emergency housing for evacuees returning to the West Coast, the Administration has announced that the WRA has set up a plan under which it will loan certain equipment to responsible organizations for establishment of hostels in California, Oregon, and washington for evacuee use.

Hostels under this plan must provide accomodations for a minimum of 20 persons. The sponsors must agree that the hostels will be operated on a non-profit basis and that they will be open for inspection by WRA employees to insure that facilities are utilized properly. Tenancy would be limited to not more than three weeks except in hardship cases.

Equipment available to be loaned for use in such hostels includes beds, mattresses, blankets, pillows, straight chairs, kitchen utensils, crockery, and cutlery.

Hostels may be sponsored and supervised by responsible committees or representative groups of people other than evacuees or in addition to evacuees with approval of the area supervisor of the area in which the hostelis to be located. Proposals arising at centers will be transmitted to the area supervisors.

the comeback.


Goto tapped in 13 digits to cop high point honors in the playoff.
