Requests for unblocking orders will be forwarded through the project director to the Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco. The bank will determine whether the statements on the individual request forms are correct, and if they are, the individual unblocking

WEDNESDAY ADDED AS VISITING DAY

Evacuoes in four categories are not eligible to apply for unblocking orders through this special arrangement with the treasury. They are persons not on the Army Free List, persons who have been issued specific blocking orders, evacuees who have represented or acted as agents for any person outside the continental United States on or since July 26, 1941, and persons who now hold funds belonging to blocked nationals.

Those who are not eligible, however, may apply for reconsideration of their cases by filing Form TFU-1 with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco.

FUMOS PROVIDED FOR ASSISTANCE

Additional WRA funds amounting to \$175,000 are now available for the So-cial Security Board's Resettlement Assistance Program through a transfer authorization bill signed by President Harry Truman on Apr. 26, announced Dillon Myer, national director of the WRA; this week.

Accelerated resettlement from WRA centers, Mr. Myer said, had exhausted the \$50,000 originally set aside to provide outside assistance during the 1945 liscal year. The diverted funds will be available for minimum assistance through June 30, 1945, to resettling evacuees in the greatest need, the director said.

ALL DRIVERS MUST HEED SPEED LIMIT

Strict adherence to the general speed limit of 15 miles per hour was asked by the Colonial Peace Headquarters at 1808 today.

Speeding is not only a violation of the law, the department stated, but it creates unnecessary dust and it endangers the lives of many residents, particularly when vehicles are driven through the blocks.

ATTION MKFM ON CASUALTY SCHEMES LIST

The War Department has warned that next of kin of war heroes should guard against fraudulent schemes based on casualty lists, and the United States Post Office has announced it is taking vigorous action in all such cases involving illegal use of the mails.

One of the commonest forms of such swindles in-volves a letter to the next of kin to battle casualties, advising that the soldier is to be given a special niche in a so-called "hall of fame" or a "hero's memorial book," with deposits in advance required. As soon as the remittance is received the transaction is closed, and the American fighting man's family has been victimized.

Local 929 of the International Teamsters Union in Philadelphia already has accepted Japanese Americans into membership "and will continue to do so on an equal basis with men every other race, color or creed, and in fact this union discriminates against no one on account of race, color or creed," the WRA was informed this week by A. Goldberg, president.

"We wish to assure you," Goldberg said, "that the same equal treatment will be accorded any loyal person of Japanese ancestry who wishes to enter this industry in any capacity whatsoever, whether in the retail or wholesale business, as is accorded to any person as long as they follow the rules and regulations of the union and industry."

1945 BASEBAH SEASON STARTS

Approximately 2500 fans were on hand Saturday at Field #3 to welcome in the 1945 Tule Lake baseball season. Showing some of the spirit that made them champions of 1944, Guadalupe handed the T.L. Nippons a 12 to 6 lacing, in the official league opener.

Preceding the initial contest, an opening ceremony (nyujoshiki) was held. All eight teams vying for the "A" league crown, appeared on the diamond in full uniform. Project Director R.R. 
