## LIVESTOCK UNIT Buys 485 Hogs

The Livestock Unit this week purchased 485 heads of feeder hogs from the Shasta County Farm Bureau, Toward Jarrett, chief of Agriculture, announced today. This purchase brings the total number of hogs on hand to 1500 heads, he said.

One thousand forth-six heads of hogs have been slaughtered since January, an average of 70 heads per week, it was disclosed.

## HAYWARD STATES MESS OPERATIONS' FEEDING POLICY

Raymond Hayward, chief project steward, today issued the following statement:

"It is Mess Operations' policy to serve balanced, nutritious meals comparable to that available to the civilian population at large.

"This policy is not being changed, nor will it be changed except to conform to OPA rationing.

"We will continue to feed the colony in accordance with this policy as long as it is possible to obtain food from the sources of supply. We must keep within the limit of 45 cents per day per person.

"No cut or increase in this policy is authorized."

## 661 CASUALTIES AMONG NISEI FROM CENTERS

Six hundred and sixty-one Japanese American soldiers with next of kin in WRA centers have been reported as casualties of World War II, according to May 12 figures received from the Statistics Section in Washington, D. C. Of the total, 142 were killed, 504 were wounded, and 15 were missing.

## THIRD ANNIVERSARY OF TULE LAKE THIS SUNDAY

Three years ago this Sunday - on May 27, 1942 - a voluntary band of 447 travel-weary evacuees from the North Portland and Puyallup centers set foot on this lonely lake bed, this barren land a few miles south of the Oregon border where Captain Jack and his Modoc Indians once roamed. More contingents came in the days to follow, and there mushroomed a bustling community of 15,000 where none had been before.

Thus began the history of Tule Lake Center - a history filled with events that oft-times figured in the leading journals of the nation.

These are the moments that shall remain indelible in our minds:

September, 1942 -- School opens for 3800 in Block 66.

February, 1943 -- Question #28.

July -- 397 seniors receive diplomas in new auditorium.

August -- R. R. Best succeeds Harvey Coverly as project director.

September -- Segregation begins.

November -- Mass demonstration held in Administration area...curfew...martial law...stockade comes into being.

December -- House to house canvas made for contraband goods.

January, 1944 -- Residents vote to go back to work.

February -- Curfew lifted.

May -- Shoichi Okamoto dies from gunshot wound inflicted by military sentry.

July -- Yaozo Hitomi, Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises general manager, slain by unidentified assailant. 27 taken to Eureka on draft violation charges freed.

December -- Officials here to conduct citizenship hearings. Coast ban lifted.

March, 1945 -- Spain quits as Protecting Power.

April -- Myer confers with Japanese leaders and Administration officers.

## FORMER TULEAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Keisen Tim Nagai, 22-year-old Issei who formerly resided at National, Wash.; and Tule Lake and Minidoka, was found dead of gas poisoning on May 11 in his furnished New York apartment he shared with two Nisei, according to recent report received here from New York WRA officials.

The death was certified as suicide by the police and verified as such by a WRA official who talked with the police and with Nagai's roommates. The WRA official was also informed that Nagai had attempted suicide in Chicago last winter.

Nagai's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ikuo Nagai, live at 404-B, where his three sisters, Mrs. Fumi Satomi and Annie and Lucy Nagai, also reside. His brother, Sergeant Ralph Nagai, is stationed at Fort Riley, Kans.
