# CO-OP OFFERS REWARD OF \$300

Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Inc., this week put out notices offering a reward of \$300 for information leading to arrest and conviction of the person or persons guilty of stealing \$3359.25 from a safe in the cooperative business office at 717 on or about June 25.

The conditions of the reward, as offered by the cooperative and approved by the Administration, are as follows:

1. Information must be reported to the Chief of Internal Security or anyone whom he may designate.

2. No member of the

2. No member of the Administrative Police of Tule Lake Center shall be eligible to receive the reward.

3. No officer or member of the Board of Directors of the cooperative shall be eligible to receive the reward.

4. The Project Director, the Assistant Project Director in charge of Community Management and the Chief of Internal Security shall have the whole discretion of deciding to whom the reward shall be paid, and upon payment of the reward by the cooperative after such decision, there shall be no further liability in connection with this offer of reward on the part of the cooperative to any other person or persons who may have furnished information or assisted in the apprehension and conviction of the guilty person or persons. ### SKELETON REMAINS OF YOUNG INDIAN FOUND AT BLK. 51

Twenty pieces of human skeleton remains were discovered in Block 51 last week by Taichiro Hirashima of 5115-E while he was digging an irrigation ditch near his barrack, according to Colonial Peace Headquarters. The findings are now in possession of Internal Security and are described as very old and in crumbling condition.

Dr. Marvin Opler, an anthropologist, who formerly taught at University of Colorado and Reed College, identified the skull, which was unearthed approximately 18 inches below the surface, as that of an immature Indian male. He stated that if the remains had been uncovered more carefully, they may have had some historical value.

"If any more human remains are found, residents should leave them undisturbed and contact me at 701-B for they may prove valuable to the California Historical Society," Opler said.

MOVE MADE AGAINST ADVICE

"Not only did the Administration not suggest closing of the canteens, this move was made against the advice of Administration officers," said the Acting Project Director. "Officials of the cooperative have been told that the Administration considers the action of closing of canteens a grave error in judgment on their part, and these officials were urged at that time to take immediate and effective actionto reopen the canteens.

"The Administration has no desire or intention to interfere in the conduct of Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Inc., as long as the scoperative is operated in accordance with its agreement with the Administration and for the benefit of the colony as a whole, but it is interested vitally in orderly conduct of all affairs of the center as they affect the people.


