Labor Day To Be Observed

Next Monday, Sept. 3--Labor Day--will be a holiday for evacuee workers of Tule Lake Center.

This will be in accordance with President Truman's order permitting government departments to observe all legal holidays, a practice which was discontinued during the war.

125 RELOCATE FROM TULE LAKE CENTER IN AUG.

Tule Lake residents who are eligible for resettlement began pouring out of the center in earnest this month to re-establish themselves on the outside, the Administration announced today, with terminal departures for August totaling 125.

In addition, 36 people went out on short-term leaves to investigate employment and business possibilities, and many of these have indicated that they will convert their leaves to terminal departures without returning to the center, having found situations to their advantage on the outside.

The new District Relocation Office at 7801-A has been in operation all

LESS WORK

TULE TO GO ON 40-HOUR WORK WEEK FROM SEPT. 9

Tule Lake Center, both evacuee workers and appointed personnel, will go on a five-day work week beginning with the week of Sept. 9, the Administration announced today, pursuant to instructions received from the WRA in Washington.

All of WRA will operate on the shorter work week along with the rest of the agencies of the Department of the Interior, in conformance with President Truman's order setting up a 40-hour week in government departments.

The effect of the order for evacuee workers of Tule Lake will be two full days off each week, in most cases Saturday and Sunday. In essential services, such as the Colonial Peace Department, the Fire Department, and Mess Operations, schedules of work will be adjusted so that people who necessarily work Saturday

RATION-FREE SHOES MAY BE AVAILABLE

The Welfare Section received information this week from the OPA that it anticipates that some ration-free shoes for adults will be made available soon.

Shoes for men and women expected to be purchasable without ration stamps will be those manufactured before or during the first year of shoe rationing, to sell for \$3.50 or less a pair. The Welfare Section will be notified when such unrationed shoes are available. No juvenile shoes are included.

"and they are very wise to do so at this time, while WRA still is in the position to help them in every possible way to re-establish themselves on the outside satisfactorily and happily.

"The time when WRA must go out of existence is drawing nearer, and fortunately right now there are

WRA's announcement that 500 evacuee families who formerly lived in Seattle and elsewhere in King County, Wash., are returning was the subject of a meeting of business, professional, clergy and labor representatives recently in Renton, near Seattle, it is reported in the Aug. 23 issue of the Renton News Record, one of the town's two newspapers. Renton is the site of a federal housing project.

"Because of the housing shortage in Seattle and the remainder of the county," says the News Record, "these families will be divided between the different federal housing projects with the result that Renton will receive its share.

"The housing of the Japanese families will be a temporary nature. They will remain in the various housing projects until they can return to the house and property that they own which now is leased, or until they secure permanent employment elsewhere."

"In February of 1942," the paper continues, "ap-

proximately 10,400 Japanese were evacuated from King County. Of these it is expected that about 3500 will return. The 500 families are the first contingent of this group.

"Since the federal government evacuated people of Japanese ancestry from their homes, it is a federal responsibility to aid them in returning to normal living. The only agency of the federal government which can assist these people to get re-established is the Federal Housing Authority, pointed out one of the Relocation Authority officials.

"In the general discussion that followed the announcement of the War Relocation Authority of the return of the Japanese families, the different representatives expressed their belief that the relocation of the Japanese families on a temporary basis is a move on the part of the federal government, and that these families are entitled to the same privileges that any other American family is entitled to."

The meeting in Renton was addressed by Harold Fistere, relocation supervisor of the Northwest Area at Seattle, and by other WRA people, who reported that a promise of cooperation was received from all those present, including the mayor of Renton, the chief of police, representatives of three veterans organizations, the AFL Machinists Union, and other leading citizens.
